Cannon Beach theater plans season

The emphasis is on comedy this summer as Portland State University anticipates its sixth season of productions at the Coaster Theater in Cannon Beach.

The season, which opens July 4th and runs through August 25th, includes three comedies and a melodrama.

The schedule looks like this: "Desk Set", by William Marchant, July 4-7 and 11-14; "A Thurbur Carnival", by James Thurbur, July 18-21 and 25-28; "Dial M for Murder", by Frederick Knott, Aug. 1-4 and 8-11; and "Harvey", by Mary Chase, Aug. 15-18 and 22-25. Curtain time for all performances is 8:30 p.m.

There are 14 members in the company this summer. Two of them — Helen Machin-Smith, a speech and drama teacher, and Karen Tate, a junior high school teacher who played a lead role in "Pygmalion" at the beach last summer — also are directing productions this summer.

Ms. Machin-Smith is directing "Dial M for Murder", Frederick Knott's thriller about a man who marries for money, then kills to get it.

Ms. Tate plays a lead role in the opening production "Desk Set", then is scheduled to direct "A Thurbur Carnival". Other directors are William Tate, an assistant professor of theater arts at PSU, for "Desk Set", the story about the intrusion of a computer into a business; and Ed Collier, a graduate assistant in theater arts at PSU, for "Harvey", a story about a man and his pukka, an Irish term for an imagined friend, in this case a seven-foot rabbit.

The producer of the Coaster Theater season is Asher Wilson, head of the Theater Arts Department at PSU; the designer-technical director is James Lyon, an assistant professor of theater arts at PSU; and the costume designer is Joy Breckenridge, the regular PSU theater costumer. Though 10 of the 14 company members are from PSU, the company isn't limited to PSU students. About 40 people auditioned for positions in the company this spring, one from as far away as New York.

The company's home in Cannon Beach — the new Coaster Theater — underwent major external and internal remodeling prior to last season. Wilson describes the theater as "old, rustic elegance". Built in 1924, the house originally was used as a silent film theater and later as a skating rink. The seating capacity is now 250.

For the first time, tickets to productions this summer will be sold on a reserved basis for each play. Prices are \$3 for adults; \$2 for youth (14-21) and \$1.50 for children (6-13). To clean the stained copper bottoms of pots and pans, pour a little vinegar on the bottom of the pan, then sprinkle some table salt over it. No rubbing is necessary. Wash and rinse as usual.



An inexpensive scratch remover for natural wood cabinets and woodwork is mineral oil. This blends into the wood and assumes its shade as well as polishing the wood at the same time.

You can easily polish off fingernail polish stains by following this method. Sponge the stain with acetone or amyl acetate (buy at drug store). Use amyl acetate on acetate, arnel and dynel. Use acetone on other fabrics. Nail polish remover can also be used to remove the stains. But do not use this on the above materials without first testing the fabrics to see if it will cause damage.

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SOUP IS DINNER IN A KETTLE



A hearty bean soup is a complete dinner in a kettle. Easy on the budget, too, satisfying and highly nutritious. No matter which variety of dried bean is used as the basis for the soup, the bean can be counted on to be a good source of protein, "B" vitamins and iron as well as food energy.

The savory well-seasoned soup given today is made with canned dried beans to cut the cooking time to modern requirements. It uses pinto or kidney beans with tomatoes, onion, garlic, spices, herbs and a little pork. Dark corn syrup brings out the flavor of many bean dishes. In this soup, it adds just the right amount of sweetness to help blend the flavors.

Hearty Bean Soup
2 cans (16 ounces each) pinto or kidney beans
1 quart water
1 can (16 ounces) peeled tomatoes

- 1 cup chopped onion
- 1/2 cup Karo dark corn syrup
- 1 tablespoon salt
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1 to 1 1/2 teaspoons chili powder
- 1 teaspoon dry oregano
- Dash pepper
- 1 cup sliced link sausage, partially cooked

Mix together beans and bean liquid, water, tomatoes, onion, corn syrup, salt, garlic, chili powder, oregano and pepper in heavy 4-quart saucepan or soup kettle. Bring to boil. Reduce heat; cover and simmer about 1 1/2 hours. Stir occasionally to mash beans. Add sausage after soup has cooked about 1 hour. Uncover and boil gently, stirring occasionally, about 30 minutes or until soup is thickened. Makes about 8 (1 cup) servings.

Note: Bits of leftover ham or pork may be used to replace sausage.
