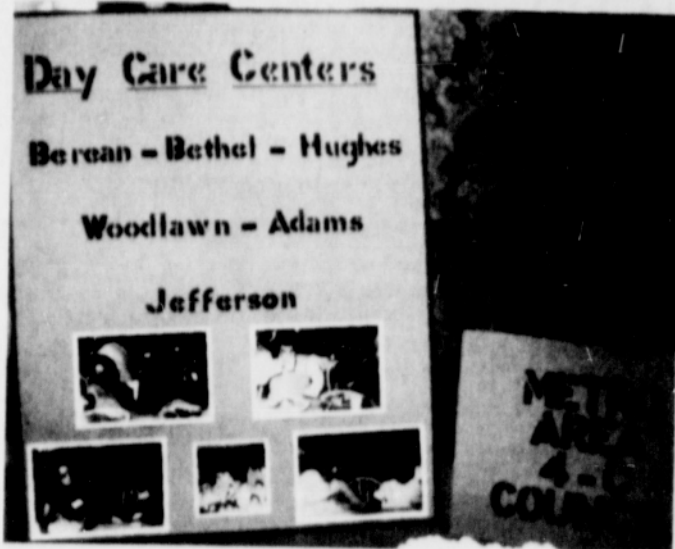

EX - SERVICEMEN to get training

Between 1,000 to 1,600 soon to be discharged servicemen will get civilian job orientation at Fort Bliss, Texas, as an experiment by the Labor Department to see if it should be widely adopted, Secretary of Labor J. D. Hodgson said today.

The Labor Department's Manpower Administration is providing nearly \$15,000 for the year-long pilot project called "World of Work."

It will provide servicemen with a total of 16 hours of instruction, four hours each, on:

- How to choose a career
- How to negotiate with employer
- How to look for a job
- "World of Work" projects are being readied as pilot projects for the Air Force, Marines, and Navy for operation within the next few months.

The pilot project is part of the Transition Program which provides servicemen and opportunity to learn job skills so that they may be able to find suitable employment as a civilian.

The job orientation classes are not linked to the job skills training program. "World of Work" will reach servicemen during their last few weeks of service.

Transition is operated jointly by the Departments of Defense, Health, Education and Welfare, and Labor.

The Kentucky Commission on Human Rights is supplying the names, areas of study and backgrounds of all of this year's black graduating seniors at the states' colleges and universities to school officials and to business and industry in Kentucky. Manpower graduate

The 1st graduation ceremony for Portland Residential Manpower Center students was held Wednesday, May 26, at 3:00 P.M. on the campus at Springdale, near Corbett, on the Sandy river.

Approximately 81 young men and women will be graduated. Of these, 46 will receive high school diplomas and 35 will have certificates of completion. The diplomas and certificates will be in blue folders with white satin linings and red tabs, following the school's red, white and blue colors.

The speaker was Clay Myers, secretary of state for Oregon. The center enrolled its first students on March 9, 1970, when about 25 young women moved into Victoria Hall, the girls' dormitory, and started classes. About the same number of young men joined the student body in April 1970, moving into the Springdale campus.

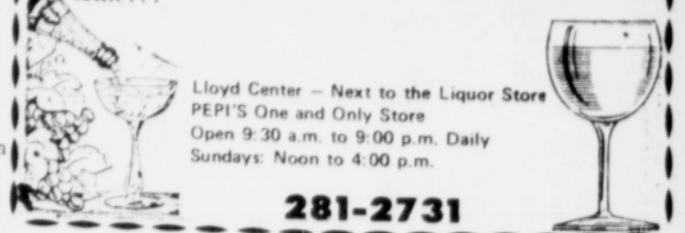
Total authorized number of students has been 225, receiving training in such fields as business, health, mechanics, agro-business, home economics, driver training, and basic education.

Black Women's Unity Drive

The National Council of Negro Women recently launched a "Black Women's Unity Drive" with Miss Ruby Dee, famed Broadway and Movie actress as the national chairman. The Drive was authorized by the heads of the 25 national affiliate organizations which comprise the National Council. The Women's Missionary Society of the African Methodist Episcopal Church is one of the affiliates and a part of the estimated four million black women in this country who recognize the power of united action. Direct involvement in the National Council provides a strong link for black women in all walks of life, from urban as well as rural communities, to speak with a united voice. It is intended by the Drive to make the nation feel the impact of our power working across the nation for quality education, putting an end to hunger, achieving an adequate income for every family, providing decent housing for low-income families.

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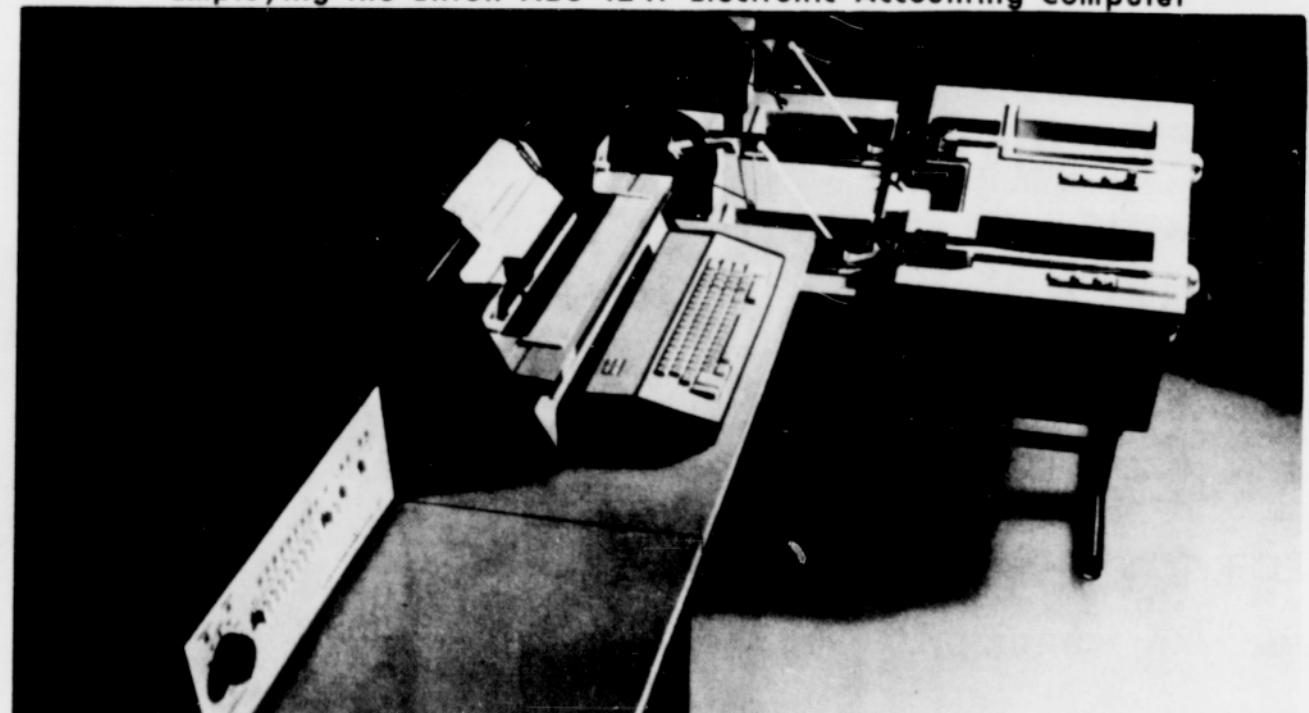
