## Victory for Oregon

Oregonians have been assured a north-south rail passenger Transporation Secretary John A. Volpe.

"This is a tremendously important victory for Oregonians and the entire West Coast," Senator Packwood said after a special briefing for Congressmen on the National Rail passenger Corporation (Railpax) plan Jan. 28.

"There will be a direct route stretching from Seattle through Portland and other major cities to San Diego. And, in addition, Portland will serve as an intermediate point in the east-west track from Chicago to Seattle," he said.

This means that an Oregonian wishing to travel from Portland goir g to Seattle, though he may ha. e to switch trains at Spokane before going directly to Chicago. However, if Portland had not been in the system, you might have been lucky if a passenger train was still running in Oregon.



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
