The two female and 12 male honorees and their high



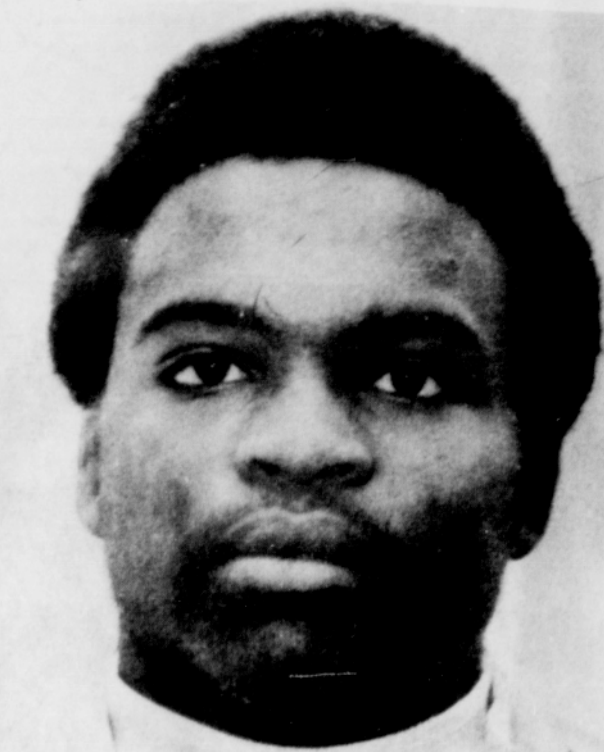

Committees of administrators, teachers and students from each high school selected the scholar-athletes, each of whom must maintain at least a 2.5 (C-plus) grade-point average and continue to participate in school athletics and extra-curricular activities.

Two of the scholar-athletes have perfect grade-point averages and the average grade point of all 14 is 3.5 (B-plus).

Mel Fox, club athletic director, said the awards program was developed by a special community service committee appointed by the club's trustees. The committee's purpose, Fox said, is to "promote greater rapport between the community and club."

Guidelines from the club call on each school to select the outstanding sophomore boy or girl "in accordance with its own criteria for determining the highest qualification combining athletic ability, scholarship and character."

Register for special session early

PORTLAND -- Secretary of State Clay Myers today reminded persons who are not registered that they have less than a month to sign up if they want to vote in the special election next January.

Myers told a regional meeting of student councils at Cleveland High School that if the legislature sets the special election for January 18th, as anticipated, the deadline for registration will be December 18th.

Myers said there may be as many as 100,000 of the newly enfranchised 18 to 21-year-olds still unregistered in Oregon.

"I know many of these young people aren't planning to register until just before the primary election next May," Myers said, "but unless they register soon, they won't be able to vote on those important tax measures in January."

Myers also said that if these potential new voters wait until next spring to register it will put an "extraordinary strain on our county clerks and their registrars."

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It is Homecoming Time at Allen Temple

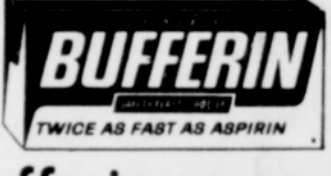
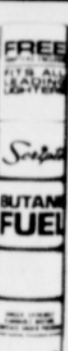
