Morse visits Albina

Senator Wayne Morse again brought his campaign for the United States Senate to Albina this week as he visited Model Cities' Projects.

At the Senior Adult Service Center Morse discussed the deficiencies of Social Security and called the provisions of the new social security law "dis-

graceful" in the worlds richest nation. He pointed out that his opponent, Mark Hatfield, had proposed that Social Security be contracted out to private insurance companies. Morse called the care of the elderly a responsibility of government and said it would be disgraceful to allow private companies to make a profit off of the poverty of the elderly.

Visiting Bethel Child Development Center Morse discussed pending cuts in federal funding of child care with staff members and parents. He noted that if President Nixon and congressmen would take the time to visit centers such as Bethel, they would realize the need for such centers.

During his visit to Albina Morse reiterated his concern for the area and his support of programs such as Model Cities and the War on Poverty that are designed to allow citizen participation in the planning and operation of the programs. He said, "Unless you tell your Senators and Representatives what you need and want they cannot serve you well. But be certain the man you send to the Senate is one you can trust to serve you and not the interests of big corporations and government."

Bank elects Elorriaga

John A. Elorriaga, 48, was elected president of United States National Bank of Oregon Tuesday. His election was announced by LeRoy B. Staver, chairman of the statewide institution. The appointment will become effective November 1. He was also named a member of the boards of directors of the bank and U.S. Bancorp, its parent holding company.

The presidency of the bank became vacant in early September through the unexpected death of Earl L. Dresler, who had held the position. Staver, who will continue his post as chairman and chief executive officer of the bank, was named to the additional position of president following Dresler's death, and will drop the latter title on Elorriaga's joining the bank.

Elorriaga is a former officer of the bank, which he originally joined in 1951 on

graduation from college. He resigned his position as vice president in the head officer loan division in 1967 to assume an executive post with Evans Products Company of Portland. Subsequently he left Evans, and was elected in December, 1970, to the positions he now holds as president and chief executive officer of Columbia Corporation, a Portland based holding company with subsidiaries engaged in a wide range of business activities.

Elorriaga is an Oregon product. He was born in Jordan Valley and obtained his education in Oregon schools. In addition to his degree from the University of Oregon, he holds an MBA from the University of Pittsburgh. He has married, and he and his wife, Lois, have six children, five of whom are now attending schools in Oregon. They live at 4011 S.W. Downs View Court, Portland.

Wyatt introduces act

Congressman Wendell Wyatt, R-Ore., introduced The Japanese American Friendship Act of 1972 which would create an international education and cultural interchange between the two nations. Twelve Senators of both parties, under the leadership of Senator Jacob Javits, introduced Wyatt's bill in the Senate.

"This bill would set aside 10 percent of the payments received from Japan as a result of the reversion of Okinawa to Japanese control as a scholarship-cultural exchange trust fund," Wyatt explained. "Such exchange would greatly enhance the understanding and cooperation between our two nations."

"Three decades ago our nations were at war -- today we are close friends and allies. The bill I have introduced will help cement our friendship and create increasing interrelationships between our peoples and our economies."

The Japanese government is scheduled to pay the United States \$320 million over a five-year period growing out of the transfer of Okinawa back to Japanese control. This legislation would appropriate \$32 million to establish the trust fund. The interest from the investment of the trust fund in U.S. Government Securities and not more than 5% of the principal would be used each year for the following purposes:

1. Support for studies, including language studies, in institutions of higher education in Japan and the U.S., designed to foster mutual understanding between the two countries.
2. Support for major collections of Japanese books and libraries at American colleges and universities.
3. Support for programs in the arts in association with institutions of higher education in Japan and the United States.
4. Support for fellowships and scholarships.
5. Support for visiting professors and lecturers at colleges and universities in both Japan and the U.S.

McGovern victory predicted in Oregon

The Oregonians for McGovern/Shriver Committee today predicted that Oregon will be one of many states in McGovern's "win" column on November 7th.

Senator Betty Roberts and James Redden, Co-Chairmen of the Oregon committee for McGovern, Robert Straub, State Treasurer, and Blaine Whipple, Democratic National Committeeman, in a joint statement said that "all indications point to a McGovern/Shriver victory here in Oregon."

"These canvassing results and a McGovern poll just completed in this state indicate that McGovern is only four points down," Redden commented, "and with three weeks left we are confident we can close that small gap by November 7th."

To this date the Oregon McGovern organization has raised half again as much as Humphrey raised in this state during the entire presidential campaign in 1968. We are meeting our budget requirements for this state

with grassroots contributions from Democrats, Independents, and disgruntled Republicans alike."

"As further indication of the success of the McGovern efforts in Oregon," concluded Whipple, "we take heart from the recent flurry of traditional Nixon campaign tactics attempting to distort and misrepresent Senator McGovern and his proposals. We know that the people of Oregon will see through the distortions of Nixon and his henchmen and vote for honesty and integrity for George McGovern on November 7th."

4 Keep heat indoors by sealing areas around doors and windows where it could escape. If your home has a fireplace, keep the damper closed when it is not in use.

5 Check your home's insulation carefully. Poor insulation can increase your heating costs drastically and unnecessarily.

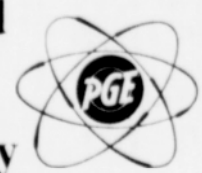
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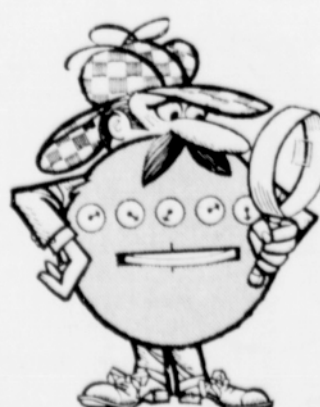
