

Third World Wrapup

Angola has become the chief focal point for the opposition to the Kissinger-dominated United States foreign policy — a policy which has culminated in the extension of the Schlesinger Doctrine for Limited Thermonuclear War — a policy which is spelled out most clearly in the Hilex 75 "blueprint in Operation For World War III by January, 1976" which was recently released by International Press Service.

House Democratic Leader Tip O'Neill and Intelligence Committee Chairman Otis Pike have demanded of Kissinger to explain "how the United States got in the position we're in — what do we do about it — and where do we go from here?" The **Chicago Tribune** (December 7th) warns the United States press to take heed of who's calling the shots in Angola, and "not to be Kissinger's patsy." The **Tribune** stated editorially to stay out of Angola — to sell neither our arms or soul, as Kissinger has done. The **Tribune** ends its comment with a not too industrialist: the NSC policy in Angola typifies United States provocation of the Soviets, leading to a nuclear missile exchange.

country have editorialized critically of the United States involvement. The Baltimore **Afro-American** stated that Kissinger's claim that Russian involvement in Angola could have some negative effect on détente is "foolish and grotesque joke as the United States doesn't give a damn about Africa anyway... (and) that the Soviet Union deserves credit for being a lot more free than is the United States."

The author of this column can personally testify to the truth of the Baltimore **Afro-American's** comments, as in 1968 he travelled extensively with the MPLA in eastern Angola as a film-maker/photographer, and subsequently wrote a book (with Don Barnett), **The Revolution in Angola** (Bobbs-Merrill, 1972). The major backer of the Portuguese colonialists was NATO — the arms for the colonialists came primarily from the United States. The "cover" for this was payment for the USAF Azores base — but the Portuguese government simply used its young men as "mercenaries" to protect (primarily) United States investment in all of southern Africa, but particularly in Angola. There has been no substantial change in United States foreign policy vis-a-vis southern Africa.

moratorium on dollar debt. The Committee of 40 sabotage of those efforts to halt the international collapse of production insist that the developing nations are irreconcilably in opposition, and that OPEC countries must be broken by the use of food (Georgia Pacific adds trees to the arsenal) as a weapon. The use of food as a weapon has come primarily from the entire array of Democratic Party presidential candidates, and Lester Brown, United States Agricultural Secretary Earl Butz has rebuked the policy of using food as a weapon. To pull this off, Kissinger has deployed Saudi Arabia (Yamini et al) to threaten the advanced industrial nations (and the non-OPEC Third World countries) with an oil-rare materials economic war. Such a scenario is spelled out in the Hilex 75 'nuclear war games' — a live operation.

The purpose of this shenanigan is to prevent discussion of the main obstacle to restarting production internationally — the Chase Manhattan ete. dollar debt, and Rockefeller et al determination to collect it. The Ctte of 77 non-aligned nations argue they must put this debt payment on ice for a period of five years, then restart production guided by a centralized credit institution (IDB) for expanded East West — or North-South — trade, which would have the immediate effect of starting up industrial production in the United States (as well), through the conversion for example of non-productive aero-space technology to productive non-inflationary machinery (etc.). The chief obstacle to this is the Rockefeller determination to collect debt, via labor intensive waste of humanity. The NSC policy is to consciously provoke the Soviet Union into a Nuclear confrontation, so as to have the field open (should the Soviets back down — which they will not) for continued looting and debt collecting.

CORRECTION

Two weeks ago the **Portland Observer** printed a story identifying 'Dave Buskin' as CORE's (Congress of Racial Equality) 'foreign adviser'. Actually it was CORE official Solomon Goodrich who made the statements attributed to Buskin — along with the 'foreign minister' of the CIA-South Africa funded National Union (UNITA) who called for State Department use of Afro-American troops in Angola, "to take care of the Russians." Buskin, according to CBS radio, has been running a series of 'mercenaries wanted' ads in the **Fresno Bee** and other newspapers — for hire in Angola.

At the NAACP regional meeting in Salem last week, a speaker told the delegates that he 'doubted whether CORE legitimately existed', calling CORE's Director Roy Innis 'a phantom' — resurrected from the dead a probable infusion of federal monies?

Following the **Washington Post** exposure of CORE's mercenary activity (December 11th), the **Post** detailed the Secretary of State's new policy of a 'war of attrition' — "with as much military commitment covert or otherwise to keep that going." The **Washington Post** notes that two thirds of the OAU members have agreed to a special session of heads of states or Angola (December 18th — Addis Ababa) and that the OAU will endorse the People's Republic of Angola. Hence, notes IPS, "the nuclear threat over a continent that is no longer under NSC control."

Soviets visit Oregon

Three Soviet scientists will visit the University of Oregon December 16th under the sponsorship of a US-USSR joint exchange agreement in science and technology.

The scientists are V.V. Shulakov (SHOE-la-koff), president and professor of the Moscow Economics and Statistics Institute; V.P. Morozov, Moscow Economics and Statistics Institute; and G.S. Roslyakov (ROZ-la-koff) of the Scientific Research Computing Center at Moscow State University.

The three-member Soviet delegation is currently visiting the United States to discuss and observe the application of computers to management. They recently participated in a two-day workshop in Washington and are now touring various West Coast computer facilities as part of their exchange visit.

During their visit to the University of Oregon, the Soviet delegation will meet with Dr. Paul Civin, U of O professor of mathematics, to analyze the work Civin has been doing in applying computer theory to the management methods of the University.

Among other facilities to be visited by the Soviets during their 14-day exchange are Oregon State University, Stanford University, the Tymshare Corporation; and the Health Sciences Computing Facility at the University of California at Los Angeles (UCLA).

Two UCLA faculty members, James Gips and Elizabeth Ichnowski, and a United States State Department interpreter are accompanying the Soviet delegation.

The exchange is part of an agreement signed by the United States and USSR in Moscow on May 24th, 1972. The agreement promotes technical and scientific cooperation. The cooperation already has begun in such fields as chemical catalysis, energy research and development, science policy, forestry management and electrometallurgy.

Howard approved as Kidney transplant hospital

Howard University Hospital has received formal approval from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) as a kidney transplant hospital.

Dr. Clive O. Callender, director of the Kidney Transplant Service at the hospital, said the certification makes Howard eligible for substantial federal reimbursement for kidney transplants and dialysis to be performed on patients at the hospital. He estimated the cost of a single transplant, without complications, at about \$20,000.

The kidney transplant program at

Howard is one of the most active programs operating in the Washington area. The first transplant was performed at Howard on July 27th, 1974. Since that time, twenty-four kidney transplants have been performed on twenty-two

Dr. Callender said the certification would not affect Howard's kidney program. Five patients have died. Howard has a 77.2 percent patient survival rate in its kidney transplant program, compared to the national average of 70 percent. The functional kidney rate is 70.9 percent at Howard, 20.9 percent above the national average.

gram significantly in terms of the quality of service patients receive.

"We have always been committed to giving our patients the best care, even when it meant operating at a deficit," he said.

"What will change, I hope," said Callender, "is how the community looks at us. We were bastardized and now we are legitimate. That may not be very important to some hospitals, but we care primarily for Black people and we need our own legitimate programs to identify with so that our people can look upon us as equal."

This racist gem, typical of most U.S. press coverage of the events in Angola, was published December 12th in the **Oregonian**. It is designed to produce a 'reaction formation' (a Pavlovian conditioned response) in its victim reader: an amalgam of red scare with 'white racist power structure'. Such coverage exhibits the essence of AP-UPI reporting on Angola — the exceptions to this being primarily a few Black newspapers and the **Chicago Sun Times** and the **Chicago Tribune**.

The war in Angola is virtually lost to South Africa and the United States, in spite of well more than the \$50 million the CIA has dumped into Zaire and the South Africa backed 'National Union' (Savimbi's UNITA). Recent reports note that Zairean conscripts have no interest in fighting, and want to go home — they are primarily fighting each other for space on the returning vehicles to Zaire. South Africa's some 12,000 troops are stalled in southern Angola, while military supplies continue to build up. The South African Parliament is now pushing through an emergency supplement to their \$1.5 billion defense budget for renewed weaponry (etc.) for the Angolan invasion. The **Johannesburg Star** (November 29th) reports that Henry Kissinger will visit Zambia and Zaire in order to "get the feel of Africa and its leaders." But the attempted red scare has almost universally backfired in the face of Henry Kissinger. Black newspapers across the

except that United States cover has been blown, and the Rockefeller group stands nakedly exposed with their South Africa apartheid allies and various CIA created counter-gangs and CIA installed puppets, like Mobutu. The consequent loss of Angola of Anglo-American Corp. and American-Metals Climax etc. has resulted in the press/NSC attack on the Soviets. The total amount due over 1976 in debt service from the Third World is about 25 billion. These statistics, compiled by IPS, show 26 top non-oil producing nations debt and relevant statistics by commodity. The Hilex 64 scenario which will be played out at the North-South meeting will be to attempt to selectively dump countries by cutting off their financing and thus shutting down their production.



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
