

# TV TIME PREVIEWS

TV Time critics preview coming television shows by attending rehearsals, watching screenings, analyzing scripts in New York and Hollywood. Here are there previews for today:

(1) 7:30-8:30 (Ch. 2) ABC MATT LINCOLN "Lord" This tale of the weird far-out life style in a hippie commune may not be as graphic and factual as the real thing, but it does bring to life much of what we have been reading about recently. Lincoln has traced a retarded teenage girl to such a place and finds her suffering from a drug overdose. The community's self-styled leader is used to meeting danger and adversity and running from it, which is what he intends doing now. Taking Lincoln as captive, he packs up his group and prepares to depart as though simple flight could be a cure. Andrew Prine and Arthur Franz star.

(1) 7:30-8:30 (Ch. 8) NBC THE FLIP WILSON SHOW The styles of both Robert Goulet and Lola Falana seem well suited to the atmosphere of this show, while that of comedian Herbert Klein might be better showcased elsewhere. Goulet sings "You'd Better Love Me" and "My Woman, My Woman, My Wife" and later joins Miss Falana and Flip in a comedy routine to "That's What I Should Have Said." "Freddie Johnson, Swinging Bachelor" is again brought to life by Flip while Lola's musical feature is a medley of Beatles' songs.

8:30-9:30 (Ch. 8) NBC IRONSIDE "Check, Mate and Murder" (PART TWO) While the Montreal gathering of criminologist is trying to help that city's police solve the murder of one of their number, a militant group of separatists is planning a bombing. Naturally, Chief Ironside is right in the middle of all the activity, and right next to him is mystery authoress Ernestine Mugford who is more interested in his activities than anything else. Hermione Gingold stars.

9-11 (Ch. 6) CBS THE THURSDAY NIGHT MOVIE "The Shuddered Room" Gig Young and Carol Lynley star in this ghost story that comes right out of stock. Despite the lack of originality, it is well photographed, chilling and not for the faint of heart. Our stars are the usual young couple who have inherited a house located in a dismal, depressing countryside from where even the birds seem to have flown. Again, in typical fashion, they are warned by the local people to stay away from the house, but are too courageous, or foolish, from whichever point you ascribe. Oliver Reed and Flora Robson are featured.

10-11 (Ch. 2) ABC THE IMMORTAL "White Horse, Steel Horse" If this series keeps coming up with chase scripts like this one, it is going to chase itself right off the small screen. It has our hero (Christopher George) working on a farm where he strikes up a friendship with a couple of young motorcyclists. When one kills a sheriff, the three are accused, and when they flee are hotly pursued by a posse that wants only blood.

(1) 10-11 (Ch. 8) NBC THE DEAN MARTIN SHOW Old Dean really mixes it up tonight with another cast that can take a prize for diversity. Ernest Borgnine leads the list, followed by the Everly Brothers, Sugar Ray Robinson and Alan Sues. Who said never mix apples and pears? Borgnine does that in a comedy bit that has Alan as the too-helpful victim of a holdup man. In another, the two, with Dean and Robinson, are Roman gladiators in a fashion sequence. Despite all the comedy, the musical features predominate, including "Mama Tried" by the Brothers, Dean's "Little Bit South of North Carolina" and "A Couple of Song and Dance Men" by Dean and Sugar.

(1) 7:30-8:30 (Ch. 6) CBS THE INTERNS Mike Farrell as Dr. Sam Marsh (the married one) gets the major role tonight in a script that has the whole staff desperately trying to locate the source of a threatening epidemic. Dr. Marsh has a particular interest since his wife is one of the first to come down with the disease, along with another patient, who turns out to be the man wanted in an assault on Mrs. Marsh. Malachi Throne and Mills Watson are featured.

8:30-10 (Ch. 8) NBC THE NAME OF THE GAME "Little Bear Died Running" Robert Culp shows up as a reporter for People Magazine who is intrigued by a murder mystery. A young Indian boy has killed a long-time friend, the son of a former Senator. But the boy refuses to say why he did it. When the magazine assigns Culp to investigate, he goes to the New Mexican locale and finds that the silence of the lad, who had since been killed by a sheriff's posse, has not infected the rest of the town. A well-rounded featured cast includes Slim Pickens, Edgar Buchanan, Steve Forrest, Dean Jagger and Simon Oakland.

(1) 9-9:30 (Ch. 2) ABC THAT GIRL "There Sure Are a Bunch of Cards in St. Louis" (PART TWO) Stan Musial gets his first guest shot in a TV series in the concluding episode of this two-parter. The double premise is Anne Marie's visit to St. Louis for a part in a play and to meet her fiancé's parents. But the big meeting takes place when she dines at Musial's restaurant and meets the great man himself. Incidentally, although it looks like a location shot, it's actually a fine reproduction of the St. Louis restaurant, located on the Cinema General lot in Hollywood.

9-11:30 (Ch. 6) CBS THE FRIDAY NIGHT MOVIES "One-Eyed Jacks" (1961) (REPEAT) Marlon Brando starred in and directed this so-called combination of mystery, adventure and romance, which unfortunately

9:30-10 (Ch. 2) ABC LOVE, AMERICAN STYLE When Vincent Price guests on a TV series, you can expect an over-tone of the eerie, as in "Love and the Haunted House." Ruth Buzzi shares the chills as his fiancée who finds refuge in the creaky place during a storm, and finds it inhabited by several spirits and one human being, a justice of the peace. In the second segment, Pat Paulsen finds himself engaged to two girls, both of whom meet him in a bridal shop for a fitting.

(1) 10-11 (Ch. 2) ABC THIS IS TOM JONES The combination of Perry Como and Debbie Reynolds on the Jones bash, makes for a memorable evening. There is tremendous contrast between the extroverted and introverted styles of the two guests and the bombastic gyrations of the Jones. Perry gets sentimental singing "Father of Girls" and, with Patti Deutsch, "The Men in My Little Girl's Life," with a dash of comedy added. Debbie displays her energies singing a rock medley and joins Tom for "Twenty Mile Zone." Tom's feature in his concert spot is "What the World Needs Now" and "See Saw."

## Medical record technicians score in exams

For the second time in two years, Portland Community College graduates in medical record technology have scored exceptionally high on the national accreditation examination.

This year's graduating class scored 119.6 correct answers out of 150 questions, against a national average of 101.6.

Last year's group scored 119.5 correct answers against a national average of 100.2.

Every single one of the 35 persons so far graduated from the PCC classes has passed the accreditation examination.

The examination is administered by the American Medical Record Association.

Miss Beverly Hooten is the PCC coordinator for the Medical Record Technology program, which prepares personnel for the exacting task of handling, filing, finding, and maintaining complex medical records.

## Tongue Point girls speak at luncheon



Two charming representatives of the Tongue Point Job Corps Center spoke at a luncheon meeting Saturday, October 30, at Bethel A.M.E. Church.

Carolina Senchez, "Miss Tongue Point," and Barbara Roundtree, Student Government Director, gave their impressions of the Job Corps Center and what it has meant to them to be enrolled there as students.

Barbara, whose home is in Orlando, Florida, is studying business and clerical work. She has been at the Center for three months, and plans on going on with specialized training in office procedures.

Carolina, from El Paso, Texas, has been at Tongue Point for ten months. She is also enrolled in business and clerical studies. She plans on graduating in January, and will return home to do further studying toward becoming a bi-lingual secretary. She speaks Spanish, and has a low, soft, voice, and very expressive eyes which accent her words.

Both girls are enthusiastic about the training they are receiving, and both made the point that the opportunity is there for Job Corps girls to take advantage of, if they are willing to work and take their courses seriously. They expressed their appreciation of the opportunities given them to date, and are planning on using their Tongue Point training as a stepping-stone to future careers.

Seven hundred and forty-six girls are enrolled at Tongue Point Center at present. Training is offered in business and clerical, electronics, drafting, health and executive housekeeping.

The girls were accompanied to Portland by Harriet Waddy, a member of the Tongue Point Job Corps Center administrative staff.
