Two New Black

Political Publications

The Drummer, a newspaper designed to serve the black community of Mississippi, has begun publication in Jackson. Editor Steve Wilson, formerly a New York newspaperman, said that the new journal will be distributed across the state, particularly in those countries where blacks are running for local political office. Drummer is now being published bi-weekly but Wilson hopes that circulation will grow large enough for the paper to become a weekly. The first two issues have focused on the state-wide campaign of Charles Ever, the black activists who is running for governor. (The Drummer, 128 1/2 Gallatin Street, Jackson, Miss.)

The Voter Education Project and Clark College's Southern Center for Studies in Public Policy are co-operating in operating a research and technical assistance center for black elected officials of Georgia. The Georgia Service Center for Elected Officials provides the states black legislators with a staff for secretarial and research assistance. The Center also has a publication for black elected officials, Reporter which began in April. (Antonio L. Thomas, director, Georgia Service Center for Elected Officials, Clark College, Atlanta, Ga.)

School district denies charges of poor election campaign

P.C.C. Summer registration open

Although all registration is centered at the Mt. Sylvania campus on Monday, June 21, classes will be in operation at the Failing Building, at the Air Base Center, and at the Multnomah Building.

Classes begin Tuesday, June 22; last day to register and add classes will be Friday, June 25. Classes are being offered for an eleven-week session this summer, rather than the more usual eight weeks. End of eleven-week session will come on Friday, Sept. 3.

Registration for courses in the eleven-week summer session at Portland Community College will open at the Mt. Sylvania Campus on Monday, June 21. Returning students who have already pre-registered will be processed then, starting at 9:30 a.m. and continuing till 11:30 a.m. Open registration will begin at 1 p.m. and continue till 8:30 p.m. with the admission procedure closing at 8:00 p.m. for anyone not already started through the process.

Concern for Elderly

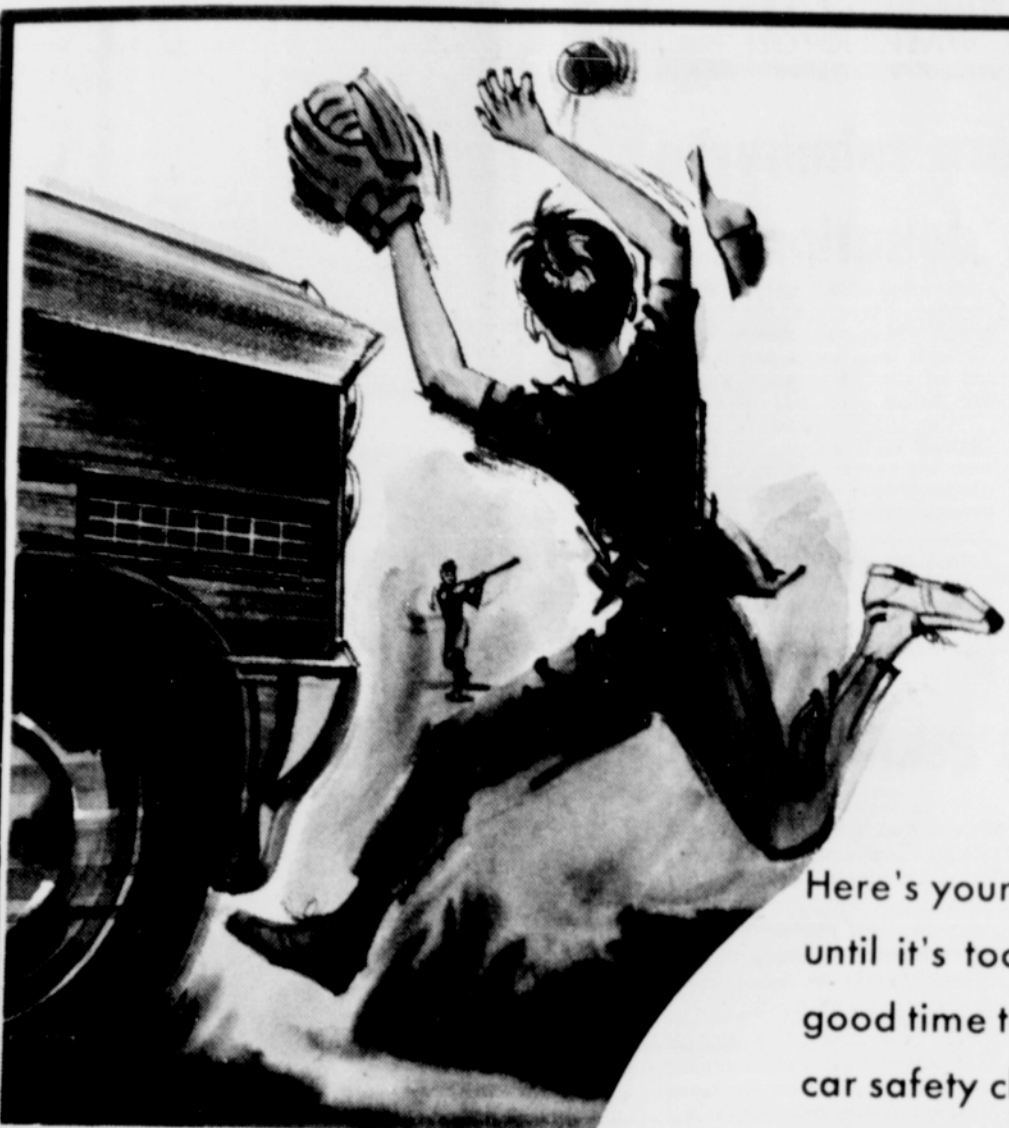
Senator Packwood continues to be a strong proponent of improved care for the elderly. In testimony before a special Senate Committee on Aging, Packwood said: "I am strongly opposed to pinching pennies where the lives of our senior citizens are concerned."

However, under the budget submitted for next year, the agency's funding would be cut back. Oregon's allocation would be slashed from \$207,702 this year to \$153,847, a 25 per cent cut Packwood said. During 1970 aging programs in Oregon served 16,907 senior citizens, and 3,040 elderly persons participated in volunteer programs. But no matter what changes occur, "we must be absolutely sure that these people are fully protected," he said.

Statements by Cecil Posey, Executive Secretary of the Oregon Education Association, that Portland school officials did not work hard enough to sell the defeated school levy were branded today as "Monday morning quarterbacking typical of the uninformed," by John H. Nellor, Director of Public Information for the school district.

"Mr. Posey either ignored or doesn't know the facts," and members of the Board of Education worked hundreds of hours in both campaigns, Nellor said. More than \$50,000 was spent in non-public funds for advertising and other promotional activities in two campaigns, Nellor pointed out. He said school principals and PTA leaders in the local school communities conducted vigorous door-to-door information campaigns in both May and June. In addition, Nellor said, "more than 500,000 individual pieces of literature were distributed to voters either by mail or sent home with students." In the second information campaign alone some 150,000 pieces of literature were distributed and some 35,000 postcards were mailed to Portland parents, Nellor added, and thousands of telephone calls were made by citizen and staff volunteers in both campaigns.

Nellor pointed out that neither the OEA nor its local affiliate the Portland Association of Teachers had endorsed either one of the two election efforts.
