Bishops fight OEO cuts

Bishops of the African Methodist Episcopal Church made history in Washington, D.C., recently when they joined the Congressional Black Caucus in a press conference on Capitol Hill to protest the Nixon Administration's cutback in funds for the Office of Economic Opportunity—marking the first time that two such powerful Black groups have formed this type of coalition.

The Black elected officials, representing their own constituents and the Black clergymen, representing some 2 million members of the AME Church, pledged at the press conference, to hold a summit meeting of all Black organizations and institutions in the country, to plan strategy for combating the federal cutbacks.

Rep. Louis Stokes (D-Ohio), Chairman of the Congressional Black Caucus, welcomed the new alliance with the clergymen and expressed a desire to continue to jointly fight all oppression in this country.

According to Bishop H.H. Brooks of Los Angeles, the Bishops' visit to the nation's capital grew out of a session of the Bishops' Council of the AME Church, held in Louis-

ville, Kentucky, only days before the Washington press conference.

At that conference, the Bishops drew up a resolution calling upon the Presiding Bishops of Episcopal Districts, Presiding Elders, Pastors and Lay Members of the AME Church to join organizations and agencies currently protesting the cutbacks in Washington.

In a prepared statement distributed at the press conference, the Bishops said, "We are here today because we care. We have come to call the conscience of the nation to the moment of judgement. We call the great leaders of our minority groups to assemble a leadership conference immediately to lay out a blueprint for action."

"Further, we call upon the members of the African Methodist Episcopal Church in every village, town and hamlet in America to join with those forces who are mobilizing to fight these cuts with all vigor and to appeal to the highest and best in America."

The OEO cutbacks will affect programs in education, housing, community organizations, manager training, child care, health care and economic development.

Bishop John Adams of Texas contrasted the attitude in America towards helping poor people with that of America's attitude towards "bailing out" such majority-owned businesses as Lockheed and the nation's railroads.

"What this shows," he said, "is that in this country we have Socialism for the rich and rugged individualism for the poor."

Bishop S. Ward Nichols, Senior Bishop of the group, who is from South Carolina, said the AME Church has always stood for Black pride and is now representing all Black and poor people who have not been able to share in this country's affluence. He said the Council of Bishops would move to organize the summit meeting as soon as possible, but did not give a definite date.

The other Bishops attending the Conference along with Members of the Congressional Black Caucus, included: Bishop E.L. Hickmann, representing Delaware, New York and New England; Bishop Henry W. Murph, representing Washington, D.C., Maryland, Virginia and North Carolina; Bishop H.J. Bearden, West Virginia, Ohio and Western Pennsylvania; Bishop H.T. Primm, Illinois and Indiana; Bishop Harrison J. Bryant, President of the Council of Bishops, Missouri, Kansas, Colorado, New Mexico, Arizona and the western states; Richard Hilderbrand, Georgia; Bishop I.H. Boone, Louisiana and Mississippi; Bishop Vinton Anderson, Alabama; Bishop H. N. Robinson, Florida; Bishop S.S. Morris, Arkansas and Oklahoma; Bishop W.R. Wilkes, Tennessee and Kentucky; Bishop Frank Reid, Washington, D.C.; Bishop Fred James, South Carolina; Bishop Fred Talbot, Washington, D.C.; and Bishop Frederick D. Jordan, Director of Urban Ministries, Los Angeles.

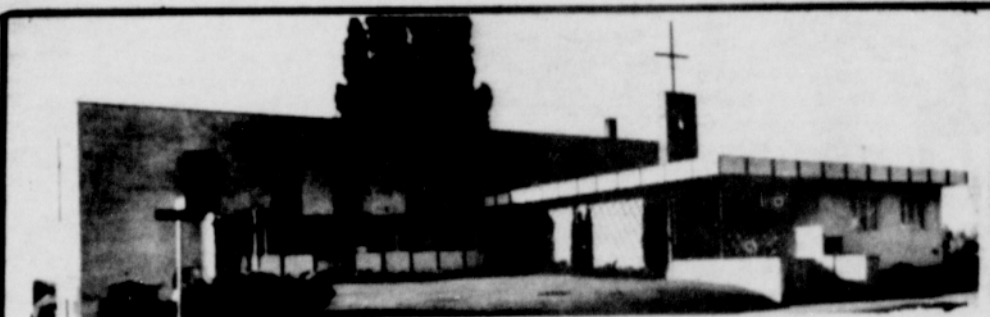
