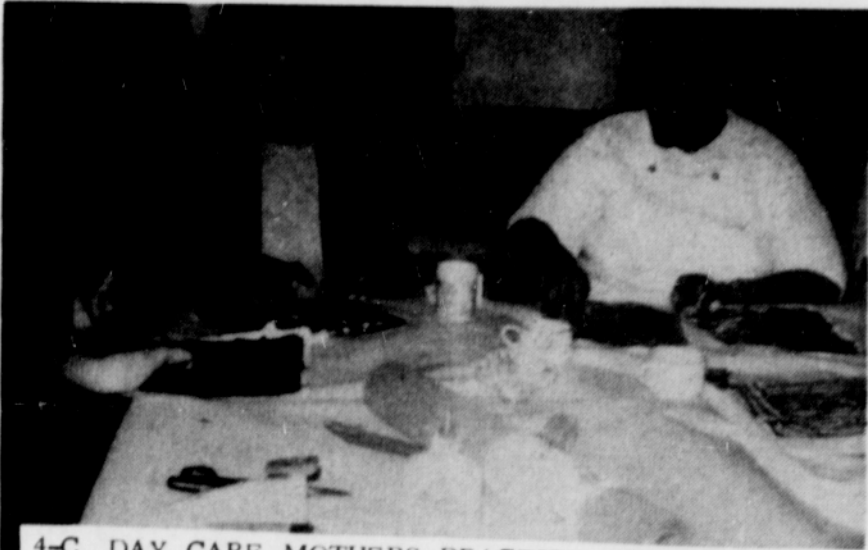


Family Day And Night Care Program

The Family Day and Night Care Program (Model Cities) of the Metropolitan Area 4-C Council held its second training session for new Day Care Mothers at Highland Community Center on March 10-12th. During the first session, Dr. Mary Stanger, pediatrician from the University of Oregon Medical School spoke of child development, common illnesses of children, and preventive medicine. Mrs. Susan Dietche, Vice-chairman of the Metropolitan Area 4-C Council's Board of Directors, explained the history, purpose, administration and funding of 4-C (Community Coordinated Child Care).

On Thursday, J. Alton Page, Director of the Oregon Consumer League Model Cities Office, and Mrs. Betty Bradlyn, Education Coordinator for that program, discussed the Oregon Consumer problems, and low cost buying. Mrs. Betty Jones and Mrs. Riley from the State Extension Service's Expanded Nutrition Program, discussed the nutritional needs of young children. Bert Lolley social worker for the Family Day and Night Care Program, explained the roles of the parent, day care parent, and social worker in day care.

Mrs. Joyce Veterane brought suggestions for educational play for young children. Under her direction, the Day Care Mothers made playdoh and fingerpaint and displayed their own paintings and sculpture.

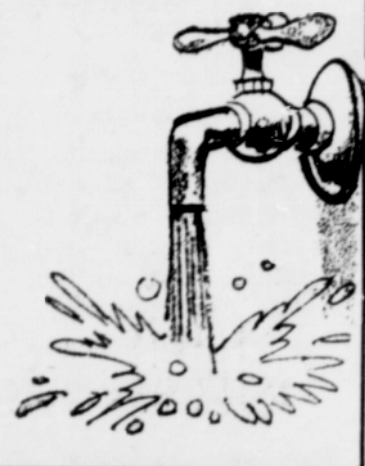
In Friday's session, Mrs. Whitelaw from Family Counseling and Mrs. Ora Nunn, Supervisor of the Homemaker Service for the 4-C Information and Referral Center,

explained the homemaker program as it relates to 4-C.

Day Care Mothers care for children in their homes under the supervision of 4-C. They receive \$3.50 per child per day. Persons interested in becoming Day Care Mothers may call 288-5091.

Child care is provided free for children of low and moderate income families in the Model Cities area. Families in the area. Families in the upper brackets are charged a small fee. 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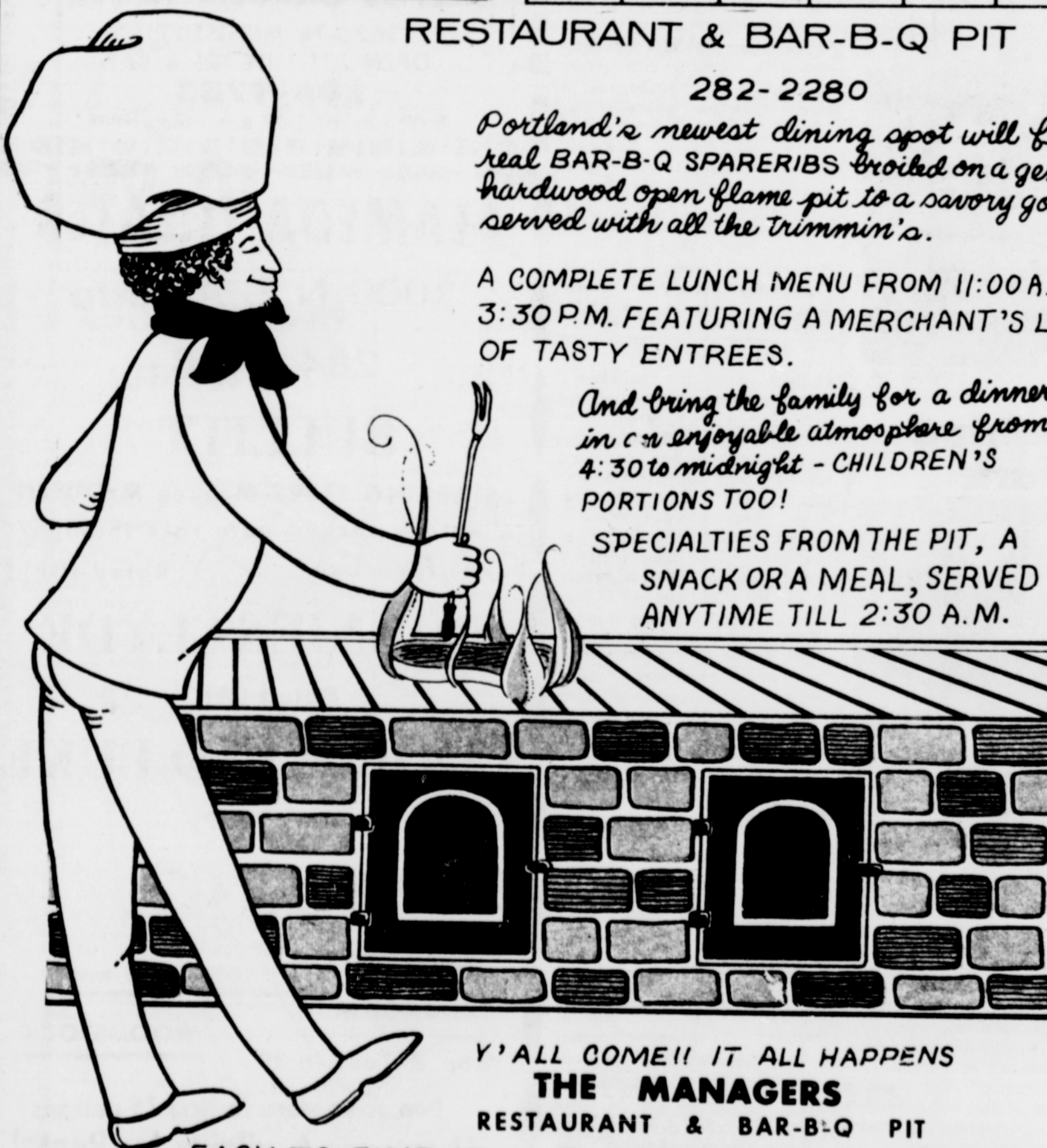
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
