Community Council chooses Fishler

Stanley A. Fishler is the new Executive Director of the Tri-County Community Council. He took over his assignment last week traveling from Fort Worth, Texas with his wife and three of five children.

Mr. Fishler was born and educated in Salt Lake City, Utah. Although his studies were in the field of anthropology, he was drawn into the human services planning field by a former Portland U.G.N. Executive Director. He served for five years as the Director of Social Planning for the United Community Services of Savannah, Georgia.

In 1964 he was appointed director of the Community Council in Fort Worth, Texas. His accomplishments there included initiating and, for three years, operating the

Fort Worth Community Action Agency (OEO), planning and coordinating a drug abuse program with the City of Fort Worth, and developing a 4-C program and a variety of services including foster care, transportation, homemaker, outreach, and 24-hour emergency service.

Mr. Fishler is a member of the American Institute of Planners. While in Texas he served on the Executive Committees of the Governor's Committee on Children and Youth and the Governor's Conference on the Aging.

He was a member of the Comprehensive Health Policy Development Committee of the North Central (Texas) Council of Governments and served on the Fort Worth Detoxification Center Advisory Committee.

Autograph party honors Aaron Johnson

On the 30th of this month, this coming Saturday, the B.E.C. Bookstore will host an autograph party for Minister Aaron Johnson, who is Assistant Minister at Maranatha Christian Center, Portland, Oregon. The Bookstore is located at 3705 N. Williams and Minister Johnson will be at this address to autograph copies of his latest book, **The end of Youngblood Johnson**, from 4 to 8 p.m. Community members are cordially invited to come meet and talk with Minister Johnson.

The End of Youngblood Johnson is a true story of a young Black man who grows up in a world of harsh realities and fast living. Aaron Johnson was born into a world without love. He saw his mother twice in his life and never knew his father. His aunt raised him as best she could and always warned him about the "forces" out in the streets that could ruin his life. But "Youngblood" never really understood what those mysterious "forces" were until he started running with the Soviet Lords (a street gang), smoking pot, popping

pills, and fighting other gangs. While overseas in the service, "Youngblood" was turned on to heroin and back in the states, the habit got harder and harder to satisfy. So he stole, hustled and pimped. Life became an endless nightmare of crime, violence and destruction.

This was life for Aaron "Youngblood" Johnson until one day he took an overdose. The "forces" around him had now somehow changed for the best and miraculously, he did not die from the overdose. Fast living and king heroin had killed "Youngblood". But Aaron Johnson, Minister and director of the Aaron Johnson Foundation, lives on to testify to the wretchedness of a reality far too many Black people live and now he lives to help them. The Aaron Johnson Foundation is a program to prevent and aid in the serious problems of youths. It consists of a hot line service, counseling services for parents and youth, a suicide prevention program and mail counseling.

Moose, Knights admit Blacks

The Department of Revenue has notified the Loyal Order of Moose and the Supreme Lodge Knights of Pythias that they may file for property tax exemption for the 1973-74 tax year if the proper statements are filed with the county assessors by June 30. A copy of the announcement was sent to all assessors.

Many fraternal lodges lost their tax exemptions in late 1972 following a decision by the U.S. Supreme Court against the Elks Lodge declaring that state tax exemptions were unconstitutional for fraternal groups practicing racial discrimination.

Clarence J. Ruddy, General Counsel for the Loyal Order of Moose, advised C.H. Mack, Director of the Department of Revenue, that all racially restrictive membership provisions were

stricken at the organization's general convention in May of this year. In line with a recent interpretation of ORS 311.410(3) by the Legal Tax Division for the Department of Revenue, Mack determined that this was a change of use which would qualify Oregon lodges for tax exemption during the 1973-74 tax year if statements listing all real and personal property and its use were filed with county assessors within thirty days.

Earlier in June, Jule O. Pritchard, Supreme Secretary of the Supreme Lodge Knights of Pythias, was also notified by the Department that they again qualified for tax exempt status due to similar national constitution changes received from Pritchard. It is expected that both organizations will file before the deadline.

As far as busing is concerned Senator Roberts expressed that "Integration must start at an early age." She explained that integration must occur even before school. The more involved we become with each other, the more we can understand each other and get along.

The Fair will be held at the Lloyd Center Auditorium on July 3rd at 8:00 a.m.

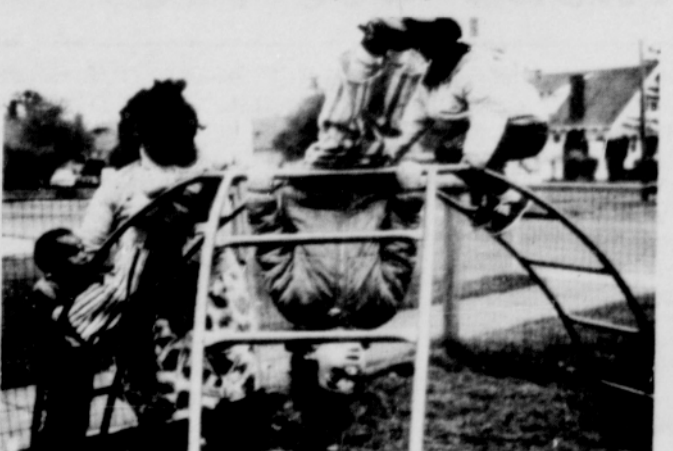
Preschool registers
