Fraud Connected Unemployment Insurance Benefits

SALEM - (Special) - Fraud in connection with unemployment insurance benefits and taxes was kept to a minimum during the fourth quarter of 1970, even though claims were more numerous this year because of the high unemployment, the Employment Division reported here. The low incidence of fraudulent claims continued and was possible because of the constant vigilance of local office claims personnel, the Fraud Investigation unit of the Benefits section and by Tax Section auditors, the Division said.

Fourth quarter fraud control activity brought recommendations, for prosecution of 13 new cases, bringing the total number of cases to 47. The cases recommended for prosecution were less than one-tenth of one percent of the total number of claim determinations made during the fourth quarter, the Employment Division said.

Ten cases were completed during the quarter with these results: two convictions and two dismissals in Multnomah county; one conviction in Marion county; one conviction in Deschutes county; one conviction in Josephine county; one conviction in Douglas county; one dismissal in Clatsop county and one

conviction in Wasco county.

The courts ordered restitution in six cases; imposed fines ranging from \$100 to \$150 in two cases; set probationary periods of from six months to three years in seven cases; ordered one 30-day sentence suspended; ordered one 10-day sentence suspended; imposed one 30-day sentence; imposed another 30 days of a six-month sentence and imposed a one-day

sentence in one case.

A total of 154 determinations were written in which 1,705 calendar weeks were disqualified for willful false statements or misrepresentation in order to obtain unemployment insurance benefits. During the fourth quarter \$18,738.45 was recovered by the Employment Division in overpayment and during 1970 a total of \$62,887.29 was recovered.
