State employment

SALEM-- (Special) -- Average hourly earnings of Oregon's manufacturing production workers reached a new high in Feb., at \$3.99 per hour compared with \$3.96 in Jan. and \$3.73 in Feb., 1970, the Employment Division's Research and Statistics section reported here today. Also the average workweek for the state's manufacturing workers increased from 37.0 hours per week in January to 39.2 hours per week in February and compared with 38.7 hours per week in February, 1970, the Employment Division said.

Pickup in seasonal, wood products and construction industries was the reason attributed to the increased workweek.

In the lumber and wood products industry, the workweek in February averaged 40.3 hours per week compared with 37.3 hours per week in January and

39.5 hours per week in February, 1970.

The workweek average hours increased in all categories of the wood products industry from Jan.

to February and over the year ago February figures, including Logging and Sawmills; Veneer and Plywood and other Wood Products.

In the construction industry the workweek increased from 29.5 hours per week in January to 35.7 hours in February, compared with 35.6 hours per week in Feb. 1970.

At the same time the hourly earnings of construction workers dropped from \$6.34 per hour in January to \$6.25 per hour in February and compared with \$5.78 per hour in February, 1970.

Infections Hepatitis increasing

Dr. Walter A Goss, M.D. Multnomah County Health Officer announced today that Infectious Hepatitis is increasing in Multnomah County.

"During the first ten weeks of 1971 for Multnomah County there have been 72 cases of Hepatitis reported as compared to 62 for 1970 during the same period," reported Dr. Goss.

In Multnomah County for 1970 there were 346 cases of infectious hepatitis reported, as compared to 1969 rate was 41.3 cases per 100,000 population as compared to a national average of 24.0 cases per 100,000 for the same period.

The 1970 rate in Multnomah County was 62.2 cases per 100,000.

1969 was the latest year for high incidence of the disease, locally as well as nationally.

Infectious Hepatitis cases for 1971 are expected to exceed the 346 cases reported in 1970 for Multnomah County based upon the epidemic cycle for Hepatitis.

Hepatitis means "inflammation of the liver", and infectious hepatitis is a common communicable disease thought to be due to a virus.

The majority of the cases are mild and unrecognized, especially in children.

Adults experience the disease less frequently but are likely to suffer its effects more seriously.

In some cases the disease produces fever, loss of appetite, nausea and listlessness.

Jaundice, a yellowing of the skin and the whites of the eyes, sometimes occurs.

Hepatitis is transmitted by fecal-oral route.

The infectious agent may be found in feces and urine.

The disease is best prevented from spreading by establishing good personal hygiene habits.....

washing the hands carefully after going to the bath room, before eating and by using separate towels.

Those infected with infectious hepatitis should use separate clothing bedding, wash cloths and towels.

These articles must be handled carefully and washed thoroughly, preferably in a separate laundry load.

The patient should use his own eating utensils which should be disposable or washed separately.

He should wash his hands vigorously before eating with other family members.

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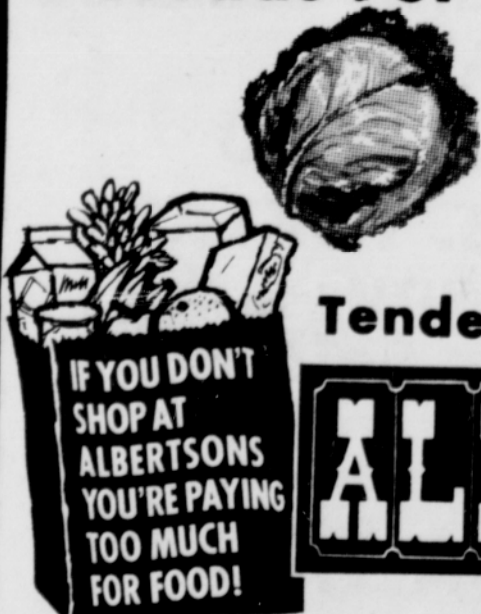
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
