Baptists Urge

The Progressive National Baptist Convention U.S.A., Inc. meeting in Houston, with 2900 delegates representing a membership of 1,500,000 throughout the nation, adopted the report of its Committee on the United Nations Organization that called for the election of Mr. Endakapchew Makonin of Ethiopia to the post of Secretary General. Secretary General U. Thant does not plan to run for re-election.

The statement said in part, "The United Nations must in fact be representative of the nations of the world regardless of race or creed, if it hopes to remain alive. We believe that the continent of Africa has her unique contribution to make towards world peace." They called upon the United States to support the candidacy of Makonin.

Makonin has served as Ethiopia's Ambassador to the United Nations and currently is a member of His Imperial Majesty's Cabinet, holding the position of Minister of Communications.

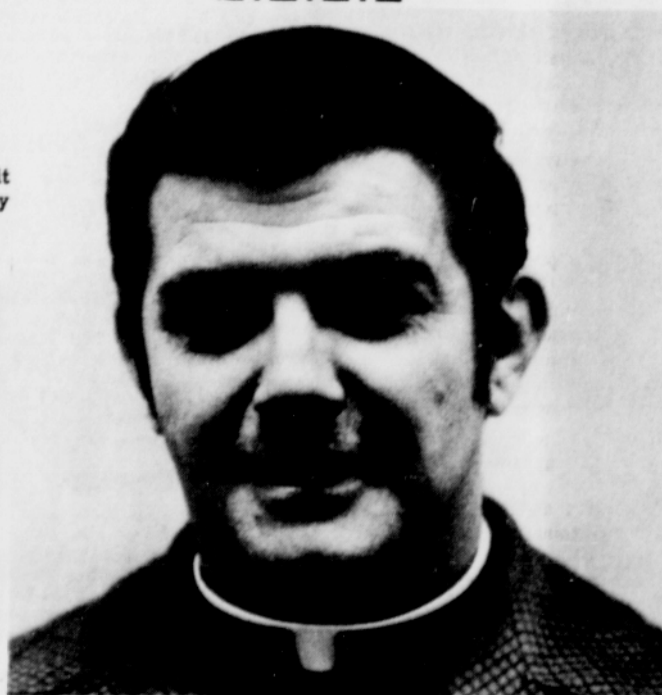

Sound Board Thinking

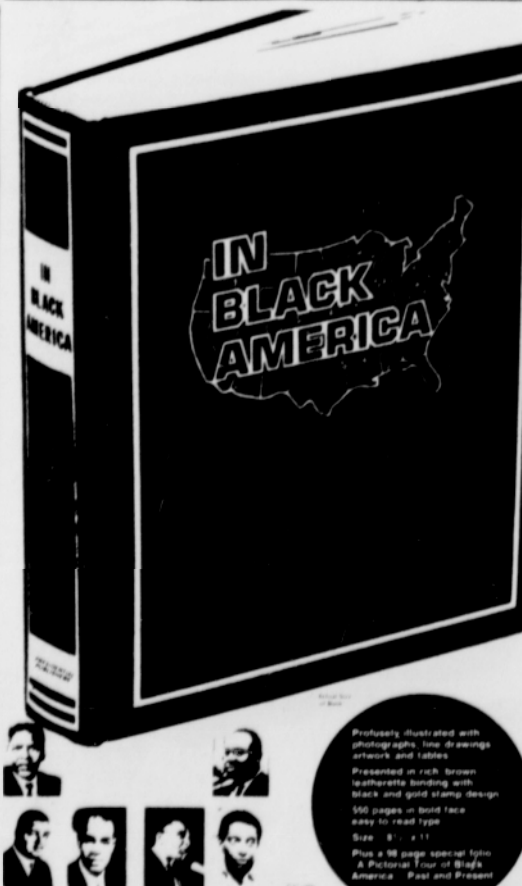
Dr. S.I. Hayakawa, president of San Francisco College, has been suggested for the position of civil rights director for the Defense Department.

Although Hayakawa's methods in ending student demonstrations and strikes on the campus of San Francisco State when he accepted the presidency there three years ago were questionable, his work for civil rights have been significant.

Of Japanese decent, he believes segregation of the races is a curse and should be eliminated. Racism, he believes, is inconsistent with democracy. For a number of years Hayakawa wrote a column for the Chicago Defender in spite of the opposition of the English Department at Illinois Institute of Technology where he was a professor of English and at the risk of losing his position at I.I.T.

The Defense Department is having problems finding a suitable black for the position. They want a man who will sacrifice principals for political expediency. We doubt if they will be happy with Hayakawa for long.

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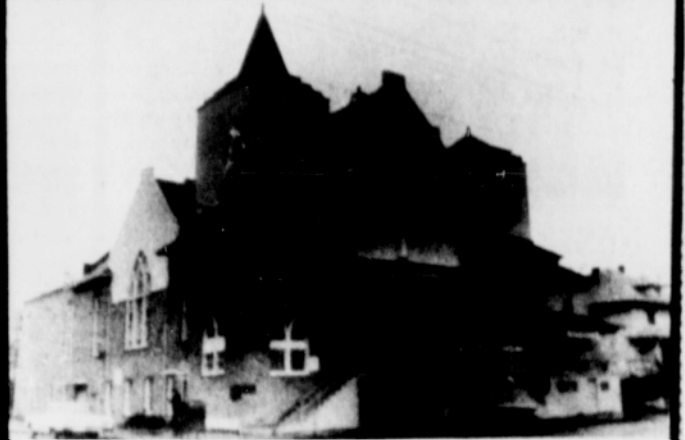
