

NUNES AND KRAMER TO BATTLE TONIGHT

Winner to Have Chance at Featherweight Title.

SOUTHPAW HAS PUNCH

Los Angeles Boxer, Protege of Lew Tendler, to Appear Here for First Time.

The final drive for the Pacific coast welterweight boxing title opens tonight at the Armory. Danny Kramer, the Los Angeles southpaw, and Danny Nunes of Sacramento, will collide in one of the final rounds of the tournament.

Nunes has won one contest in the tournament, but Kramer is facing the barrier here for the first time.

The programme is for the winner tonight to meet Weldon Wing on the next featherweight card and the winner of that argument to fight Joe Gorman on New Year's day for the title. All of which puts considerable at stake in the Nunes and Nunes meet tonight.

Nunes showed in his bout with Ad Mackle that he is a capable performer. He stepped around like one who knows what it is about and his punches have steam behind them. The question is, can he land on Southpaw Kramer?

Kramer shows Up Well. Kramer has a great skill in the gymnasium and said yesterday that he is ready for any kind of game Nunes wants, which means that Kramer will either fight or box on occasion. Nunes' most effective punches travel no more than six or eight inches.

Nunes has been training with southpaw, however, and like the southpaw's style will not bother him.

It will be the first time Portland ring followers have seen a classy left-hander in action. Kramer is said to be a pecked edition of the great Lew Tendler with whom he trained for 18 months in Philadelphia. Kramer's most effective punches travel no more than six or eight inches.

He uses what he himself terms a "delayed punch" but if it is as potent as he claims, it is a potent weapon. It is covered in that particular point, stops the punch on its way to the button or just a fraction of a second, then years it to some vulnerable spot on the body.

Nunes will have a slight weight advantage. He weighs 128 pounds, the featherweight limit, and Kramer, who really is a bantamweight, will come in at 122 or 123 pounds.

One other featherweight contest is on the card. It is between Chico Rocco and Mike De Pinto and is for six rounds. Rocco has been coming fast, won a six-round decision over Al Lupo at Aberdeen Monday night.

There are four four-round preliminaries on the card. The programme:

Tim Callahan versus Young Freddie Welsh, lightweights, four rounds.

Henry Denny versus Ed Marilla, featherweights, four rounds.

PENN STATE WORKS OUT

ELLEN HOPEFUL OF VICTORY AT PASADENA.

Pitt Defeat Fails to Shake Confidence in Ability to End Season With Laurels.

STATE COLLEGE, Pa., Dec. 12.—(Special.)—For the first time in history New Beaver deer is the scene of variety football practice after Thanksgiving day, for the Penn State gridderers are working out three days a week in preparation for the intercollegiate game at Pasadena New Year's day. Although a post-season game with the University of Washington was played last year at Seattle, the team left for the coast immediately after the turkey day battle with Pitt and did not return to practice here.

From the spirit the players are putting into their workouts this week the Pitt defeat has not shaken their confidence in their ability to end the season with a victory. With southern California representing the west in the Pasadena game, the Lions feel that they have a fighting chance to win, good as the Trojans are.

This feeling is not built on overconfidence or "cockiness," but comes largely from the belief that things must begin to break Penn State's way sooner or later. Discouragement has piled up in an unending stream all season and players and coach Beasly alike feel the winter thing must soon begin to shine through the dark clouds. Where would they be more apt to find it, they argue, than in sunny California?

There is another factor in the determination of the Nittany Lions to win that California game. The players have been so commiserated from the west in which Penn State is picked as door-mat for the coast selection to trample on. According to some California enthusiasts, the Lions will hardly afford a good practice game for any of those coast teams—or at least, this is the story that has reached Captain Nuss and his warriors.

If such an opinion is held by coast fans there may be quite a little surprise party at Pasadena January 1, 1923. True enough, the Lions have not shown the power of former years, but they have not been easy marks for the best teams in the east. Moreover, they are taking the Pasadena game very seriously indeed and have gone about their practice this week in the most earnest fashion.

In Harry Wilson, halfback, and Mike Palm, quarterback, Penn State has two of the flashiest backs in eastern college circles, stars who will give California fans a high-class exhibition of how the game is played. Wilson has shown in Beasly's backfield for two years and Hugo terms him the best halfback he ever coached. Mike Palm, the new quarterback star, found him-

TOURNEYS TO BE CUT

FEWER WOMEN TO BE ADMITTED TO PLAY.

Number of Contestants in Championship Events May Be Reduced in Future.

(By Chicago Tribune Special Wire.)

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—(Special.)—The problem of reducing the size of the field of contestants in championship tournaments in the future has arisen in women's golf just as it has in men's. One of the questions before the United States Golf association is whether to limit the field in the two tournaments it conducts for the men, the amateur and the open to those who "belong."

Reduction of the handicap limit has been the method used to diminish the number of contestants in the amateur, while arrangement for two qualifying rounds (one in the east and the other in the west, the best 75 scores and ties in each section to be eligible) is expected to bring about the desired results in the open.

Now come the women with a plan for the reduction of the field in their championship to be played at the Westchester-Biltmore Country club, Rye, N. Y., next autumn. At the annual meeting of the women's committee of the United States Golf association, held at White Sulphur Springs, Va., following the national championship tournament, plans looking forward to the 1923 tournament were discussed and announced is now made by Cornelius Lee, secretary of the United States Golf association, that in addition to the other present qualifications, the entries for next year's tourney will be restricted to women players having a handicap of 1 to 14.

HOOP FINALS NEARING CLOSE

This will include the local hoopers on the homecoming schedule of the university. Coach Foster is drilling his squad daily now and with four of last year's lettermen on the job, hopes to build up a fast, fighting aggregation that will give a good account of itself.

FOSSIL TEAM PROSPECTS GOOD.

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NEW ERA IN NORTHWEST ASSOCIATION BEGUN.

Reorganization Is Effectuated on Basis of Co-operative Executive Control.

SEATTLE, Wash., Dec. 11.—(Special.)—The Pacific Northwest Golf association decided at a meeting in the Rainier club today to shed its old clothes and start life anew. With a complete reorganization it initiated a new era in the control of the links game here in the northwest.

Eighteen delegates, representing the prominent clubs of the entire northwest, attended the session. The old organization, perfected at Victoria, following the northwest tournament last June, was dissolved at the outset of the parley. Most of the work of the association has been transacted in the past by the secretary-treasurer, but friends and sponsors of golf felt that the game has grown beyond one-man control and desired reorganization on the basis of co-operative executive control.

The personnel of the new executive board of directors follows: A. S. Kerry, Seattle Golf club, president; W. J. Halloran, Salt Lake Country club, vice-president; Dr. C. B. Ford, Inglewood Country club, secretary; Major F. Wallaston, Victoria Golf club, treasurer; Dr. Thomas W. Watts, Portland Golf club; Harry Davis, Waverley Country club; Nell Jameson, Spokane Country club; McManah Vancouver Golf and Country club, and E. Demarest, Tacoma Golf and Country club, directors.

Following the election of officers several hours were spent in the adoption of a new constitution and by-laws, combining the best of the old pact with a composite transcript of the United States Golf association laws and rules.

The board of directors will henceforth have on the tournament plums. Many other problems will come up for its decision, chief of which are the determination of fees, whether the club or the association shall buy the tournament trophies, and eligibility of doubtful players.

The delegates did take one affirmative action yesterday for the good of the game, and that was to abolish the "Calcutta pool." Under a resolution adopted that gambling stunt is expressly forbidden. The disbanding of George Von Elm, northwest amateur champion, by the United States Golf association was discussed at the meeting, although no action was taken on the matter. While no opinions were expressed, the men intimated their sympathy was with Von Elm.

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The receipts must go to the aid of some fund of national importance; the contest must be organized by the federation and financially controlled by representatives of the fund; all monies collected, including the sums from photographic and moving picture rights, shall be paid over to the fund. The only deductions permitted will be for rent of the hall, unless, as is hoped, the hall will be given free, and the expense of attendants.

There will be no free seats. The members of the federation, officials, referees, judges, timekeepers, seconds, managers, boxers and reporters must all pay an admission fee. The federation also makes it a condition that Siki appear before a judicial committee and justify the charges he has made. It has further been decided that all persons holding a license from the federation who refuse to appear and testify or to produce documents asked, shall be liable to disciplinary action, even to the extent of withdrawal of their license.

Basketball Facts.

Q. What is the difference between the amateur and professional dribble rule?

ball must be passed or try at goal made before dribbling again. Professional rules permit dribbling with two hands and stopping and starting at will.

Q. If a player in the act of shooting is fouled, if the goal is made, shall it count?

A. Yes. Both in amateur and professional ball, the goal counts.

Q. What must be the position of feet when jumping in center?

A. According to amateur rules both men must have both feet in the center circle. The professional rules make each man who is to jump two a line with the forward foot, which is 12 inches long and three feet apart.

Q. According to the rules, must players wear numbers?

A. The amateur rules make it compulsory to wear numbers at least six inches high. Most professional teams wear them, but according to the rules it is not necessary.

Q. How many personal fouls does it take to disqualify a player from an amateur game?

A. Four personal fouls automatically disqualifies a player from the game.
