Even jets are trying to quit smoking.

The nation's major airlines have reduced the visible pollutants from almost half their fleet of jetliners. Predictions are that by the end of the year - hopefully before the height of the holiday air traffic - the engines on these jets will be almost smokeless. The "black belch" that streaks across the sky will be, say the airlines, gone with the

To comply with a 1970 vices to curb smoke pollutants on their big jets. Six lines have completed the conversion project, and 95 percent of all engines on three types of jetliners are now equipped with the new devices.

The antipollution devices, called burner cans, eliminate ter right away. It's a matter a fourth of all pollutants, both

polluntants are cut about 70 percent. Taking the country as a whole, the jets are not a major source of air pollution. But they are a highly significant contributor to the already heavy pollution levels near metropolitan airports. Pollution is what cities don't need

more of. So jets are trying to quit smoking on the outside. And on the inside, most jets separate smokers from nonsmokers. People are demanding their right to breathe clean air and - more and more getting it.

The campaign for cleaner agreement with the federal air didn't just happen. 


