Jeanne Hoffman is not a new name to Jazz in or outside of Portland. She's been playing the piano since the tender age of eight. She has played from coast to coast for years. She's played the Village Vanguard in New York to Basin Street in San Francisco. As Jeanne tells it, she had just arrived in San Francicso and was walking by Basin Street just before it opened, she went in to ask if the Club needed a piano player and they did and thus became the first piano player at the world famous Basin Street Night Club. So when I read a review on her a couple of weeks ago, that she was playing at the Helm on Broadway, I had to go down and check her out. Jeanne and her bass player David Friesen did a forty-five minute set of mostly up-tempo compositions that for the most part were over the heads of most of the crowd. She was playing the Lonious Monk style to a Ramsey Lewis audience. I thought that was very distasteful as a professional for her to trip like that. Aside from her sporadic fits of untimely laughter during the performance, she also lost the attention of the audience on a couple of her selections. Her song styling could use a little coaching if she persist on trying to sing. Justice considered

A statewide "first-of-its-kind" Conference on Volunteers in Criminal Justice will be held on Tuesday and Wednesday, November 18th and 19th at the Valley River I nn in Eugene.

The conference, sponsored by the Oregon Council on Crime and Delinquency, a statewide citizens group funded by the United Way, will attract volunteer coordinators, administrators and volunteer leaders from throughout

The featured dinner speaker will be Dr. Robert M. Martinson, an eminent sociologist from New York. He has recently published the book, "The Effectiveness of Correctional Treatment" which has brought national attention to his research because of his conclusion that prison programs have "no basic effect" on lowering the crime rate.

Conference participants will also hear Mrs. Robert Straub at the luncheon session and six professionals from the Portland area.

Phyllis Proppe, Executive Director. Volunteer Bureau of Greater Portland and Gena McClain, Activities Director of Villa St. Rose will co-lead a workshop on "Recruitment and Community Relations." Mr. Charles A. Tracy, Director, Administration of Justice at Portland State University will introduce Dr. Martinson at the banquet.


