The contest and the reading of the papers was a feature of the state convention of OSRT, in Lincoln City, April 15 - 18.

Two Portland Community College radiologic technology students have won top awards for scientific papers from the Oregon Society of Radiologic Technologists.

Matt Lang, a native of Samoa and resident in Portland while studying, won first award for his paper on thoracic spine radiography, and Paula Jensen, of Albany, took second honors with her paper on radiation safety.

Governor McCall proclaimed the week of April 12-17 as Oregon State Radiologic Technologists Week as further recognition of the growing importance of radiologic technology to the health and safety of Oregon citizens.

Douglas Millican, a PCC biology instructor who teaches in the radiologic technology program, was also a speaker at the convention.

Two concerned volunteers from this area will represent United Cerebral Palsy Association of Northwest Oregon at the National Organization's Annual meeting in Denver, Colorado, April 29 - May 1.

Dr. Richard Mathewson, state President, announced today that he and Mrs. Gary L. Borter, Women's committee chairman for the local affiliate, have been delegated to be the representatives of this area to meet with Cerebral Palsy leaders from nearly 300 state and local affiliates across the country.

Six hundred conferees will discuss ways of harnessing the cooperative efforts of Federal, State and local governments, plus other voluntary agencies and the economy's private sector to implement UCPA's service program for the nation's Cerebral Palsied population.

"Citizen Advocacy," a concept based on a one-to-one relationship between a competent volunteer and a handicapped individual, will be one of the major conference highlights. It will be the subject of the second Dr. Meyer Perlstein lecture to be given by Wolf Wolfensberger, PH.D., from the University of Nebraska college of medicine.

For many adults with Cerebral Palsy, the "Citizen Advocacy" concept could represent a personalized approach for providing appropriate life-long protective services.

The national organization will present its highest scientific honor, the UCP- Max Weinstein award to Dr. Kenneth Ryan of the university of California school of medicine, San Diego.

Dr. Alan F. Guttmacher will discuss family planning's contribution to lessening Cerebral abnormalities at one of the conference luncheons.

A special Saturday afternoon youth program, conducted by young UCP volunteers, will concentrate on recruiting and committing the youth of the 70's to the organization's drive to meet the multitude of services that are required by its target population. This will mark the first time that an organized youth department will be represented at a UCPA annual meeting.

This 22nd annual meeting will also include important organizational self study sessions in order to better meet the quality of services which will enable more Cerebral Palsied individuals to enjoy first class citizenship status that should be their birthrights.

Dr. Howard Cherry, Multnomah County Representative, who carried the bill on the floor pointed out that it is important that every property owner has the right to purchase protection for his property and that he is able to purchase this protection at reasonable rates.

The bill does not provide crime insurance (robbery, burglary, theft) in that it is believed that this type of protection will be available because of a recently passed federal law scheduled to go into effect August 1 of this year.

The Fair Plan legislation was followed by House action on a second bill which makes an unfair trade practice of discrimination in terms, conditions or granting of insurance policies for buildings, businesses or dwellings based solely on geographical location within a single municipality.
