LONDON, Dec. 21.—(By the Associated Press)—The British and American principal tennis players nations meeting here agreed today to standardization of the rules of the game. A new international football rule was adopted, and this also is substantially the same as that effective in the United States.

The delegates adopted the English standard of size and weight, which varies but slightly from that obtaining in the United States. The United States Lawn Tennis association requires that the balls shall measure not less than 2-1/16 inches in diameter and shall weigh not less than 2 ounces nor more than 2-1/16 ounces.

When W. H. MacMaster, principal of the Corvallis high school, had given up hope of signing for the game because of the opposition in Portland had failed last week to raise its share of a guarantee demanded by the eastern eleven.
