


One of the objectives for this special mailing is to reach all parents. In this way they will receive information on how

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NEW YORK .-- "A conspiracy to violate the civil rights of black workers in the construction industry" will be carried out if construction craft unions are permitted The charge was made in a September 28 letter to David L. Norman, Assistant Attorney General, Civil Rights Division of the U.S. Justice Department, in which Mr. Hill asked the division "to formally investigate and prosecute all violations to the full

extent of the law." Mr. Hill also sent Mr. Norman a copy of a union letter which instructed "its affiliated local unions to evade compliance with the United States Department of Labor's new anti-discrimination regulations for the Bureau of Ap-

prenticeship and Training." A paragraph from the union policy letter carries the recmendation that locals "continue operation of your program in a business as usual manner' in regard to the selection and induction procedures until cited by the Department of Labor for non-

compliance," "Given the historic racist practices of training programs in the craft unions." Mr. Hill said, "it is clear that the international union's advice to its locals to continue to follow a recently stated policy of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America, AFL-CIO, NAACP Labor Director Herbert Hill said last week.
