

JAPANESE RESTORE SHANTUNG TO CHINA

Striking Lack of Ceremony Marks Transfer.

TROOPS ARE ON SCENE

Foreign Minister Alleges Bandits in League With Officials of Retiring Government.

TSINGTAO, Shantung, China, Dec. 10.—(By the Associated Press.)—The territory of Kiaochow was restored to China at noon today with a striking lack of ceremony. The Chinese flag for the first time in 24 years was raised over the administration building which had been used by the Germans and later by the Japanese who seized the territory during the world war. A small group of Japanese officials, who had been ordered to leave the territory a half hour before the transfer, were taken over by the Chinese.

Jap Troops Leave.
General Yui, Japanese governor-general of Kiaochow, and the remaining Japanese troops in the territory will depart on December 11. The staffs which have been on the docks and wharves will remain ten days longer, after which they will be replaced by Chinese.

A thousand Shantung troops arrived here before it was taken over. Wang Chen Ting, foreign minister of China, who received the territory from the Japanese, said he was confident there would be no trouble from the bandits as they have left the town. He declared that now the only possibility of danger is from Japanese roughs.

Minister Wang repeated this expressed in an interview his inability to understand why the arms promised by the Japanese for the police have not arrived. Japan, he said, has postponed the delivery of arms three times. He said he has 2700 police troops within the territory and 10,000 troops on the boundary.

He said he did not wish to accuse Japanese authorities of double dealing, but he alleged relations existed between the Japanese authorities and the bandits. Wang denied there was friction between himself and the Shantung troops.

Japanese Blames Chinese.
General Minobe Yui, Japanese governor-general of the leased territory of Kiaochow, which today was formally restored to the Chinese, in an interview with a correspondent of the Associated Press, blamed the Chinese authorities of Shantung for the operations of the bandits who are now threatening Tsingtao.

The bandit hordes have been concentrating on the borders of the leased territory for several weeks in preparation for the transfer to China when the Japanese troops evacuate the territory Sunday.

General Yui and his chief of staff, General Kato, admitted that the bandits had been most active in Shantung during the Japanese, making their headquarters at Laoshan, Tsingtao and Huayung. The only actual outrage perpetrated by the bandits, they said, occurred some months ago when they kidnapped a Tsinan millionaire within the leased territory.

The Japanese were appealed to in this case, said General Yui, and secured the release of the Tsinan man. General Yui declared that the Japanese had understood recently that the Shantung authorities were negotiating with the bandits with a view of incorporating them into the national army. The Japanese, General Yui insisted, had never been notified officially of the negotiations and were powerless to suppress the bandits on the frontier without effective Chinese cooperation.

Bandits Are Guests.
Recently the Japanese learned of the banquet given at the Tungshu hotel in Tsingtao, at which were present a representative of the Shantung military governor, police and military officials and representatives of the Chinese chamber of commerce.

The bandit chiefs were declared to have been the guests of honor at the banquet, which was held for the purpose of celebrating a tentative agreement between the Chinese authorities and the bandits. This convinced the Japanese that the bandit question was purely political, according to General Yui.

But when it was learned that at the conclusion of the banquet the bandits had kidnapped the chairman of the chamber of commerce, General Yui sent a letter to the bandit chiefs to request that they found a formal invitation issued by the Chinese to the ten bandit chiefs to be guests at the banquet, who were to be escorted by terms offered by the Chinese officials to the Chinese bandits.

When the Japanese heard that the bandits were living at the Chinese hotel in Tsingtao, a Chinese emissary was sent to request them to leave the city. The bandits, however, ignored this request, and they also did that of the gendarme who followed the Chinese emissary. Finally General Yui said that 20 gendarmes were sent to the hotel. Then the bandits moved.

Japanese Take No Action.
General Yui said that no steps were taken by the Japanese to suppress the bandits because the officials did not consider it any of their business to interfere in negotiations which they assumed had a political complexion. Had they adopted drastic measures against the bandits, said General Yui, there was every probability that the outlaws would later have taken reprisals against Japanese nationals and foreigners after the withdrawal tomorrow of the Japanese troops.

The governor wanted it understood that the Chinese had not invoked the co-operation of the Japanese in the bandit situation and had never even complained of the kidnapping of the chairman of the chamber of commerce. General Yui said that the Chinese officials had even invited him to a farewell dinner, but evidently were so ashamed of what had happened that they canceled the banquet.

Regarding the supply of arms for the Chinese troops, General Yui explained that it was necessary to secure the assent of the diplomatic body at Peking before the Japanese could supply these arms. The Italian minister at first objected, he said, and when these objections were overcome the Chinese were unable to make definite arrangements to pay for the arms.

EARTHQUAKES KILL MANY

HOUSES COLLAPSE; BRIDGES ARE DESTROYED.

Unofficial Estimates Place Death List on Island of Kishinoue in Excess of 100.

TOKIO, Dec. 10.—(By the Associated Press.)—Twenty-two persons were killed in the earthquake on the Shimadzu peninsula on the island of Kishinoue, according to an official announcement today. This is considered conservative as efforts are being made to tally the deaths of the inhabitants, who are panic-stricken.

The shocks continued for more than thirty hours and many bridges were destroyed. Unofficial estimates place the death list in excess of a hundred. Most of the casualties were caused by houses collapsing. In some places the land sank three feet. The quakes were felt with less severity at Fukuoka.

Earthquakes were reported also at Aomori and Hakodate, but no details have been received. Officials, however, said the situation in those places is not as serious as on the island of Kishinoue, although both shocks were caused by the activity of the same volcano on Mount Aso.

Residents of Shimadzu have fled from their homes and sought refuge at Nagasaki, where many of the wounded were taken. Shocks continued to be felt today.

The first shock was the most violent since the disaster on Sakurajima island in 1913 when 200 were killed. The volcanoes of Minami and Aso are entering an active period after nine years of comparative quietude, according to experts.

SPY CHARGES FALL FLAT

Allegation Against American in Japan Is Unfounded.

TOKIO, Dec. 8.—(By the Associated Press.)—Vinecent Uchida, foreign minister, replying today to Ambassador Warren's recent protest in the method of dealing with R. M. Andrews, an American, who has lived in Japan for many years, says it is clear that no charge of being a spy was made against Andrews and that the allegation of being suspected of espionage was based on unfounded rumors. Andrews has been interrogated by the Japanese authorities for running his motorboat in the vicinity of fortifications.

Andrews, it is said, will plead guilty to a minor charge of breach of navigation laws when his case is called.

CHURCH 20 YEARS OLD

Vancouver English Lutherans Hold Anniversary Services.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Dec. 10.—(Special.)—The congregation of the St. Paul English, Lutheran church today celebrated the twentieth anniversary of the establishment of the church here. Rev. W. F. Holl of Everett, who was the first pastor of the local congregation in 1902, preached the morning service, while Rev. S. W. Bussard, also an ex-pastor, had charge of the afternoon services. Rev. Luther B. Deck is the present pastor.

The congregation was formed 20 years ago but the church was without a building of its own until the following year, when the present building at Thirteenth and Franklin streets was constructed.

FEDERAL JUDICIAL REFORMS PROPOSED

Attorney-General Daugherty Holds System Obsolete.

STATES CAUSE TROUBLE

Foreign Governments Refuse to Recognize Right to Seize Liquor-Laden Vessels.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 10.—A new basic judicial organization, to meet the augmented work which has resulted from "the ever-increasing complexity of government," was suggested by Attorney-General Daugherty in his annual report made public here, on the operations of the department of justice. Noting that 50,722 criminal cases were reported in the last fiscal year, the report declared the point was being approached "where a revamping of the machinery used in this work is inevitable."

Adoption of some method by which the government could retain attorneys who have special knowledge of government matters in addition to legal training was one of the several suggestions advanced by Mr. Daugherty. The recently enacted legislation providing additional judges should help the situation, he said, but probably will not entirely remedy it.

Concurrent Jurisdiction Clashes.
The failure of local self-government in parts of the country," the report said, "results in the insistence of the citizens of those communities that the federal government perform that function in which the local government has failed, and frequently in matters where there is concurrent jurisdiction between the state and federal government. It is difficult to establish a policy as to the extent to which the federal government should take jurisdiction."

This is peculiarly true of offenses arising under the federal reserve act, the narcotics act, the Volstead act and the postal frauds act. There has been an effort on the part of this division during this fiscal year to have the United States attorneys and the state prosecuting attorneys meet from time to time for the purpose of co-operation. Evidence of the benefits of these meetings is overwhelming.

The existing procedure for the removal of a defendant to the jurisdiction where the crime was committed is unduly cumbersome and results in unjustified delay and injustice. Under such procedure the trial is frequently delayed from one to two years.

Announcement was made in the report of the "desire of the department to return, or to recommend return," all property seized under the trading with the enemy act in cases where the owners come within the enabling section (paragraph 3) of the act.

Run-Runners Sworn Coasts.
"Since the 18th amendment of the constitution and title two of the national prohibition act became effective," it said, "rum-running vessels of American and foreign registry, carrying liquor from foreign ports to our shores, have swarmed along our seaboard, smuggling liquor into the United States in violation of our laws."

"Eighteen vessels of foreign registry and 11 of American registry, with their cargoes of liquors have been seized. No American-owned vessels can transport beverage liquors without American territorial waters."

TOKIO, Dec. 10.—Official reports and rumors reaching Tokio indicate serious trouble in north Manchuria, with a possibility of war between the reds and General Chang Tso Lin. The Chinese Eastern railway, which both claim, is the bone of contention, and the Russians may attempt an early date to forcibly occupy it.

Japan is an intensely interested spectator, officials stating that the coming trouble is the natural consequence of the withdrawal of the Japanese forces, which alone have been holding the reds in check. Should fighting break out, Japan would not interfere unless her own interests in south Manchuria are involved.

DRY AGENT IS KILLED

Posse Recovers Body After Fight With Moonshiners.

MOUNT STERLING, Ky., Dec. 10.—Federal prohibition agents and posse men last night recovered the body of Robert C. Duff, 50, a dry agent, killed early Saturday in a skirmish with moonshiners who were barricaded in a cave in the hills of Menifee county, east of here. Members of the band had fled farther into the hills when the officials and posse men arrived.

Duff was killed while leading a raiding party to the cave, where officers believed a still was in operation. The occupants of the cave opened fire when the officers approached. In the subsequent exchange of shots the fire of the defendants became so heavy that the raiding party was forced to retire without Duff's body. Bringing word of the battle here, Duff's companions obtained reinforcements and returned to the scene of the fight. Entering the deserted cave, they found evidence of moonshining, but the plans proper had been removed. The dead agent had been stripped of his arms and ammunition.

USE FOR STILLS FOUND

Sheriffs and Policemen to Make Convention Badges of Metal.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Dec. 10.—(Special.)—Convention badges at the conference of northwest sheriffs and police to be held in Portland next month, will be made out of captured moonshine stills, according to Sheriff Thompson of Clark county. Each sheriff will be called upon to furnish his quota of copper stills.

Until a few weeks ago Clarke county alone could have furnished enough captured stills to make badges for the entire convention, but most of them were destroyed, together with a large stock of assorted liquors.

GLAND THEORY IS SCATHED

Transplanting From Lower Animals Held Futile.

CHICAGO, Dec. 10.—The only glands that will restore lost vigor are human glands, and it would take the glands of five men to impart lost potency to one man. Even then, the effect would be only temporary.

Dr. A. C. Carlson, head of the department of physiology at the University of Chicago, thus brands the much-discussed gland transplantations as "biological futility."

He says that the talk of monkey and goat glands restoring vitality to a man is preposterous. Such glands are good only for monkeys and goats. He also classed as quacks many of the surgeons who are performing these operations and said they were the black sheep of the profession.

Dr. Carlson's statements were stoutly refuted by several physiologists who have been experimenting in rejuvenation.
