## Kinsey hot line

With adjournment almost in sight, the Oregon Legislature is making decisions on major legislation each day and calendars in both the House and the Senate are full.

The House has voted 43-17 to adopt the Senate-passed Criminal Code revision (Senate Bill 40) which represents the first complete overhaul of the Oregon Criminal Code since 1864. This revision was drawn up over a four-year period by a commission composed of lawyers, laymen, legislators, district attorneys and judges, and seeks to more clearly spell out and define the law. Prior to its passage in the House the bill was amended in the House Judiciary Committee to remove controversial wiretapping provisions so that the law remains unchanged in this regard, wiretapping only being allowed with court approval when the public safety or national security are endangered.

The revision of the Criminal Code has produced more mail than almost any other issue during this session, but a careful study of the provisions of the new code reveals that most of these expressed concerns are unfounded. There are no substantive changes as far as self-defense is concerned, but there is a strengthening of obscenity laws involving minors, for instance. The new code creates three classes of felonies and three classes of misdemeanors, each crime having its own specific classification and penalty in order to make sentencing more uniform.

It concurred with Senate amendments to HB 1485 which deals with the impounding of the car of a drunken driver, and passed SB 54 which says that if a driver has up to .15 of 1 per cent alcohol in his blood he is to be jailed for not less than six days.

In addition, the educators and political leaders discussed the use of Emergency School Assistance funds, and the need for more effective enforcement of federal school desegregation guidelines. Also discussed were the difficulties involved in monitoring the proper use of federal funds for education.

Rep. Hawkins told the educators he was aware of and sensitive to the "very difficult problems" faced by black educators in the South and added, "It is my hope that the Mondale Bill, passed by the Senate, will provide certain remedies and safeguards to improve the situation."

## JOBS FOR VETERANS

The Assembly Hall of the Civic Center, was the location for a new concept in career guidance and counseling on Thursday May 27, in co-operation with the Mayor's office private enterprise and state and private schools, and employment services combined their efforts to help veterans find ways to help themselves toward re-orientating themselves to civilian life and/or find new careers with better opportunities.

For this effort around a hundred private as well as federal organizations were represented. This being the first program of its type in the Portland area, the opinions were varied concerning its effectiveness in reaching the people intended.

Dick Rieken, Co-ordinator for this program, stated that it "is intended to help the man help himself, with particular emphasis to give help to the unemployed before service." He along with Craig Bateman, were elated at the response of the industries and agencies represented, and also the number of Veterans who attended. Rieken when asked if this was just a one day affair, stated that this program was a kick-off for a weekly series of career development programs for Veterans at the Bank of California Tower starting on June 1.

In talking with some of the representatives, there was a general feeling that more people could have been reached.

Wilson Walker of Mt. Hood Community College, stated that it (the program) was a step in the right direction. He also hoped that black veterans would not feel that this program is geared to "white only."

Ben Langston, who represented GAF Corp., felt that the response was average. When asked about what most vets were interested in knowing about, he replied, "The people are mostly interested in jobs and not careers!"

Tony Turner, representative of the U. S. Coast Guard, said "I think it's a tremendous opportunity for this city..." He was one of the opinion that the program was quite successful for its first stage.

The one point that was mostly stressed was that this program was not a "job fair" but an opportunity for Veterans to learn about careers and training that they might not have heard about or knew existed.

The out-come and success of this program cannot yet be gauged. However, it is hoped by the Coordinators that the weekly guidance session will prove of most benefit to the Vets.
