Broussard seeks seat in Oregon Legislature

Bruce Broussard is the Republican candidate for House District #16. Broussard is Executive Administrator for Better Housing Corporation, a company that buys houses, rehabilitates them, and sells them to low income families.

Since leaving the Marine Corps five years ago, Broussard has been employed by the National Alliance of Businessmen, United Good Neighbors, United States National Bank and IBM.

If elected to the House, Broussard would judge legislation on whether it would assist business and create jobs. "You have to have employers to have employees," he says. He advocates reducing local government spending and reducing state jobs.

Broussard favors the United Way concept of social services, believing that the state should not be involved in welfare and social services, but that they should be supported by charitable contributions.

He believes jobs should be created by

the private sector - business and industry - rather than by government.

Broussard has no particular program to present if he is elected, but would consult with his constituents to determine their wishes before voting on issues.

Broussard has no particular program to present if he is elected, but would consult with his constituents to determine their wishes before voting on issues. "I would hold 'town meetings' to determine how the people feel, then vote as the majority directs." Broussard feels that if there were a difference, in principal, between his views and those of the people in his district, he could persuade them to his point of view.

He is concerned about young people - especially Black youth - and would like to be an example to inspire them to make a greater effort to succeed. Having gained an education and a variety of experiences he believes it is time for the old 'leadership' to move aside and make way for a new generation.

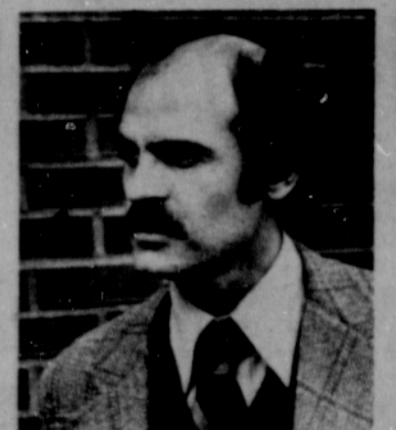

Gee says his firm entered the field last January to fill an unmet need and give greater credibility, accuracy and relevance to information flowing into and out of the Black community.

ACRA's survey methods were developed in conjunction with Survey Research Corporation of Bethesda. Their approach consists of a newly designed, random, digital dialing telephone technique that completes a survey in less than 48 hours.
