

Endorsements

House District # 15

Bill McCoy is seeking re-election to his House seat. McCoy, who was first elected in 1972, served on the House Ways and Means Committee, an unusual appointment for a freshman legislator. McCoy also chaired the subcommittee on aging and is a member of the Emergency Board. McCoy, who has a background in social work and public administration, has worked with the aged, youth, the handicapped, delinquent and dependent children, and welfare recipients. His experience with and knowledge of state agencies is an asset to his district and to the legislature. The Observer endorses Bill McCoy, our first Black legislator, for re-election.



Labor Commissioner

Bill Stevenson, candidate for the Democratic nomination to the office of Labor Commissioner, has served 4 terms in the State Legislature and has been a supporter of legislation to support the raise in minimum wages, increase in unemployment compensation payments and payments to workers injured on the job, and Oregon's Safe Employment Act.



Stevenson advocates a strengthening of Oregon's Apprenticeship and Training programs, assistance to veterans in finding employment, and responsible enforcement of Civil Rights laws.

The Bureau of Labor is responsible for the enforcement of Civil Rights laws and as such is one of the most important public offices in the state. Stevenson's experience and his liberal voting record indicate that he is the best candidate for the position.

House District # 21

Representative Howard Willits is known for his strong stand on issues -- his opposition to the Vietnam war, his support of the United Farmworkers Union, his effort toward public ownership of electric power, his involvement in civil rights. Willits has dedicated himself to programs that help people -- jobs, taxes based on ability to pay, more attention to the needs of Senior Citizens, etc. His record speaks for itself -- he has earned the support of the voters.



State Senate, District #9

John Toran seeks State Senate Position #9. Toran has had experience with the results of legislation through his practice of law, and has experienced the formulation of legislation through his position as Legal Counsel for the Senate Environment and Land Use Committee, with the 1973 Legislative Session. Toran should receive the Democratic nomination.



City Council, Position #2

Commissioner Mildred Schwab has earned support for her bid for re-election to City Council Position No. 2. Mrs. Schwab directed the development of the neighborhood association ordinance, enabling citizens to have more influence in city planning and budgeting decisions. She provided leadership, while directing the Bureau of Human Resources, and encouraged programs dealing with urban Indians, transportation for the handicapped, and the juvenile diversion program.



Commissioner Schwab has made herself available to the public, including the Black community. She met with Model Cities committees and with any other group that has requested her presence. She has shown a concern for the problems of individuals and neighborhoods, as demonstrated by her ready availability by telephone. Her record of hiring minorities exceeds that of the other members of the City Council.

County Auditor

Jewel Lansing receives the Observer endorsement for County auditor. With 10 years experience as a Certified Public Accountant, she has the necessary knowledge of accounts and audits to safeguard the people's money and to establish new and more efficient methods of monitoring. Ms. Lansing is the only candidate in this race that is a CPA and therefore has qualifications above and beyond the other candidates.



House District #16

Wally Priestley represents the 16th House district. Priestley, called "radical" by friends and detractors, has long been active in civil rights movements. He was among the first to participate in anti-war demonstrations. He went to California to assist Cesar Chavez and the farmworkers long before they became a popular cause. He picketed protesting pollution before the average citizen became concerned. He has been beaten, arrested, jailed for advocating the rights of the individual -- and for this he has received the scorn of the "establishment". Oregon needs a "radical" voice in Salem.
