

Employment

SALEM - (Special) - Employment in Oregon in Fiscal Year 1971, ending June 30, reached a peak in August, 1970 when 924,700 Oregonians were employed. Ross Morgan, administrator, Employment Division, reported here today in reviewing Fiscal Year Statistics. The peak employment was 12,500 fewer than the previous June when the all-time peak of 937,200 Oregonians were employed.

The seasonally-adjusted rate of unemployment peaked at 6.8 percent in March, compared with 5.7 percent a year earlier and with the national peak rate of 6.2 percent in May.

Cutbacks in construction, unfavorable weather conditions, and unsteady lumber market, poor economic conditions particularly in neighboring states, caused the seasonally-adjusted unemployment rate to be the highest since 1961. During the Fiscal Year the rate averaged 6.4 percent compared with 5.2 percent in FY 1970. Payments in unemployment insurance benefits during the Fiscal Year totaled \$53.6 million, averaging more than \$1 million per week. "The stabilizing effect of these benefits was felt throughout the state to help bolster the economy," Administrator Morgan said. The average weekly benefit amount of unemployment insurance checks was \$43.37 during the Fiscal Year.

Oregon payrolls covered by the Employment Division law (excluding government) in 1970 exceeded \$3 billion for the fourth consecutive year as they reached a total of more than \$3.6 billion. Oregon's production workers in May were averaging \$4.08 per hour compared with the previous year's high of \$3.84 per hour in June.

The Oregon State Employment

Service made 50,159 non-agricultural placements during the Fiscal Year. Also a total of 160,811 agricultural placements were made compared with 183,291 the previous year. This was a total of 210,970 placements in FY 1971 compared with 239,199 the previous year.

The Employment Division continued its emphasis on services to the disadvantaged and to those who needed employability services and training. A total of 942 was referred for services in the Portland Concentrated Employment program. There were also 1,654 in the state trained under the institutional training portion of the Manpower Development and Training Act (MDTA). There were 321 placements made through the Employment Division in the National Alliance of Businessmen's JOBS program and 821 were referred by the Division to the Job Corps.

A total of 253 was employed in the Jobs Optional Program, which started January 1, under the Manpower Development and Training Act. Of these 138 are still in training and 23 have completed. The Employment Division also started 51 in On-the-Job Training during the Fiscal Year and 28 of these individuals have completed training.

Since the Work Incentive Program started in July, 1969, there have been 5,001 enrolled and 1,603 placements made. Aid-to-Dependent Children recipients, mothers, fathers and young people, enrolled during the Fiscal Year totaled 2,103, and 1,011 were placed in jobs to aid them to remove themselves from the welfare rolls.

The Supplemental Training and Employment Program (STEP), administered by the Employment Division, put

2,900 individuals on supplemental jobs and training during the Fiscal Year.

The Employment Service counseled 17,603 individuals to aid them in making a vocational or job choice and made 10,116 individual placements of veterans in non-agricultural employment during the Fiscal Year. The Employment Division aided in the organization of the Governor's Task Force on Jobs for Veterans and a strong promotional campaign by letter and through the media urged employers to train and hire veterans in the state who were out-of-work.

Youth placements for both non-agricultural and agricultural openings exceeded 7,600 during the Fiscal Year, it was estimated. For the third consecutive year, young job developers were employed in nearly all Employment Division offices to help develop summer jobs for youth.

Some expansions were made in the Portland Job Bank during the year, with several offices added to the distribution and use of the Job Bank Book. Including the new Gresham and Southeast Portland offices, opened during the year. New quarters for the Hillsboro and Lebanon offices were occupied in May and June, respectively, and construction was underway on new quarters for the Milwaukie office, expected to open in August.
