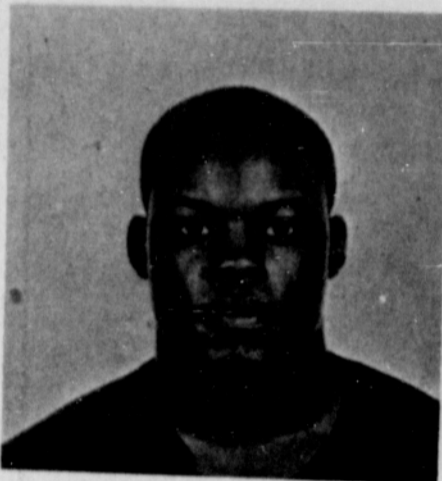


Iran executions scheduled

The Committee for Artistic and Intellectual Freedom in Iran, based at Portland State University, is asking the support of American citizens in the effort to save ten political opponents of the Shah of Iran from the firing squad.

An AP dispatch from Tehran on December 31 states that the government is planning to execute the ten persons who are charged with belonging to an urban guerrilla group and were allegedly instrumental in assassinating two United States Army colonels in Tehran last spring and another in June of 1973.

Prior to the AP dispatch, the Iranian government-controlled press ran a series of stories about the arrests. The names of seven individuals were given by the

Your State Employment Service

Question: Just what was the volume of Unemployment Insurance Benefits paid in Oregon during the past year?

Answer: Oregon experienced record unemployment during Fiscal Year 1975 and the resulting Unemployment Insurance (UI) payments pumped millions of dollars of UI reserve funds into the economy. This flow of UI benefits has been and is continuing to be a major factor in the stabilization of the unemployed worker's purchasing power during what is probably the most severe recession since the depression of the 1930's.

The recession caused claims activity under the regular State UI program to show a sharp increase in FY 75, compared with the FY 74 level of activity. The number of weeks of unemployment claimed increased 58 percent for a total of 2,514,104 in FY 75 as compared with 1,594,178 in FY 74. Insured unemployment average 48,348 per week during FY 75 for an insured unemployment rate of 6.3 percent which compares with a rate of 4.2 percent experienced in FY 74. Major factors in the higher insured unemployment rate included less activity among wood products, construction, transportation equipment manufacturing and trade industries.

In FY 75 gross unemployment insurance benefit payments totaled \$124,898,449 for the regular State UI Program; \$2,144,455 in UCFE (Unemployment Compensation for former Federal Employees); \$4,651,805 in UCX (Unemployment Compensation for Ex-service personnel); \$15,841,485 in Federal-State Extended Benefits; \$7,931,945 in Federal Supplemental Benefits (FSB, paid by the Federal Government) and \$2,036,963 in SUA (Supplemental Unemployment Assistance, also paid by the Federal Government). Combined total gross UI benefit payments in Oregon amounted to \$157,505,102 in Fiscal Year 1975 compared with \$72,272,499 in Fiscal Year 1974. The average Oregon UI Benefit check was \$63.43 in FY 75 compared with \$54.22 in FY 74. A good portion of the \$9.21 increase in the average check amount was due to the minimum and maximum weekly benefit amounts being changed from \$23 to \$24 and \$78 to \$88, respectively, effective September 29th, 1974. Again, effective the first week of July, 1975, minimum benefit was raised to \$26 per week and maximum to \$95 per week.

government, but there was no mention of a trial, military or otherwise. The only evidence cited by the government against the seven was based on "confessions" extracted by the SAVAK, the Shah's secret police, from the defendants.

Although the names of all of the ten defendants have not been disclosed, the AP dispatch contained the name of Ms. Manijeh Ashrafzadeh Kermani as one of those condemned to death. Another woman, Tahereh Sajjadi Tehrani was sentenced to 15 years in prison. In the Iranian context of the growing number of women who have stood up in political opposition to the Shah's repressive regime, the execution of a woman political prisoner is a new and ominous sign.

Ladis K. D. Kristof, professor of political science at PSU, said, "Human decency and respect for human life dictates that the Shah stay the execution of the ten Iranians. We urge that the Iranian government stop the execution of the ten defendants and permit the case of the ten to be remanded to the custody and protection of the United Nations Human Rights charter, of which Iran is a signatory."

Notice is hereby given that the City of Portland has filed a major modification with the U.S. Department of Labor for federal funds available under Title I of the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act of 1973.

This modification extends the program year from June 30, 1976 to September 30, 1976, and increases the grant allotment by \$881,786 which will be obligated for expenditure June 30 to September 30, 1976.

The total amount of funds available July 1, 1975 through September 30, 1976 is \$6,237,443. Anticipated expenditures by cost categories are: Administration -- \$1,207,609, Allowances, \$905,706, Participant Wages -- \$1,781,223, Fringe Benefits -- \$205,294, Training, -- \$754,775, and Services -- 1,182,856.

Planned expenditures by program activities are: Classroom Training -- \$1,902,588, On-the-Job Training -- \$1,245,648, Work Experience -- \$1,397,203, and Services to Participants -- \$1,492,004.

From July 1, 1975 through September 30, 1976, the program will enroll 4,564 individuals, of which 3,307 are new enrollments this year. A total of 3,410 will leave the program as follows: Direct Placement -- 542, Indirect Placement -- 569, Obtained Employment -- 265, Other Positive Termination -- 292, and Non-Positive Termination -- 1,742. The Significant Segments for the program are: Black -- 1,569, American Indian -- 85, Spanish American -- 122, Other Minorities -- 411, Veteran -- 938, Ex-Offender -- 765, Youth -- 1,116, and Older Worker -- 458.

Planned enrollment in program activity is: Classroom Training -- 1,050, Vocational Education -- 384, On-the-Job Training -- 650, and Work Experience -- 1,291.
