Dr. Wayson is donating her time, professional skills, and warm personality in order to give each of the 450 pupils in the E.C.E. program her personal attention and a complete physical again this year.

One of the advantages to this system is that the children, some times for the first time in memory, meet a doctor in a familiar environment where they have been having happy experiences and think of seeing the doctor as having a field trip at school. Each child's parents are encouraged to be with him to provide information for the doctor, assist in the exam, and add extra security for the child. Anthropologist chosen

Dr. Wayne Suttles, chairman of the anthropology department at Portland State University, has been chosen as one of the editors of a "Handbook of North American Indians" to be published by the Center for the Study of Man at the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C.

To contain approximately 17 volumes and with a projected publication date of 1976, the "Handbook" will be the first such reference compiled since a two-volume edition was published in 1907 and 1910, according to Dr. Suttles.

The long overdue "Handbook," the anthropologist said, will be of great value to Indians and non Indians alike because its encyclopedic nature will make it easier for more people to learn more about North American Indians.

While there is a vast amount of available in monographs, scholarly journals, university series and government publication, Dr. Suttles pointed out that these materials don't exist in every library and when they do, they are often difficult to locate.

The "Handbook" will cover all bands and tribes of Indians and Eskimos in the ten major culture areas in North Mexico, the United States and Canada. Articles will describe the prehistory of an area, the native culture at the time of arrival of Europeans, the cultural changes since that arrival and current contemporary social, economic and cultural conditions.

Dr. Suttles will edit a volume on the "Northwest Coast Culture Area," which he said will include between 30 and 40 distinctly different "tribes" speaking about 30 different languages and located along the coast of British Columbia, Washington and Oregon between the Alaskan Panhandle and the Oregon-California state line.

Prior to his joining the PSU anthropology department in 1966, Dr. Suttles taught at the University of Nevada & the University of British Columbia. A recognized authority on the culture and ecology of the Northwest Coast and Coast Salish language and culture, Dr. Suttles has written a number of articles on these subjects.
