**Robbed At Work**

Hired as floor manager in a department store, Phyllis asked where she should leave her new fur coat during working hours. Since there were no more lockers available, she was told to leave the coat in a corridor closet.

A few days later, the coat was stolen from the closet. The store denied any responsibility for the loss, but Phyllis—unconvinced—took the matter to court.

At the hearing, the company said it had never guaranteed its employees against theft. But it seems the closet had neither lock nor guard. Finding a lack of reasonable care, the court said the company would have to make good the loss.



It is common for employees to deposit clothing and other personal belongings in company facilities while at work.

As a rule, the company must provide reasonable safekeeping if — as in Phyllis' case — the employee has been instructed to put the article in a particular place. This creates a "bailment" relationship, with a legal duty imposed on the company as the "bailee."

But the duty is not unlimited. In another case, also involving a stolen coat, the clothes closet was within a locked enclosure to which only employees had access. A court ruled that the company had made a reasonable effort to prevent theft, hence could not be held liable.

Of course, some responsibility rests upon the employee as well. A toolmaker who owned his own tools often left them overnight on his work bench. Right above the bench was a broken skylight. One night a thief climbed in through the skylight and decamped with the tools.

Could the company be blamed for the loss because of the broken skylight? A court said no, because the toolmaker himself was aware of the danger. By leaving his tools in such an accessible place, said the judge, he had "assumed the risk" of their being stolen.

**Redden resents Nixon remarks**

[The following is a statement by Oregon State Treasurer Jim Redden regarding President Nixon's statement on the Watergate affair.]

Now that "Checkers II" is history and the President is well into Crisis #7, I think it appropriate to point out that the criminal conduct in the last campaign was, in fact, limited to those who supervised the Committee to Re-Elect the President.

During the course of his speech the President spoke of campaign excesses and, in a burst reminiscent of the old Nixon, handed down an indictment of, and I use his words, "both of our great parties" for "shady tactics." As co-chairman of the M. Govern effort in Oregon last fall, as a member of the Democratic Party, and as a political officeholder, I deeply resent this clumsy attempt to blame the entire political system for the criminal acts of certain members of the White House staff.

**Loaves & Fishes program expands**

On May 9th, the University Park Loaves and Fishes Center celebrated its Third Anniversary. The center is located in the old University Park Methodist Church at 4791 N. Lombard Street.

Fellowship noon meals at the center are served on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays to about 30 elderly area residents. Saut-ins receive meals on wheels on the same days. The center is operated by 38 volunteers from the area, directed by Glenna McKay. All elderly residents (65 and older) are welcome to enjoy the center's meals and programs.

More than 16,000 hot nutritious meals are served each month to elderly persons in the Greater Portland area through 24 neighborhood centers of Loaves and Fishes. This volume of meals is more than double the average monthly number of meals served in 1972. Nearly one-third of the meals are Meals-on-Wheels delivered to the homes of shut-ins who are unable to visit the neighborhood centers.

In his report at the recent annual meeting of Loaves and Fishes, executive director Richard Mastbrook attributed this progress to the excellent cooperation of over 1500 volunteers with the central L & F staff. These volunteers have come from about 200 churches and community organizations. Their

groups contribute funds that partially support the operation of the centers.

The efforts to increase the supply of meals from three to five days a week has made real progress. A temporary central kitchen, in facilities lent by Ascension Catholic Church, has helped make this possible. Under the supervision of two L & F staff, a nutritionist and a dietician, this pilot operation has demonstrated the economies of a central kitchen and the feasibility of supplying all centers with hot meals five days a week. At present, 8 neighborhood centers are served from the Central Kitchen. One center is now serving five days a week and two others serve meals-on-wheels five days a week.

A new central kitchen is expected to be in operation before the end of June. It will eventually have a capacity of 5000 meals a day and will supply all neighborhood centers.

Expansion of the recreation, information and counseling programs of the centers has kept pace with the growth of the meal services. This part of the Loaves and Fishes operation provides sessions of interest to the elderly to fill the ten to two o'clock periods in each center.
