Mt. Calvary Church finds new home

In the year of 1949, Bishop W.L. McKinney saw fit to appoint Elder Daniels to the church in Russellville.

Elder Daniels found this church in a very run down condition and it had also been closed for a period of time. Unfortunately, due to the church being closed, many of the parishioners had left to go to other churches or had quit going altogether.

Upon reopening the church, Elder Daniels found just a very few members there. In spite of many discouragements, and also by perceiving how others had failed to establish a work there, Elder Daniels, a man with a vision and of great integrity, said it could be done. There he started a work with the few members consisting of: Deacon and Sister Kelly, Mother Bagley, and Elder Daniel's wife and three children.

Being a man of progress,



he was not satisfied with this place of worship, although he made many improvements on the building. Elder Daniels also gave the church a new name, that of Mt. Calvary. He hoped that the name Mt.

Calvary would be a constant reminder that Christ gave his life to save the world. Mt. Calvary, in keeping with the name, has been like a mountain of faith for many seeking refuge and consolation.

In 1955, Mt. Calvary began to make plans for a modern edifice. Construction was started, but due to the fact that urban renewal and freeways would be occupying the area, Mt. Calvary was forced to look for a new location.

In June of 1967, Bishop McKinney looked upon Elder Daniels faithfulness and appointed him as his assistant. Our Pastor yet holds the office of Assistant Bishop, of which he is very proud and endeavors to do all he can to help his Bishop and his people.

Once again, the Lord has blessed us! We have found our long-sought location at 1234 N. Killingsworth Street. Our future plans include operating a half-day nursery so that small children between the ages of three to five might be taught education and Christianity.

We also hope to build a recreational center for our young people, and old folk's home for the Saints who worked hand-in-hand with God and helped us acquire the blessings we have received. Too often, people overlook the sacrifices our older saints have made; and in their hour of need, they have no where to turn. As good Christians, it is our duty and our desire to show our appreciation by providing these Saints with a place of comfort where we can look after them.

At the request of our Bishop W.L. McKinney, we intend to change the name of our church from Mt. Calvary to Greater Mt. Calvary.

We are proud of our leader, Bishop H.B. Daniels, Sr. We realize that being a capable leader requires tact, diplomacy, sensitivity to all situations, and above all, being a man of God, all of which our Pastor, Bishop H.B. Daniels has in abundance.

Portland hosts Evangelicals

"Loved, We Will Love" is the theme of the 31st Annual Convention of the National Association of Evangelicals, to convene at the Portland Hilton Hotel May 1-3.

Representatives of some 36,000 churches from 33 member denominations, independent bodies and numerous evangelical organizations will meet in devotional, workshop and business sessions. The 1973 theme, "Loved, We Will Love", based on I John 4:11 and Ephesians 5:2, depicts Christ's sacrificial love as the motivation for Christians to demonstrate a ministry of love to a deprived world.

Variations of the theme will be the focus of major addresses during the three-day convention.

In seminar and workshop sessions, NAE's commissions and affiliates will provide practical help from reorganized authorities in the areas of evangelism, higher education, missions, church extension, evangelical action, laymen's work, social concern, radio and television, chaplaincy, world relief and youth.

OCC questions euthanasia act

The Reverend Richard N. Hughes, Executive Director, Oregon Council of Churches, announced recently that a letter has been sent to the following State Senators regarding the proposed Voluntary Euthanasia Act: Hallock, Browne, Burgidge, K. Burns, Hartung, Holmstrom, Howard, Jerstedt, Ouderkerk and Wingard.

This statement comes from the Legislative Commission of the Oregon Council of Churches. "The Legislative Commission of the Oregon Council of Churches is reviewing SB 179, your proposed Voluntary Euthanasia Act. We take this informal way of sharing our thoughts, concerns, and proposals with you."

"It is our feeling that this bill is a response to the 'Death With Dignity' issue which Governor Tom McCall raised in a symposium last year. We concur in the

effort to deal with this very difficult issue in a legislative way, but we feel that there are many areas that need to be investigated prior to the passage of such legislation.

"There is much confusion over the use of the terms 'death with dignity' and 'euthanasia'. It is basically our feeling that SB 179 unnecessarily adds to this confusion. As merely one example of this confusion, we believe, with the Governor, that 'death with dignity' means the choice of an individual not to have heroic medical measures extended in his behalf once he reaches a particular physiological-mental-emotional state. We believe that 'euthanasia' means, in contemporary usage, the active bringing

about of the death of a person by a physician. We see a great ethical difference between the deliberate act of inducing death, and the deliberate choice to let death run its natural course, unimpeded by the heroic measures that can be used to stave off certain death through the uses of modern medical technology. These differences, and their ethical implications, need further exploration."

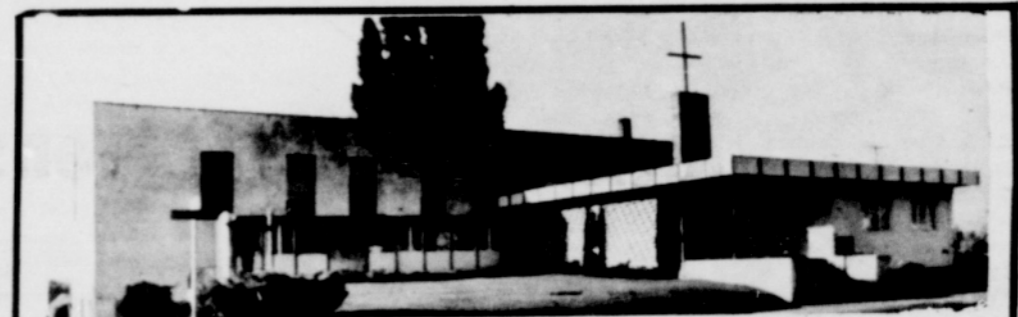

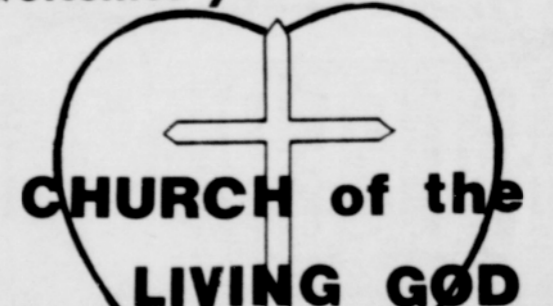
