School desegregation

A press release issued by the Office for Civil Rights (HEW release A66) provides comparative data by state and region of the nation's school desegregation for the two school years 1968-69 and 1970-71. School desegregation in the south is much farther ahead of those school districts in the north, east and west.

The number of Negroes in majority-white schools (50 per cent or more white) were:

The number of Negroes in all-black schools showed an even sharper drop in the South, decreasing from 68 per cent in 1968 to 14.1 per cent last fall. Until 1966, Southern Education Reporting Service, the predecessor of Race Relations Information Center, reported the number of Negroes in schools with whites (desegre-

gated schools having at least one white student). Using the earlier SERS and the new OCR figures, the changing statistics on black students in desegregated schools of any racial proportion for the South were:

A spokesman for the Office for Civil Rights, Bob Smith, noted that most of the news-papers were "saying that seg-regation increased" in the Northern cities. "I'm sur-prised they are holding their own," he said. "I think the figures show that it (a seg-regation increase) is not true. They remain about the same for '68 and '70," Smith com-mented. In New York City, the nation's largest school district, the proportion of Negro students increased from 31.5 per cent in 1968 to 34.5 per cent in 1970, but the percentage of blacks in all-black schools increased only from 10.2 to 11.9. The nation's second largest sys-tem, Los Angeles, had its proportion of black students increase from 22.6 per cent in '68 to 24.1 per cent in '70, but the number in all-black schools dropped from 12.3 per cent to 8.7 per cent.

Bethel Astros slugged Allen Avenue Nine to a whopping score of 34 to 1.

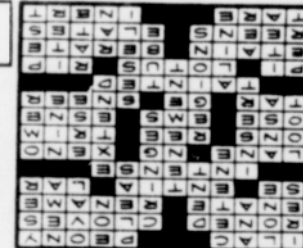

Kids-For-Hire

Kids-For-Hire through their association with Model Cities, N.Y.C. program, National Alliance of Businessmen (NAB) and the state employment service will attempt to find summer employment in the form of casual labor mowing lawns to cleaning attics and garages) for youths ages 14 to 17 in the Portland Metropolitan area. Costing the employee only 1.50 per hour for the task performed.

Heading the program based at the Youth Opportunity Center on 25 N.E. 11th will be Marie Baker a student at Linfield College, she will be assisted by a staff of N.Y.C. workers who are, Todd Simpson and Mary Avery from Washington High School, Bill Fitzgerald a student from Grant High School, Aaron Dawson also from Grant, Jennifer Johnson and Charrell Bradford who is a student at Monroe.

These people will handle all job orders phoned in by prospective employers, then referred to a satellite office in the same relative community as the job order came from. In the Model Cities (North-North-East area) Rodney Bieham will head the program other programs in satellite offices will be in the S.E. area, Lake Oswego, Clackamas County areas.

Schuyler. Twenty-three churches and organizations in the neighborhood will volunteer services and money in order to operate the center and pay the part time cook. Meals are offered on a pay-as-you-can basis so that all may participate. Mr. Ira Mumford will be the MC on the opening day to which all are invited.

The Pine St. Loaves and Fishes Center also opened this week. This Center is open every Monday, Wednesday, and Friday in the St. Francis Catholic Church Hall, SE 11th and Pine.

Stoudamire joins PSU police training

As an intern in the detective division Charles Stoudamire along with 11 other Portland State students are to begin a crash course in to the workings of the Portland Police Bureau for 10 weeks.

The City Council added 6,000 dollars to a 15,000 dollar federal grant into the program which will end September 17th. The student - interns will be carried on the division to which they are assigned payroll and will receive \$2.00 an hour and they will work a 40 hour week.

Stoudamire a senior at Portland State this year will be assigned to work in all aspects of the department that he is placed in, the students jobs will help put

more policemen into the field or doing more important tasks.

In Charles case that will mean obtaining crime reports, engaging in staff projects for the Planning and Research Division. Police uniforms will not be worn, but rather civilian clothing with a name plate which identifies name and position.

Capt. Gary Haires who heads the program said that the interns were selected on the basis of law enforcement background and education.

Haires said, we feel that the Police Bureau will benefit, because hopefully will serve as an introduction to future employment and service in the field of law enforcement.

The award and certification will be presented at the American Association of Museums Annual Banquet in Denver.

Accreditation was granted after a thorough study, which included inspection by a visiting committee of the Accreditation Commission. In its report, the committee concluded that, the general impression given by the Museum is one of dignity and professionalism coupled with a spirit of friendliness and community service. Because of its close relations with its community, it is one of the important institutions of the West Coast.
