Abu, currently on leave from KLIQ where he hosts a talk show, is a musician and performer. A product of the ghetto, he spent many years in penitentiaries, and in the penitentiary found the potential for a new life. The world's first 4-minute miler. run within the walls of Iowa State Prison, he received acclaim through Ebony magazine and the international press. Given the opportunity to meet many prominent persons and broaden his perspective beyond a life of crime, he began to study. After being pardoned from his sentence for burglary, he sudied opera and ballet. He has been involved in a number of pursuits, including attending the Chicago Conservatory of Music, performing with the Canadian Opera






