Wendy Mink joins mother's campaign

Wendy Mink, 19-year-old daughter of Representative Patsy Mink, accompanied her mother to Oregon to begin Rep. Mink's campaign for the presidency.

Wendy is a sophomore at the University of Chicago where she is studying Chinese history. After graduating from the University, she plans to go to law school. She wants to use law to assist people gain their rights and is interested in Legal Aid Service and welfare law. She is not interested in getting into the corporate structure or using law just to make money.

Wendy is also interested in international affairs, but again her concern is with

"people programs" rather than governmental relations. Wendy grew up in Hawaii and attended elementary school there. When in the sixth grade, she moved to Washington, D.C. with her family, after her mother was elected to the U.S. House of Representatives. She graduated from National Cathedral High School in Washington.

This was Wendy's first visit to Oregon. She hopes to spend as much time with her mother's Oregon campaign as her studies allow. She finds the idea of her mother running for the Presidency of the United States exciting and looks forward to traveling and meeting people during the campaign.

PCC offers Women's Studies

Spring term Portland Community College will offer the first women's studies course to be offered by an Oregon community college. Interdisciplinary and team taught, the course will be an introductory survey of women as a minority group. Subject matter of lectures will be the role of women in the family, in the labor force, in history, economics, psychology, anthropology, and literature. Discussion groups will emphasize an anthropological, psychological, or historical point of view, depending on the subject matter specialty of the leader. Teaching the class will be PCC social science instructors Molly Doenaka, anthropology; Ann Clarkson and Kathy West, psychology; and Barbara Vatter, history.

The three-credit course is transferable to four-year institutions and will partially fulfill the requirements for the basic education certificates. This spring the course will be offered at PCC's Sylvania Center, from 11:30 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Tuesday and Thursday. Child Care will be available on a limited basis.

Each week women's studies students will hear a lecture on Tuesday and participate

in a discussion group on Thursday. Guest lecturers from PCC include Lois Izquierdo, John Olson, and Barbara Murphy.

The interest in women's studies courses is evidenced by the approximately 620 course offerings at 120 colleges and universities in the United States. In Oregon, courses are offered in women's studies at the University of Oregon, Lewis and Clark College, and Portland State University.

Ann Clarkson, PCC psychology instructor who will be a part of the women's studies team says, "The community college is designed to meet the needs of the entire community and the largest minority of community college students are women. This course on women's studies will help to meet the needs of women in particular, provide a sound basis for better understanding of self and society, and, in addition, allow the community college to provide a service not now being offered."

Braten burger steak

3 slices dry bread
2 cups hot water
1 lb. ground beef
2 tsp. minced onion
1 egg
2 tsp. salt
1 tbsp. butter or margarine
1/2 cup vinegar
12 whole cloves
1 bay leaf
8 gingersnaps, crumbled coarsely

Crumble the bread and soak in 1/2 cup of the hot water. Add ground beef, onion, egg and salt. Mix well and shape into patties. Melt butter, add meat patties and brown on both sides. Combine vinegar, remaining 1-1/2 cups water, cloves, bay leaf and gingersnaps. Pour over meat, cover and simmer about 1 hour. Remove bay leaf and cloves and serve hot meat patties and gravy with noodles or mashed potatoes. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

Balkan hamburger steak

1-1/2 lb. ground beef
1 onion, minced
2 cloves garlic, mashed
2 slices bread
Water
1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese
1/4 cup minced parsley
2 tsp. crumbled dried mint
1-1/2 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. pepper

Combine ground beef, onion, garlic and bread which has been soaked in water and squeezed dry. Mix well and add cheese, parsley, mint, salt and pepper. Mix thoroughly and shape into steaks, pressing only firmly enough to make meat cling together. Arrange side by side in a shallow baking pan. Bake at 375 degrees for 40 minutes or until meat is done but not dry. Serve on a bed of rice, if wished. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

Jessie Henson follows tradition

Mrs. Jessie Henson is a Counselor for Colonial Mortuary, having followed her mother into the funeral service profession. Mrs. Henson's mother, Mrs. Beatrice B. Reed, was the first black embalmer to receive a state license in Oregon. She started working at Miller and Tracey Funeral Home in 1927. When her own mother had died, she had asked Miller and Tracey to allow her to make up her mother's face for the funeral. They were so impressed with her that they offered her employment. She began as a makeup person, but learned embalming and after two years passed her state examination. She went to Colonial Mortuary in 1940 and was there until 1963.

Mrs. Henson, being the youngest of three girls, often went to work with her mother. Spending her childhood around the funeral home, it was predictable that she would eventually become associated with the profession. Mrs. Henson grew up in Portland, attending Portland Union Academy, Holiday Elementary School, Hosford Elementary School, and graduating from Franklin High School. Her sister, Mrs. Ozie (Wilson) Smith, is a graduate physiotherapist in private practice, and her other sister, Mrs. Eunice Watkins, was the first black secretary at the Bonneville Power Administration.

Mrs. Henson's career has been varied. She was the first black pipe welder at Swan Island during World War II. She was a professional dressmaker and designer, and owned the Mott Sister's Dress Shop with her sisters.

Mrs. Henson was asked by Worth Caldwell to follow the family tradition and work for

him at Colonial Mortuary. She has now been there for over two years. Her duties include personal counseling black families during the preparation for the funeral, accompanying them to the funeral and the cemetery.

Mrs. Henson is active in community affairs. She is a former Democratic Precinct Committee woman; a member of the Urban League Guild, the Jack and Jill Club of America, Inc., Over The Hill Game, NAACP, The Group, Albina Women's League, Royal Esquire Club Auxiliary; and is a former Vice President of the Sabin PTA.

Mrs. Henson and her husband, Kenneth, have three children. Grant, 22, a Vietnam War veteran, lives in Portland. Derek, 18, attends the University of Washington and his twin sister, Meg, attends Nirobi College in East Palo Alto and Stanford University.

Navy seeks women for ROTC

Secretary of the Navy John H. Chafee announced today that the Navy is now accepting applications from female high school seniors for the Naval Reserve Officer Training Corps (NROTC) scholarship program. Secretary Chafee previously announced on February 8 that he had decided to open the NROTC Program to females for the first time in Navy history. In making that announcement Mr. Chafee said, "It seems only fair that women coming to us should have the advantage of a college scholarship just like our men do."

This scholarship provides tuition, fees, books, and \$100 per month subsistence allowance for a period of 40 months. Successful completion of this program will lead to a commission as a Regular or Reserve officer in the grade of Ensign in the Navy or Second Lieutenant in the Marine Corps.

The NROTC scholarship program for women will be initially conducted at Jacksonville University, Jacksonville, Florida; Purdue University, West Lafayette, Indiana; Southern University and A&M College, Baton Rouge, Louisiana; and the University of Washington, Seattle, Washington.

Of these, the unit at Southern University is one of the Navy's newest and one of three at predominately Black colleges.

In his announcement today, Mr. Chafee outlined procedures to be followed in applying for the new program. These include a letter to the Commander, Navy Recruiting Command (Code 314), Department of the Navy, Washington, D.C. 20370. The letter should include reasons for desiring an NROTC scholarship and a naval career. Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) scores or American College Test (ACT) scores and a letter of acceptance to one of the four universities listed above must be included, together with written parental consent. The deadline date for receipt of this letter is June 1, 1972.

Applicants must be American citizens and have reached their 18th birthday but not their 21st by September 1972. Finalists selected will be required to appear at a Navy Recruiting Station for interview and processing during the month of June 1972. Applicants will be notified of selection by July 1, 1972.

Gisvold joins committee

Civic worker Susan Gisvold has been appointed by the Portland Board of Education to serve on the Area 3 Citizens Advisory Committee.

Mrs. Gisvold, of 2815 N.E. 17th Ave., succeeds Phyllis Wiener on the nine-member committee. Mrs. Wiener last Dec. 20 was appointed to the school board to fill the unexpired term of Frank A. Case.

The committee - one of three in the district - represents the Grant, Washington, Cleveland and Franklin high school areas, comprises both adults and students and advises the area superintendent on matters relating to the educational program, building needs and operation of schools.

Mrs. Gisvold and her husband, Dean, have five children. They have resided in Portland for four years. Her husband is a lawyer.

A former school teacher in Minnesota, Mrs. Gisvold received her bachelor's degree in education from Iowa State University and did graduate work in family relationships at the University of Minnesota.

Currently active in the Portland Association for Childbirth Education, Mrs. Gisvold previously was active in Model Cities, Irvington Community Association and Irvington Elementary School Parent-Teacher Association. Mrs. Gisvold will attend her first public committee meeting March 28 at Sellwood Elementary School. Mrs. Gisvold's term expires July 1, 1972.

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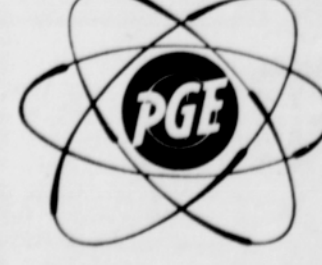
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
