Chalmers Jones, Administrator of Special Programs, State Bureau of Human Rights, will speak Sunday, June 17 at 4:00 p.m. for the regular membership meeting of the NAACP. This will be the last meeting until September 16.

Mr. Jones has been associated in the affairs of the community and state for many years. A few years ago he was honored as the

"Outstanding Citizen in Albina" for his leadership role. He has been a specialist in the area of employment and was responsible for starting the State Employment Office in Albina. He has served as a member of the Citizen's Planning Board for Model Cities and a member of the metropolitan YMCA Board.

Mr. Jones will share with us from his own personal knowledge what is happening to our own special programs and what we as interested citizens might do.

(Continued from pg. 1 col. 8) the supervision of the University, but they are not and they have become a target for petty crimes, according to Abu. He relates also that the managers are inexperienced students and are not able to handle the severe problems that arise.

Abu, currently on leave from KLIQ where he hosts a talk show, is a musician and performer. A product of the ghetto, he spent many years in penitentiaries, and in the penitentiary found the potential for a new life. The world's first 4-minute miler, run within the walls of Iowa State Prison, he received acclaim through Ebony magazine and the international press. Given the opportunity to meet many prominent persons and broaden his perspective beyond a life of crime, he began to study. After being pardoned from his sentence for burglary, he studied opera and ballet. He has been involved in a number of pursuits, including attending the Chicago Conservatory of Music, performing with the Canadian Opera Company and working in television and radio.

## OES honors students

Two Black students were among those graduating on June 8 from Oregon Episcopal Schools (St. Helen's Hall, Bishop Dagwell Hall). Altogether 27 young men and women received diplomas and awards at commencement exercises which were held at Trinity Episcopal Church in Northwest Portland.

Gregory Amerson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Amerson, and Clarence Pruitt, son of Dr. and Mrs. Clarence Pruitt also were recipients of awards.

Gregory was awarded the Coach's Award, the highest Physical Education Trophy to be given by the school, and the Captain Cups for Soccer and Basketball. This winter he was voted the most valuable player of the year by the basketball league in a unanimous decision. He also received this award last year. Gregory was also the recipient of honors as was Clarence Pruitt for having maintained at least a 3.0 overall average during the academic school year. Gregory and Clarence plan to attend college at the University of San Francisco.

The diplomas were awarded the Right Reverend James W.F. Carman, Bishop of Oregon and the awards by Mr. Frederick Wood, the principal of the Middle and Upper Schools at OES.

Commencement speaker for the evening was Miss Mildred Schwab, Commissioner of Public Affairs in

Portland. She spoke on the need for young people to become involved in their government and to commit themselves to being responsible citizens.

Both young men have future plans for their business which include expanding. Often people in the community who make hand made products like leather bags go to the Incense and Implements shop to perhaps sell their products. Bruce and Clarence are not as yet able to handle such products, but hope to soon.

Incense and Implements is the only Black-owned shop that offers this type of variety of items as such. Their price range extends from 50 cents to \$12.00. They even offer photos by a local photographer, James Robinson, of Stevie Wonder at the Paramount.

Open from 12 to 9 six days a week, Incense and Implements is the place where you can buy that little spice for your life. For you over the hill people Incense and Implements is the place to visit to see what the young folks are up to.
