McCall to lead coast trade

Governor Tom McCall will lead Oregon teams on business-hunting missions to the East Coast next week.

The governor is combining the economic development projects with a speaking engagement Monday, October 11, in Atlanta, Georgia, where he will keynote the annual meeting of the National Association of School Boards.

Following the Atlanta speech, he will go to New York for a major Oregon luncheon at the St. Regis Sheraton, telling 100 top executives of New York-based corporations of Oregon's advantages as a location for regional headquarters facilities.

The luncheon menu will feature Columbia River salmon, Dungeness crab, Oregon pears and Blue Lake beans. New fashions in swimwear and sportswear will be shown during the luncheon. McCall will meet privately with New York Mayor John Lindsay Wednesday at 4 p.m. at Gracie Mansion.

Thursday the governor will go to Washington, D.C., on a convention-selling mission with the Portland Chamber of Commerce Convention Bureau. He will speak at a luncheon for 150 executives of national trade and professional associations at the Statler Hilton.

While in New York the governor will be telling Oregon's story in press and television appearances. The schedule includes an appearance on the NBC "Today" show Tuesday morning, October 12, and interviews with the New York Times, Business Week and Time editorial staffs and wire services.

LeRoy B. Staver, board chairman of the Economic Development Advisory Committee, will preside at the New York luncheon program.

Shedding some light on TV repairs

If your TV set is on the blink, and you swore you'd never take it into the shop again after that last repair bill, and you're thinking of pulling out all the insides and trying to fix it yourself--don't! There's new hope for the consumer in the TV repair jungle.

The television and radio repair law which went into effect this July says that all service dealers and their staffs of repairmen must be licensed by the state. To get a license, a repairman must meet certain educational requirements and pass tests which measure his skills. He must also be of good character, that is, he must not be potentially dangerous to people or property in a private home. His license can be taken away if he commits any dishonesty or fraud in his service, if he shows extreme carelessness or incompetence in a repair job, if he uses fraud to get a license, or if he breaks any of the rules laid down by the Department of Commerce. He may not service any TV or radio equipment without a license.

When you get a bill for repair services, it must show these things:

--what kind of work and how much work was done
--an itemized list of all parts, materials, and technical labor.

--the name or initials of the technician who made the repairs.

--the make, model and serial number of the TV or radio.

--the names and addresses of the repair shop and the customer.

These new laws help protect you from bad or dishonest repair jobs. However, there are still a few things to watch out for.

Be on your guard if you receive a postcard saying you are entitled to a "free service call." The repairman who calls isn't really interested in looking at your set for free. Most repairmen charge about \$15.00 for a service call, and chances are the free repairman will try to make his fee some other way, maybe by fixing your set even if it doesn't need it.

Many repairmen will insist on taking your set in to the shop. This can be expensive, especially if the set is large and heavy. When you call, try to tell the repairman exactly what is wrong with the set so he can bring the necessary parts out and fix the set in your home. If it has to go

to the shop, maybe you can take it in yourself.

If you're having repairs made in the shop, you can save money by telling the repairman whether you want the set reconditioned (fixed up like new) or just repaired so it will run again. If you don't tell him, he may do a larger repair job than you want and charge accordingly.

If you are offered a guarantee of any kind, ask to have it in writing. And don't forget to check and make sure that the repairman you are dealing with is licensed. Then you will have the full protection of the law.

We don't recommend trying to fix your set yourself unless you are an expert. However, if you're interested you can probably read up on your set and learn to make simple repairs. Some people take old tubes down to the electrical supply store and have them tested on the store tester. These machines can spot a very bad tube, but they aren't too reliable in identifying partly worn-out tubes. You also have to be careful not to break tubes or mix them up while removing or replacing them, and always make sure the set is unplugged before you touch

any parts!

B.B. King Live At Cook County Jail

This album should be titled B.B. King and Lucille (his guitar) for B.B. would be nothing without the high pitch twanging of Lucille in the background. In fact, neither one would sound like anything without the other and that's why they both should get equal billing.

This L.P. was recorded live at the Chicago's Cook County Jail and included in the recording are B.B.'s introductions to his songs and the applause from the prison audience.

The musicians are B.B. King (guitar & vocal); John Brown (trumpet); Louis Herbert (tenor sax); Booker Walker (alto sax); Ron Levy (piano); Wilbert Freeman (bass); Sonny Freeman (drums) and they really swing hard. The groove they set behind B.B. as he sang songs like "Everyday I Have the Blues," "How Blue Can You Get," "Worry, Worry, Worry," "3 o'clock Blues," "Darlin' You Know I Love You," "Sweet Sixteen," "The Thrill Is Gone," and "Please Accept My Love" is too much.

King's voice (crisp, clear and deep) seems to still be in tip-top shape after 25-years 308 singles and 33 LP's later. But still no coveted gold award. The best tracks on the album are "Worry, Worry, Worry," and the unquestionably B.B.'s classics "How Blue Can You Get" and "Sweet Sixteen."

B.B.'s and Lucille's musticly wonderful manner of leading the group is a gas to listen to. You can tell by his vocals and Lucille's solos that they are totally involved and that all the musicians are affected by their bravura.

I am sure that this L.P. will be well received by B.B.'s fans around the world because it is clean and uncomplicated, producing a full rich palette of blues sounds, pleasing harmony, and a sense of gradual expansion that builds dynamically through devices of repetition to a high plane of emotional involvement which ensnares the listener.

In my opinion, this is one of the finest L.P.'s B.B. King has come out with in a long time.
