Become a Homeowner

Through the initiative of the Highland Church of Christ in N.E. Portland, and other interested churches, there are new opportunities for low income families to become homeowners. The Rev. Sam Johnson and other interested citizens of the Greater Portland area have implemented the Highland United Improvement Corporation. This is a non-profit housing organization which attempts to aid low income families who never before have been able to get a home financing loan.

Highland United Improvement Corp. buys older houses, rehabilitates them, and puts them on sale for low income buyers on a 30 year mortgage.

Anyone who is eligible for public housing accommodation or whose annual adjusted income is 135% of Public Housing income limits (235 j) qualifies to be a home owner through the Highland United Improvement Corp.

A down payment of \$250.00 is required of the homeowner before moving in. Also, attendance of five pre-purchase seminars is required. The seminars are designed to inform the homeowner of his rights and obligations.

Highland United Improvement Corp. is a 'non profit organization working with the Church and through the Church.' Located at 4635 NE 9th Ave. in Portland, the Corporation's goals are to help low income families to up-grade themselves and their Northeast community.

Teacher Invited to White House

Miss Suzanne Flores, third grade teacher at Lewis Elementary School, flew to Washington, D.C. Saturday morning to attend the 1970 White House Conference on Children. The conference was held December 13 through 18.

The Portland teacher received an engraved invitation from the White House to be an official delegate to the conference. She was recommended by the National Association of Classroom Teachers following her participation last summer in a national study group.

The White House Conference on Children has been held at

ten-year intervals since 1909. This year the conference will revolve around 24 forums that will study a broad range of concerns relating to children from preschool through thirteen years of age. Each forum will have 16 members.

The conference will also include presentations on Sesame Street, NET program for children; films by children from the Yellowball Workshop; and showings from the International Festival of Films for Children.

Miss Flores is the only teacher from the Portland Public Schools invited to attend the conference.

Portland School Dist. received \$500,000

Portland Community College today paid the Portland School District \$500,000, as the second payment for facilities taken over by the College when it separated from the district.

The College board of directors approved the payment at their meeting on the Mt. Sylvania campus.

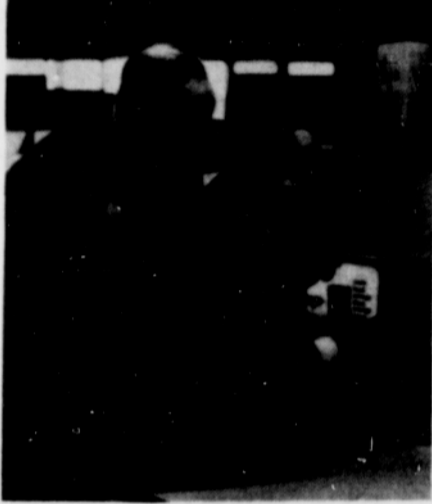
The agreement, reached when the College district became autonomous, calls for the payment of about \$3.5 million over a five-year period.

Facilities include the 125-acre Mt. Sylvania campus and the District investment in PCC buildings in both Phase I and Phase II, recently completed; and Failing Hall, in downtown Portland.

Shattuck Hall, PCC's other main downtown operating base, in the Park Blocks next to Portland State University, has been sold by the Portland School District to Portland State University. PCC is expected to transfer most of its Shattuck operation to its new Cascade educational center in Northeast Portland, in facilities of the defunct Cascade College which PCC has obtained on a purchase agreement with the City of Portland and its Model Cities program.

Besides the Phase I and II buildings at Mt. Sylvania, representing about \$9.5 million in construction and equipment costs, the College has a new Health Sciences building under way, with construction to be completed in 1972 at costs of about \$4.7 million, and is planning a Communications Building, a Performing Arts Building

and a Maintenance Technology Building to complete the Mt. Sylvania campus facilities.
