SBA's surety bond in effect

A new program to assist
small businessmen by guaran-
teeing their bid, payment or
performance bonds has now
been put into effect on a
national scale by the Small
Business Administration
(SBA). SBA administrator
Thomas S. Kleppe announced
that under the new program
SBA can guarantee up to 90
percent of the loss on a bond,
on contracts of \$500,000 or
less.

Kleppe explained the need
for the new program by stat-
ing that small contractors and
other businessmen are often
unable to win contracts
because they are unable to
qualify for bid, payment or
performance bonds. The new
program in no way alters the
type or amount of information
the insurance company needs
to make a bond decision.

Auto check

The Oregon Motor Vehicles
Division has initiated a pro-
gram to insure that motor ve-
hicle safety equipment sold in
Oregon has been approved by
that Division, as required by
law.

Chester W. Ott, Adminis-
trator, says personnel from
the Division started the pro-
gram November 1.

Although safety equipment
approval has long been re-
quired in Oregon, Ott says
this marks the first time Divi-

sion personnel have been
assigned to call on whole-
salers, jobbers, managers of
retail outlets and automotive
parts stores to determine that
only equipment items which
have been approved are ac-
tually offered for sale.

Ott said the first phase of
the program will involve
seeking cooperation of the in-
dustry in eliminating the pos-
sibility that items such as
replacement glass, motor
vehicle lights and mountings,

Real Christmas trees help environment

What will your Yule tree be
this year? There is a good
chance you could be torn be-
tween following the advice of
the environmental groups and
the pleading voice of the
Christmas tree grower. Tree
growers urge the use of a
natural tree and the environ-
mentalists will lean towards
leaving the natural trees in
the woods where they are
happy.

Before we take the advice
of the environmental interests
and rush to the store to buy a
plastic, metal or what-have-
you kind of tree, let's exam-
ine some facts and then
determine if we have luxu-
rious appetites for destruc-
tion of nature's creations. It
could be that our source of
information has come from the
misinformed who merely
advocate the discontinuance
of a practice without knowing
all the facts.

Open wilderness areas or
even nearby farmlands have
changed during the last fifty
years to the point where they
do not exist. No more area is
open to the public for entry
to search for a Christmas tree
and cut the selection without
anyone being wiser. Severe
penalties are given to viola-
tors who enter public or
private lands without proper
authorization in writing to
"borrow" the tree for the
holidays.

Trees available on the city
lot come in assorted sizes,
types and prices from farms
where they are grown to be
harvested as Christmas trees.
The land used for growing
Yule trees is not high quality
land and usually consists of
that which was barren and
eroding badly before the
tree growing operation began.
Shallow, low quality land lends
itself to this use because the
growth rate is slow and ideal
for production of the best
quality trees. Trees grown
on this land must be harvest-
ed instead of being left as a
new forest. Plant food and
root growing room is not abun-
dant enough to mature a tree
to natural size.

When it comes to wildlife
habitat, no tract of land is
ever again cut entirely bare
of trees. The grower starts
the production cycle with more
than seventeen-hundred trees
per acre and maintains this
number by constant replant-
ing as the harvest progresses
each year. Grass cover is
allowed to grow between trees
making an ideal situation for
the game birds and small
animals we know as wildlife.

When the other merits of
this kind of program are ex-
amined, we find the produc-
tive activity filling a need of
providing a means for a man
and his family earning a living
from land once thought to be
nearly worthless. It offers

the American family a chance
to get acquainted with nature
and the woody smell of the
old-time holidays.

There are cases where arti-
ficial trees better fill the need
and this is where they should
be used. Persons who live
in small apartments may not
have room for a conventional
tree and can spare only a
mantle or tabletop. Small
trees for this purpose are not
readily available at reasonable
prices. Growers cannot afford

to sell small trees for less
than the more standard sizes
ones so this leaves a good
place for the artificial tree
to come into use.

The Christmas tree that has
served well during the holi-
days should be re-cycled for
maximum benefit at the home
of the user. The boughs and
needles can be chopped or
ground into compost for use
in improving the soil and the
small trunk may be used as
a stake or if you must dispose

of it, use a saw to make
several lengths of firewood.

The artificial tree, if used
according to all safety pre-
cautions, is probably the
better on for persons who
tire of shopping for a new tree
each year. Properly packed
and cared for to keep tar-
nishing vapors and dust away,
this kind of tree will last for
years in areas where natural
trees are not easily grown
and their use would deplete
a forest area.
