Fire Bureau warns motorists

The Portland Fire Bureau, which is encountering traffic problems while responding to and at the scene of an emergency, reminds the public of the City of Portland regulations covering the public at or near the scene of a fire:

- 1) Do not follow within 500 feet of any fire apparatus traveling in response to a fire alarm.
- 2) Do not park within 3 blocks of a fire

itself.
 3) Do not drive over fire hose.
 The traffic can obstruct fireground procedures. Crossing over fire hose does damage to the hose and can cause a break in the hose, which in turn endangers men inside a burning building who are depending on the water supply.
 The Fire Bureau is requesting the cooperation of all citizens in observing these important regulations.
