

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### **Gray Christmases**

People used to dream of white Christmases where the treetops glisten. They still But polluted air is usually what they find in their

wide-awake moments. The treetops may glisten this Christmas in Kentucky.

The first ecology court in the country was set up in Louisville and Jefferson County. Anyone who violates the strict anti-pollution laws established there in the last few years can be hauled before the court's full-time justice. The court, which meets every Friday afternoon, has prosecuted more than 800 cases so far. It has levied more than \$8,000 in airpollu-

tion fines alone. "Everybody's cooperating, including industry," says Tom Summers, who is director of the Kentucky TB-RD Association and a member of the air pollution control board that help set standards for cleaner air. "The standards we've adopted here are among the highest in the

country," he says, "and the court is a natural outgrowth of efforts to enforce these standards."

Local officials in agencies and government are responsible for most of the court cases. One citizen group calls itself "Watchdogs on Environment" and takes offenders to the ecology court. And although there is special provision for small citizen rewards for spotting polluters, few people have tried to collect the rewards.

The court has spurred international publicity and more than 200 towns around the world have already requested detailed information about how it all works. More courts may be in the making

Melidosian, who by his functions, is supposed to represent people of the nation, says in a letter, "We have been advised by the State Approving Agency (authorized by his agency) that there will be no written response to our request for a further investigation of the Schools Building Contractor course."

On October 12, 1972, Senstor Vern Cook announces in the Portland Observer that he will initiate action in the next session of the State Legislature to enable the State Board of Education to screen out state correspondence courses. In September, the Interna-

tional Correspondence

Schools president John Walsh replied to Senator Cook's letter of inquiry. "I am aware of Mr. Miller's complaints. Primarily those relating to currentness of our text material." (Now Mr. Walsh ascribes V.A. state-ments to mel) "In the latest complaint to the Veteran's Administration he cites three texts: Common Brickwork, Architectural Terra Cotta and Face Brickwork, and their copyrights." Now Mr. Walsh announces the republication of these booklets, coming after my set. I never got a completed set, even with the contract payed off. The reader will note that "Architectural Terra Cotta" is an extinct building system and has been so for a good decade! The cost is about nine dollars per lesson for a little booklet and coorection page checkoff, payed by student or by government subsidy. My analysis states, "Remember, I.C.S. only processes a fraction of all lessons contracted and paid for. Credit charges \$67.00" on Building Contractor"

I.C.S. president Walsh further states, "In that time we have never been accused of fraud because we have maintained high ethical standards in both our educational and business operations."

I submit material for screening by the personnel of the office of Congresswoman Edith Green. Senator Cook suggests possible national legislation. I suggest a congressional investigation lest all correspodence schools think they can get away with anything.

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
