So what makes for a good vacation?

THE PLACE: The Hawaiian Islands are roughly 2500 miles Southwest across the blue Pacific from Portland, and about 5 hours flying time - just the perfect interlude for you to forget your cares, and relax. Griffith bout telecast

The Emile Griffith - Jean-Claude Bouttier Middleweight boxing match held in Paris, France on Monday, December 18, will be seen on KPTV via satellite at 6:00 P.M. Sports Director Jimmy Jones announced today. The winner of this middleweight title elimination bout will fight Carlos Monzon of Argentina, the Middleweight title holder, within the following 90 days.

One of the greatest professional boxers in American ring history, Griffith is the only fighter ever to win the welterweight title three times. In 1961 he knocked out Benny Paret to win the title; in 1966 he won the middleweight crown from Dick Tiger in a famous 15 round fight, but lost it two years later to Nino Benvenuti in their second match. In September, 1971 he was KO'd by Carlos Monzon of Argentina, who'd taken the title from Benvenuti. If Griffith wins this match with Bouttier, he'll have another opportunity to regain the elusive middleweight crown.

Jean-Claude Bouttier, is almost unknown in America, but he's the current European Middleweight champion - a title he won from Marcel Duran by a close decision in 1971. He successfully defended his title against Benny Sterling by a knockout in the 14th round later that year. Bouttier has a record of 56 professional fights. He won 34 by knockouts, and has suffered only three defeats and one draw in his total professional career.
