



NAB nabs Terry for Vets

To assist in its goal of finding jobs for unemployed veterans, the Portland Metro office of the National Alliance of Businessmen has named Terry Thomas its Veterans' Job Representative.

Thomas, himself a veteran of the United States Army, will be responsible for the campaign in Multnomah, Clackamas, and Washington counties and in Clark County, Washington. The NAB campaign includes direct solicitation of private-sector employers as well as promotional and public-relations activities.

A highlight of the local effort will be a veterans' Job Fair, scheduled for the Memorial Coliseum exhibit hall on March 29. Here job-seeking veterans will have a chance to meet at a single site with employment representatives of 150 or more companies.

Of the goal of 100,000 veteran hires by June 30 assigned NAB by President Nixon, the Portland NAB Metro has responsibility for placing 750 veterans. To date, 200 veterans have been hired locally under the program.

Thomas has been working in the Portland Model Cities Program as a youth counselor with the Residential Manpower Center. He holds a degree in divinity from Bishop College and is presently an Associate Minister of St. Mark Baptist Church in Portland.

In addition to its veteran job-finding program, NAB

continues to seek jobs in the private sector for chronically unemployed persons. And the Alliance sponsors and pro-

vides summer and year-round employment programs for disadvantaged young people.

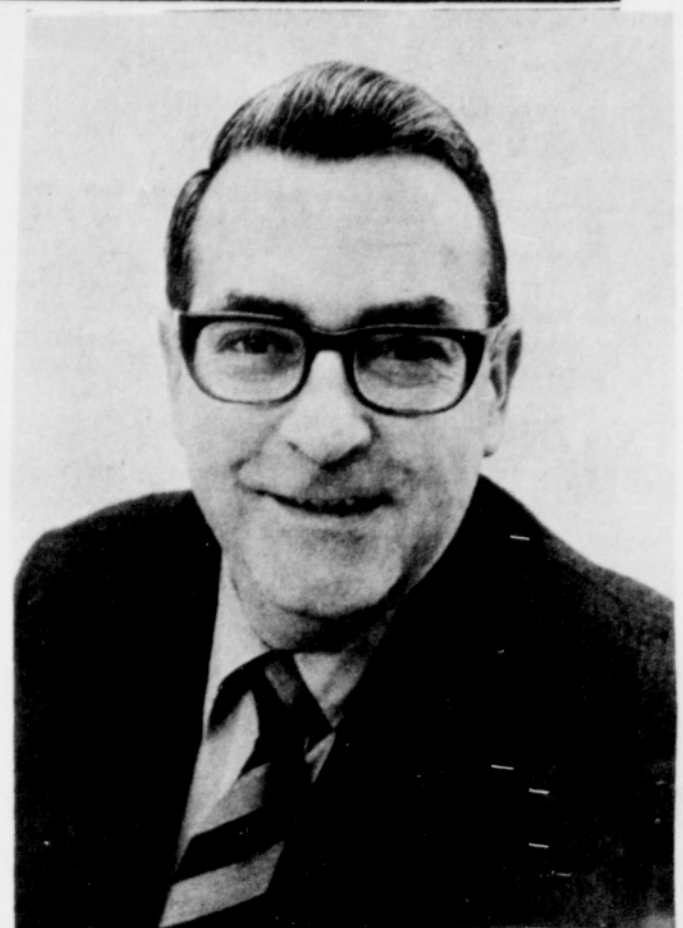
A reception for John Outterbridge, Black art historian from California State College, will be held at 7:30 p.m., Monday, February 21 in the Browning Lounge of Smith Center.

Chisholm announces for Presidency

Representative Shirley Anita Chisholm, the only black woman ever to serve in the U. S. House of Representatives, officially declares her candidacy for the Democratic presidential nomination on Tuesday, January 25th.

Standing in a Baptist church in the Bedford-Stuyvesant section of Brooklyn, Mrs. Chisholm said, "I am not the candidate of black America, although I am black and proud. I am not the candidate of the women's movement of this country, although I am a woman, and I am equally proud of that."

February 4-6, 1972 are Angela Davis Days in Portland. On these days thousands of people will be discussing the Angela Davis case in meetings and rallies, in schools and union halls.

This weekend will be highlighted by the appearance of Mrs. Sallye Davis, Angela's mother at a mass rally Sat. February 5. Mrs. Davis has travelled back and forth across the United States 3 times helping to organize community support for her daughter.

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Impact funded

Project IMPACT, a federally funded special manpower program, will channel \$141,600 to Portland's poverty areas during the first six months of 1972, it was announced January 3rd by the Department of Labor.

IMPACT is being administered by the Concentrated Employment Program (CEP), the manpower arm of the Portland Metropolitan Steering Committee -- EOA, Inc. Headquartered at 220 N.E. Russell, CEP administers an annual budget of \$1,474,000. CEP will help over 740 of the "hard core" employed men and women residing in Portland's Model Cities and S.E. poverty areas.

The funds for Project IMPACT are provided as a supplement to the regular CEP budget.

IMPACT money will provide 85% of the total \$141,600 directly to 64 unemployed men and women as wages on jobs provided in the community by IMPACT in cooperation with local employers. These jobs will be supported for a six-month period.

George Rankins, CEP Director, commented, "The city of Portland has special unemployment problems, and desperately needs special monies in addition to our regular CEP manpower program. Project IMPACT is a start in the direction of recognizing the seriousness of the needs of our unemployed brothers and sisters."

Mrs. Chisholm told reporters in her statement that she plans to enter presidential primaries in Florida and North Carolina, and is strongly considering those in California and New York. Delegates pledged to her will run in Illinois, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Massachusetts and a few other states.

Although she is in the presidential race to win, she acknowledges that her real purpose is to exert strength at the Democratic National Convention.

She expects to get the votes of young women, of blacks, of Spanish-speaking people. With enough support, she will be able to go to the convention and be a faction to be reckoned with.
