Who has a right to criticize? It seems amazing that the church is able to do so well if you are one of these statistics.

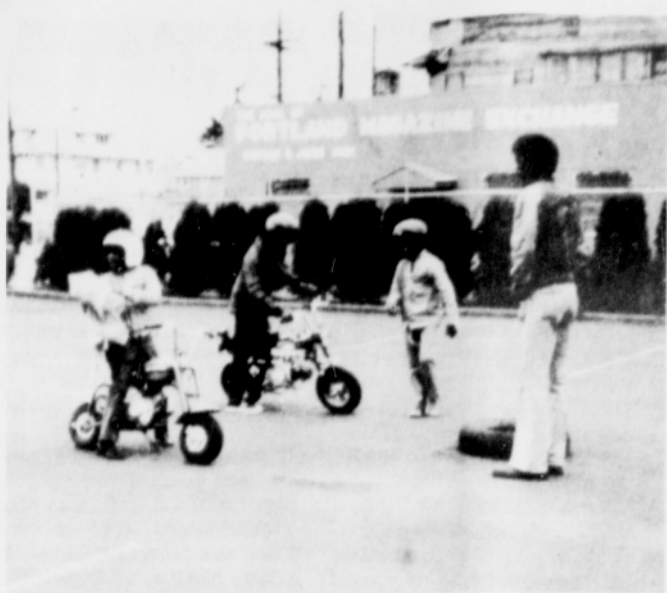
Band holds Concert

NEWS FROM THE NAACP

NATIONAL ASSOCIATION FOR THE ADVANCEMENT OF COLORED PEOPLE

WASHINGTON -- "Racial segregation and discrimination in housing have created a destructive environment," William R. Morris, NAACP director of housing, told Congress on November 4. This has occurred "with government support," he said in testimony before the Civil Rights Oversight Subcommittee of the House Committee on the Judiciary.

"A color-blind government policy carried out in a color-conscious housing market will only further entrench and aggravate the segregation of our society," Mr. Morris said.

In reviewing the housing outlook for the nation and the government's role in affecting it, both in terms of supply and equal opportunity, Mr. Morris said: "Black people have just cause for alienation and hostility towards their government."

"It is our basic conclusion that the equal opportunity promises contained in existing civil rights laws are far from being realized and that the Federal Government is still unprepared to carry out its mandate."

In reference to the Department of Housing and Urban Development, the NAACP housing expert said that "a department which promulgates regulations, monitors itself and, upon receipt of complaints involving its own operations, investigates itself, cannot be expected to render self-incriminating decisions."

Mr. Morris urged "the revision of existing legislation to enable the government to acquire land and develop suitable housing in communities where racial or economic discrimination denies equal access to housing."

WASHINGTON -- Clarence Mitchell, director of the Washington Bureau of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, was scheduled to testify this week before the Senate Judiciary Committee in opposition to confirmation of William H. Rehnquist for the Supreme Court of the United States on the basis of the nominee's anti-civil rights record.

Shortly after President Nixon announced his nomination of Mr. Rehnquist, leaders of the Phoenix, Ariz., NAACP Branch--State Senator Claves Campbell, Billie Mills and Robert Horn--cited his opposition to civil rights legislation and school desegregation plans in his home city. They called for rejection of the nomination.

At a meeting of Washington representatives of the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights, Nov. 2, it was agreed that the Conference would oppose the Rehnquist nomination and would testify against it. Mr. Wilkins is chairman of the Conference and Mr. Mitchell, chairman of the group's legislative committee.

A Leadership Conference report said: "Mr. Rehnquist was the only major public witness (in 1964) against a Phoenix public accommodations law, arguing that the right of private property took precedence over public convenience and principle. When there was a move against 'de facto' segregation in the Phoenix schools in 1967, Rehnquist opposed the move, stating, 'We are no more dedicated to an integrated society than we are to a segregated society.'"

Representatives at the November 2 meeting "were also persuaded to oppose the nomination by evidence of Mr. Rehnquist's extreme right-wing views, expressed in pronouncements he has issued as head of the Justice Department's Office of Legal Counsel, in which he attempts to justify wiretapping, imprisonment of demonstrators without due process and denial of full constitutional rights to Federal, state and local government employees and to women."

Neither the NAACP nor the Leadership Conference took a position on the nomination of Lewis F. Powell, Jr., of Virginia whom President Nixon named for the other Supreme Court vacancy at the time he announced the Rehnquist nomination. In a letter sent to branch leaders throughout the country, Mr. Mitchell noted: "We are concentrating on the Rehnquist nomination because the record on him is clear. We do not have the same kind of information on Mr. Powell. However, this does not mean that we support the Powell nomination."

On Sunday, Oct. 31, NAACP Executive Director Roy Wilkins addressing a mass meeting at the annual conference of the Virginia State NAACP in Old Point, warned that the Arizona nominee, now a top lawyer in the Department of Justice, "offers a dangerous future" as a Supreme Court justice because "he may not be able to see you for law and order."
