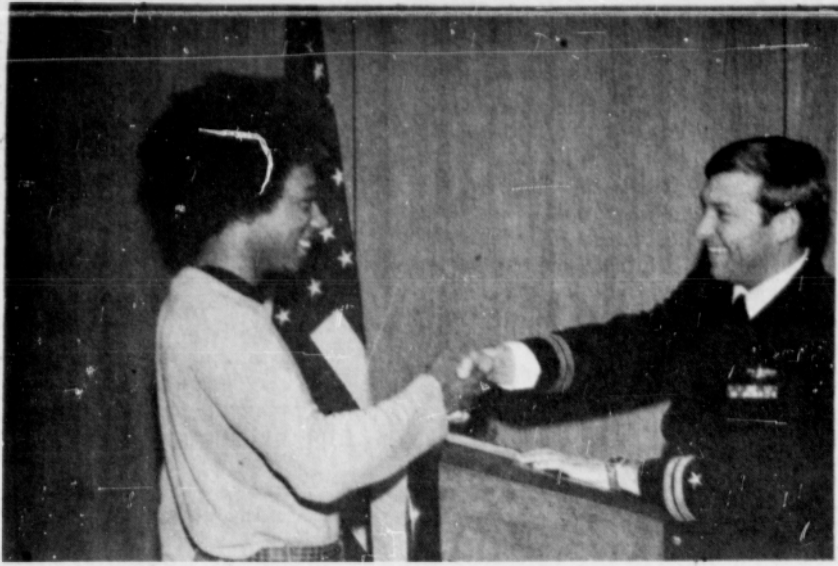

Fun, zest and adventure are all part of a U.S. Navy sailor's many and varied experiences while travelling the world's seaports and visiting international ports-of-call.

John A. Howard, son of Betty Stitt, has enlisted in the U.S. Navy. John enlisted in the Navy's Delayed Entry Program and will report for basic training at Orlando, Florida, Naval Recruit Training Center in September.

According to local recruiter First Class Photographer, Bill Tate, all the time a man spends in the Delayed Entry Program counts for pay purposes once active duty starts, and fulfills a portion of his military obligation while still at home. The nine weeks of Navy basic training

teaches such subjects as seamanship, ordinance, damage control, shipboard orientation, safety precautions, naval discipline, history and Navy customs. Physical conditioning, personal hygiene and first aid are also included.

Following basic training, Howard is scheduled to attend Class "A" Mess-management Specialist school at the Naval Training Center in San Diego, California.

Men's, women's sports combined

The structure of intercollegiate athletics at Portland State University has been reorganized.

In a move designed to increase efficiency and recognize the emerging importance of women's athletics, PSU President Joseph Blumel has announced that men's and women's athletics will be combined under one administration as of July 1st.

Roy Love, who has been director of athletics since 1972, will retain his title and assume responsibility for both men's and women's athletics. Marlene Piper, who became director of women's athletics this year, will step up to associate director of athletics with responsibility in both men's and women's areas.

Previously, Piper directed a program of women's athletics which was under the Department of Health and Physical Education at PSU.

"This is a logical reorganization," Blumel said, "particularly in light of emerging emphasis on women's intercollegiate athletics. It is also consistent with federal Title IX requirements which direct a move toward equality of support for men and women."

The University of Athletic Board, a seven member group of faculty, students and community representatives, has gone on record in favor of the reorganization.

In a letter to Blumel urging the change, Board Chairman James Kimball said "this organizational format seems to us to be the most logical and efficient structuring available, especially considering current and long term self-evaluative efforts to satisfy Title IX requirements."

"In addition," Kimball continued, "the alignment takes advantage of existing resources to enable a more comprehensive approach from support areas for both men's and women's programs."

The combined administrative unit will include fifteen intercollegiate sports - seven for men and eight for women. They are as follows: For men - football, basketball, wrestling, baseball, golf, diving and swimming, and gymnastics; and for women - volleyball, basketball, diving and swimming, tennis, fencing, track and field, softball and gymnastics.

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
