PCC registers

"Portland Community College students may begin and complete their registration procedures in only 15 minutes," says Registrar Allen Wklestrom. "Our new registration system allows the student to take as much time with an advisor as he needs and then finish the clerical process quickly and easily."

Students entering Portland Community College for the first time winter quarter will register December 11 through 15. Because new students have more questions Sylvania will process 30 registrations per hour and Cascade only 10.

Returning students will register November 27 through December 8. Sylvania will register 65 students per hour and Cascade will handle 20.

Property tax relief applications mailed

October is the month most Oregon property owners receive their new tax statements in the mail.

This year each homeowner will again find an application for homeowners' property tax relief in the envelope with the statement as in 1971. The Director of the Oregon Department of Revenue, C.H. Mack, reminds homeowners to save these applications until after the first of the year and file them after they know their total 1972 income. They cannot be accepted before January 1, 1973.

Mack also emphasized the importance of informing many senior citizens of a change in the law which affects all senior citizens who were granted a residence exemption in favor of the homeowners' property tax relief program, but this relief is not automatic. Senior citizens now must complete the application form they receive

with their tax statements if they are to obtain a reduction in their property taxes.

Last year more than 20,000 senior citizens qualified for that exemption, but only 9,000 filed Homeowner's Property Relief Applications. The remaining senior citizens who qualified under the senior citizen's exemption program are encouraged to file applications for homeowners' tax assistance or deferral for 1972 after January 1, 1973. Deferral applications must be filed by March 1, 1973 and homeowners relief before April 15, 1973.

Along with other homeowners who may qualify, the Department expects 135,000 Oregonians to file for the property tax assistance out of about 190,000 homeowners exemption in favor of the homeowners' property tax relief program, but this relief is not automatic. Senior citizens now must complete the

application form they receive with their tax statements if they are to obtain a reduction in their property taxes.

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Along with other homeowners who may qualify, the Department expects 135,000 Oregonians to file for the property tax assistance out of about 190,000 homeowners estimated to be eligible.

Old age is not a requirement for homeowners' property tax relief. Homeowners

receive the tax assistance because their property taxes are too high in proportion to their income. The maximum amount of relief available is \$400, and this year the average amount of relief was more than \$144 with individual payments ranging from a few dollars up to the \$400 limit.

Homeowners may receive aid in filling out their applications at the tax collectors' offices in each county. Deferral applications are available at County Assessors' offices and must be filed with the County Assessor. They are available only to persons over 65 years of age. Application forms for Homeowners' relief are available at county tax collector's offices. The Department of Revenue is also planning other education programs to make more people aware that this financial assistance is available and to help them fill out their applications.

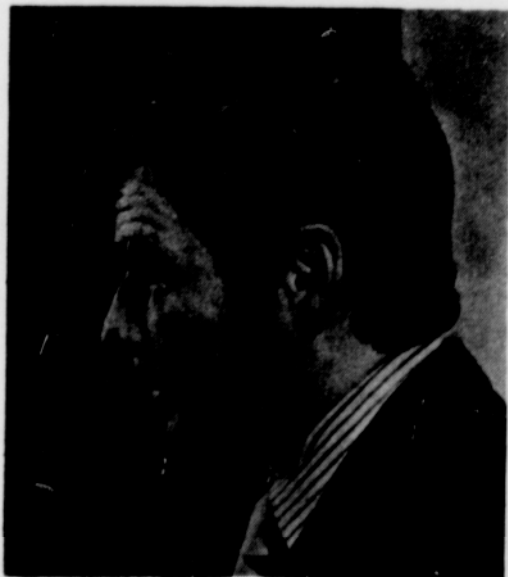
