### Unrest in Territorial peoples

An independence movement in Puerto Rico appears to be growing, and while discontent among America's territorial peoples may be most publicized in the Caribbean, it is by no means confined to that part of the world. This summer, for example, the U.S. appointed governor of American Samoa, John Hayden, angered some islanders by trying to remove a judge who was popular among the Samoans. While Hayden was mildly reprimanded by Interior officials, many Samoans and sympathetic Americans charged that the real issue is self-government for the islanders. "The Samoans themselves could not possibly mismanage their own islands with their lovely and mismanaged their lovely islands with the current political appointee," contended Dean Kaufman, a former VISTA lawyer who served in Samoa under Gov. Hayden.

Concerning another of America's Pacific possessions, Micronesia, negotiations are now underway about the future of the island groups. Meetings were held from October 3-9 on the Hawaiian island of Maui between Interior Department negotiators and a Micronesian Future Status Delegation. Lazarus Salii, the chairman of the Micronesian delegation, said, "Either we come up with something or we go on to independence." He added that a crucial issue in the negotiations would be the U.S. power of eminent domain.

MANNHEIM, Germany—The arrival here of Melvin Bolden, a member of the legal staff of the NAACP, has brought a continuance until October 26th of the special court-martial of six Negro soldiers. The soldiers are accused of taking part in a racial disturbance on July 19.

Trial Judge (Capt.) Herbert J. Green granted the request for continuance after Mr. Bolden said that the NAACP was interested in the case but that his recent arrival in Germany had not permitted time to work on the preparation of a defense.

In granting the delay, Judge Green said, "I want to make it quite clear that, on the 26th of this month, this case will go to trial. I don't think you're entitled to this delay but I'm going to grant it anyway."

Knowledge of the impending trial had reached the NAACP offices in New York only a few days before Mr. Bolden hastened to Germany.

Just last May, Mr. Bolden had been a member of a three-man NAACP team which spent three weeks in Germany investigating alleged discrimination in military installations there. "It is imperative that the Association take immediate steps to place legal counsel in Germany to make certain servicemen will be treated fairly under the code of military justice," Mr. Bolden said.

The six soldiers to go to trial on October 26 are the first of 25 to face court-martial for allegedly disobeying an order to disperse. Twenty-nine additional soldiers involved in the incident accepted non-judicial punishment.

NEW YORK.—The second day care center sponsored by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People here was scheduled for opening on Monday, Oct. 11, in the Williamsbridge section of The Bronx.

The Association's first center was dedicated last year. It is operated by the Jamaica Branch in St. Albans, Queens. The new Williamsbridge center is larger and will accommodate 140 children, ages three through seven.

### Forest Service freezes timber prices

The U.S. Forest Service moved last week to freeze prices of federal timber, Congressman Al Ullman announced Wednesday.

Ullman said the Administration originally classified timber as an agricultural product not included in the wage-price freeze, while holding finished lumber prices down to pre-freeze levels.

"Raw timber prices started rising while wood products companies were stuck with frozen prices for finished lumber," Ullman said. "The result was a senseless cost squeeze."

According to the Forest Service, competitive bidding and escalation provisions in timber sale contracts will continue unchanged.

But, Ullman pointed out, timber prices will be frozen at current appraisal levels.

Ullman said prices on National Forest timber will be based on lumber and plywood price levels no higher than western softwood lumber prices indices for June, July and August.

"Bureau of Land Management appraisals will also be at a common level with those used by the Forest Service," Ullman said.

### Suburban hospital approve

The concept of a "satellite" hospital to serve the southwest area of Portland was approved Thursday (October 14) when the Comprehensive Health Planning Association for Metropolitan Portland gave its endorsement to the construction of Meridian Park Hospital near Tualatin.

After holding a public hearing, the CHPA Board of Directors gave its approval to an application for a Certificate of Need to build a \$6 million acute care general hospital to serve the Tigard-Lake Oswego-Tualatin area. The application now goes to the State Comprehensive Health Planning Committee for final approval under Oregon's new Certificate of Need legislation.

The vote by the CHPA Board was 15 in favor, with 1 no vote by Multnomah County Commissioner Don Clark. Clark did not object to the location for the hospital, but stated he would like to see scarce health dollars spent on higher priority needs than hospital beds.

Carl Lindgren, Administrator for the planned hospital, explained the \$6 million would be raised by private bond sale by two cooperating hospitals, Emanuel and Physicians and Surgeons, and therefore, would not be money normally available for other health commitments.

Need for the hospital was demonstrated to the planning body by CHPA staff members, who said the potential population growth of the area will be 100% in the next 20 years.

The Board was also told that considerable industrial development is taking place in the Durham - Tigard - Progress area west of I-5. A high percentage of the land in the area is zoned for industrial development.

Clark, a member of the Columbia Region Association of Governments Board, said this was not necessarily the best use for the land, and indicated CRAG had taken no official position.

Other reasons given for the construction of the hospital included need for emergency health services. A number of freeways intersect and serve the general area and could create a high volume need for emergency and outpatient care.

The Board was told that the Meridian Park Hospital is a joint venture between Emanuel Hospital and Physicians and Surgeons Hospital, both non-profit Oregon Corporations. Meridian Park will provide general medical - surgical services. Plans call for 105 beds.

The concept of the satellite hospital is to avoid duplication of the facilities of the large medical center-type hospitals in Portland. Patients requiring specialized services and facilities of a large hospital will be transported by helicopter and ground vehicles when such health care is needed.

The emphasis for Meridian Park will be to provide services with maximum efficiency and lowest cost commensurate with quality health care.
