You Can Clean Good White Shades.

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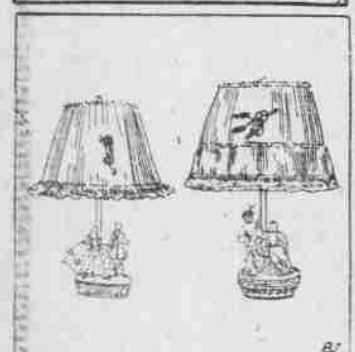
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The Home in Good Taste

No. 31—Choosing Shades for Movable Lamps.

THE lamp in a room intensifies the color note. In a dark center of a room a lamp is the center of interest and may be an handsome and rich in effect as one's purse allows. It may be of painted silk, very formal in finish, or of painted silk, parchment or vellum. But the hall be done in early Italian Renaissance or Tudor manner, real velvet is perhaps preferable, as it is rich and dignified. But the design painted upon it must adhere strictly to the period of the furniture. The same principle, of course, holds good in any room where a lamp stand. Nothing is more often neglected than attention to the detail of decoration on a lamp shade, and nothing is more important, for when lighted, the lamp in a room stands out more prominently than anything else.

In a general way it may be said that silk shades in plain colors finished with puffing, pleated ruffs or heavy fringe are the most formal. Chinese embroidery is beautiful when it can be found in tones which harmonize with the room or with the Chinese or Japanese vase which is turned into lamp bases. Parchment treated in blended color tones, with perhaps some added bands, and also formal. When decorated with old-fashioned flowers or suggestions of landscape or an old Spanish falcon and a clouded sea and sky, they give a vivid touch to the imagination.

For an Adam room, they may be decorated with Greek ornaments and two-toned medallions, and in Louis Seize rooms, rose garlands held with loops of ribbon give the final touch of French gaiety.

Household Problems

PORTLAND, Dec. 6.—Dear Miss Tingle: Would you please give a recipe for caramelized sweet potatoes? (Small quantity for two.) Thanking you, sincerely, MRS. G. R. H.

Caramelized Sweet Potatoes.
Method No. 1.—For each two medium size sweet potatoes allow one tablespoon butter, one tablespoon water and one and one-half tablespoons sugar. Wash and pare the potatoes, cook about ten minutes in boiling salted water; drain, cut in halves lengthwise and put in a buttered pan or baking dish. Roll the water, sugar and butter two or three minutes or to a heavy syrup; brush the potatoes over with the syrup and bake until tender, usually about 15 minutes—depending upon the shape and thickness of the pieces. Baste twice with the remaining syrup while baking and allow the syrup to caramelize lightly on the surface. Maple or table syrup may be used instead of the sugar syrup.

Method 2.—For each medium sized potato allow one tablespoon brown sugar, one teaspoon water, one tablespoon butter, and a few drops of lemon juice; scrub and boil the potatoes, peel and cut in lengthwise pieces or in half inch crosswise slices according to personal preference and the shape of the potato. Arrange in a baking dish, spring with the melted butter, sugar

and the water with a little lemon juice, bake until the sugar is lightly caramelized.
Method 3.—Prepare the potatoes by parboiling (either with or without their skins); when about half done, drain, peel if not previously peeled, cut in halves, quarters or slices as may seem most suitable. For each medium sized potato allow about two tablespoons water, one to two tablespoons sugar, one teaspoon butter, with or without a few drops lemon juice. Place the slices in a frying pan and simmer with the water, sugar and butter until the water is gone, then remove to the serving dish, reduce the syrup remaining in the pan to a slightly caramelized glaze and pour evenly over the potatoes.

Method 4.—Prepare as in three but use slightly diluted maple syrup or other table syrup for the final simmering of the potatoes, adding from one teaspoon to one tablespoon butter for each medium sized potato. From this you should be able to make any required quantity. The exact amount needed "for two" necessarily depends upon the appetites of the eaters, but the length of the particular menu in which the potatoes are to be served. Less sugar and butter may be used proportionately in making a larger quantity, or if a less sweet dish is preferred.

The combination of sweet potatoes with firm apples in alternate layers is a modification of method 2 which is particularly good with pork, goose or duck.

I hope the following is the recipe asked for some time ago by Mrs. M. C. Portland:

Chocolate cake—30 ladyfingers, 1 pound very choice sweet chocolate, three tablespoons sugar, three tablespoons water, vanilla flavoring, four eggs, beat the mold with greased paper and ladyfingers. Melt the chocolate over hot water with the sugar and water. Beat in the eggs, one at a time, until thickened. Fold in the stiff beaten egg whites. Arrange in alternate layers in a mold with the ladyfingers at the bottom and top. Set in the icebox until firm. Unmold and cover with piped whipped cream decorated with walnuts and cherries. For a small cake use half the above quantities. This is served as a dessert rather than as a cake.

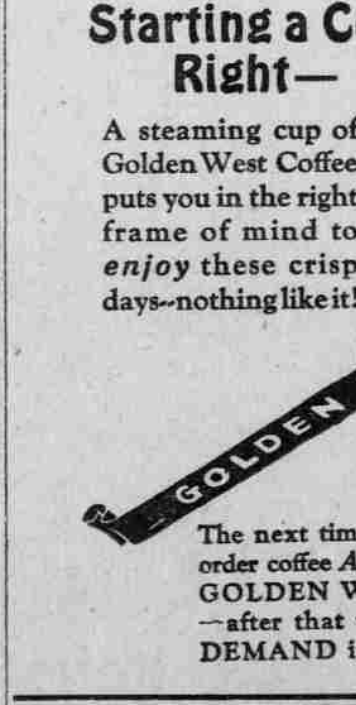
