Comprehensive study on Pan-Africanism

The most comprehensive and exhaustive work ever compiled on "Pan-Africanism" is slated for release this fall. And a Portland State University instructor is the author.

Lenwood G. Davis, rounding out his second year as an instructor at the local university, has been working on the bibliography for the past six months and was notified recently by the American Bibliographical Center of Santa Barbara, California, that the publication date is set for November.

Entitled "Pan-Africanism: A Selected Bibliography," is primarily designed as a reference for those who wish to learn more about Pan-Africanism. The bibliography has attempted to list everything that has been written on the subject, whether articles in newspapers and periodicals, official documents, as well as

unpublished works on Pan-Africanism.

Professor Davis has done extensive research on African History, has studied at the University of Ghana in Africa, and traveled in several African countries. His master's thesis was on an African country and he has written many reviews on African History.

Besides teaching, traveling, speaking, writing articles and book reviews, Professor Davis is doing additional research on "Blacks in the Cities: 1900-1970," and hopes to complete it in the next two months. The PSU African and Afro-American History instructor is also the author of another bibliography, "Blacks in the State of Oregon: 1788-1971," and a book "I Have A Dream: The Life and Times of Martin Luther King, Jr.," that was published in 1969.

Scholars program seeks minorities

Many people know about the educational opportunities now available to the so-called "disadvantaged" students at the Portland State University Educational Center and Operation PLUS (Paced Learning for Urban Students).

Since 1970, Portland State has also had a special program for the extra-bright student who is willing to work hard and wants to get through college in three years instead of four.

The University Scholars Program, authorized by the PSU faculty and the State Board of Higher Education, allows able and ambitious students to learn at their own pace, and to progress as fast as they wish toward earning a degree. They do not have to complete the usual 186 credit hours to graduate. Instead, they work with advisors from the various departments of the University, and by completing special projects they fulfill a "competence requirement" based on superior academic development and achievement instead of on grades or scores.

Judah Bierman, Director of the University Scholars Program, recently announced that through a special grant, an additional 25 students will be admitted in the fall of 1972. There are one hundred students in the program now. A total of seventy-five new students will be admitted in 1972 and seventy-five in 1973. The first student will be graduated in August, 1972.

"We do not have any student in the program from the minority population, and we would like to find minority high school graduates with the background and potential to participate in the program," Bierman said. "Students who have finished their freshman year with distinction are also eligible." He pointed out that applications are being processed and students are being interviewed now for fall, 1972.

PCC plans new course

"Planners often don't know much about law and architecture; architects often don't know much about law; and lawyers often don't know much about architecture... that's why we're starting this course - to help each profession understand the needs and responsibilities of the other," says Washington County Counsel Edward Sullivan.

Sullivan, a resident of Hillsboro, will be the instructor for a new sequence of courses on "Urban Planning and Land Use Regulation" to be offered this fall term for architects, planners, lawyers, and other interested students at Portland Community College. The course will be offered for three quarters on Monday evenings, 7 to 10 p.m. at PCC's Sylvania Center, 12000 S.W. 49th Avenue, Portland.

During the first quarter students will study the history of planning and zoning, will analyze State Enabling Legislation in Oregon, and will learn about the planning process and its relationship to zoning. The second term will be a comprehensive study of the tools provided under Oregon State Law for the implementation of plans. Students will study principles of land use legislation in the third term.

A graduate of Willamette University College of Law with a J.D. degree, Portland State University with a M.A.

in History, and St. John's University, New York, with a B.A. in Political Science, Sullivan believes that Oregon's planning problems are just beginning and that there is an opportunity to preserve the natural environment while maintaining a tasteful and aesthetic growth. To encourage proper growth Sullivan hopes to see planners, architects, and lawyers work with the legislature and the public. "We must help the public understand the integral points of the planning process if we want them to take part in preserving the environment."

Sullivan became Washington County Counsel in 1970 after serving as Assistant County Counsel. He has published an article on municipal taxation and has received two American Jurisprudence awards in legislation and local government seminars. He belongs to the NIMLO Committee on Planning and Zoning and the American Bar Association Local Government Section Committee on Planning and Zoning.
