Pouring were Mrs. Mozell Williams, Mrs. Ireal Williams, Mrs. Samuel Barbarin and Mrs. Mary Taylor.

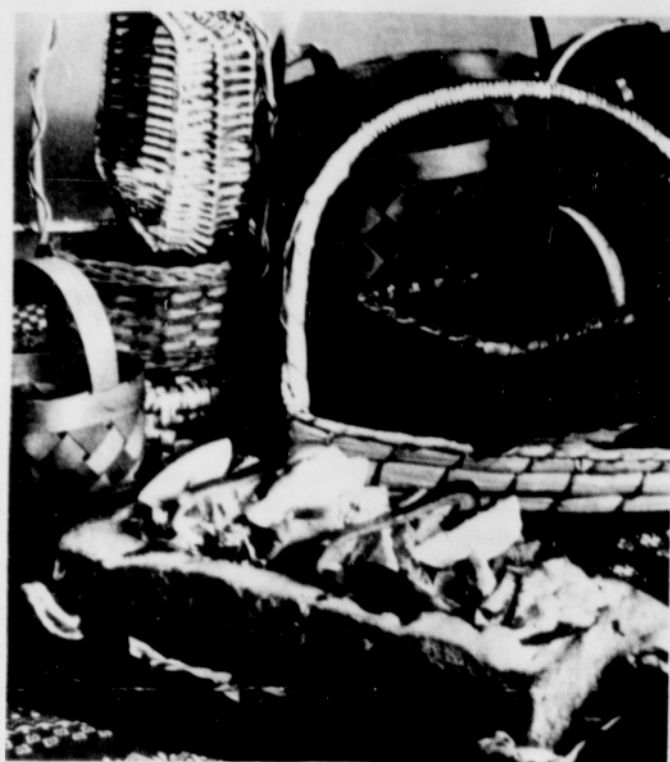
The serving table was decorated with raspberry and white candles and the wedding cake was the centerpiece.

Corn Muffin Basket



CHICKEN SALAD 'N MUFFIN BASKET

A corn muffin basket carries chili seasoned chicken salad. The basket, made from DROMEDARY Corn Muffin Mix is baked in a pan fashioned from aluminum foil. The handles are strips of green pepper.

- Heavy duty aluminum foil
- Paper clips
- 3 tablespoons finely chopped onion
- 1 (6-ounce) package DROMEDARY Corn Muffin Mix
- 1 (4-ounce) jar DROMEDARY Pimientos, Sliced, drained
- 1/3 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- 3 eggs
- 2/3 cup milk
- 1/3 cup mayonnaise
- 1/3 cup dairy sour cream
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 2 to 2 1/2 teaspoons chili powder
- 1/8 teaspoon oregano leaves
- 2 teaspoons fresh lemon juice
- 1 medium green pepper, set aside 5 full length strips for garnish
- 1 medium tomato, peeled
- 2 cups cooked chicken, cut in bite-size pieces
- 3/4 cup cooked ham, cut in thin strips
- Boston or Bibb lettuce

Cut a 30-inch sheet of aluminum foil; fold in three; mark off 11 X 4 1/2-inch rectangle in center. Snip into corners. Fold to form loaf pan, keeping corners square; secure loose ends with paper clips. Place on cookie sheet. Brush inside with melted shortening.

Combine 2 tablespoons onion with next three ingredients. Add 2 eggs and milk; stir until dry ingredients are just mixed but still lumpy. Pour into prepared pan. Bake in a preheated oven (350 degrees F.) 35 to 40 minutes. Set on wire rack. Cool 10 minutes. Remove foil. Cool completely.

Blend 1 tablespoon onion with next seven ingredients. Coarsely chop green pepper and tomato; add with next two ingredients to mayonnaise mixture. Mix very well. Cover. Refrigerate 2 to 3 hours. Hard cook remaining egg.

To serve, hollow out center of corn muffin basket, leaving 1 inch around the edges; do not cut through base. To facilitate removal of center rectangle, cut in thirds and lift out one portion at a time. Place basket on serving tray; line with salad greens; fill with salad mixture. Garnish with hard-cooked egg, cut in quarters and green pepper strips. Makes 8 (approximately 6 ounce) servings.

*Sprinkle over creamed seafood, egg, or meat dishes. Coarsely crumble; toast; sprinkle on tossed vegetable salads. Use for stuffings.

Children Follow Example

- If a child lives with hostility, he learns to fight.
- If he lives with criticism, he learns to condemn.
- If he lives with fear, he learns to be apprehensive.
- If he lives with jealousy, he learns suspicion.
- If he lives with self-pity, he learns self-pity.
- On the other hand:
- If he lives with encouragement, he learns to trust.
- If he lives with acceptance, he learns to like himself.
- If he lives with fairness, he learns justice.
- If he lives with honesty, he learns what truth is.
- If he lives with love, he learns to love.
- If he lives with forgiveness, he learns to forgive.

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
