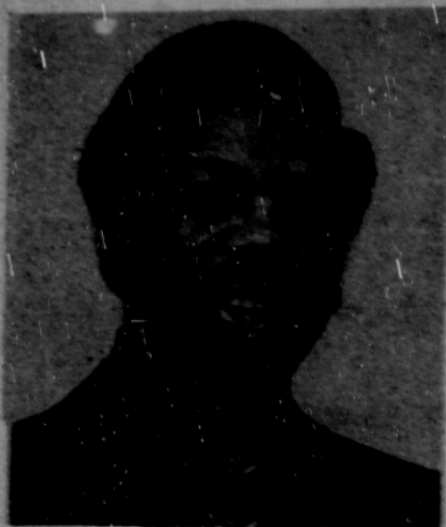


Entertainment guide

In the world of entertainment, it's not often that you witness the magnetism, style and sheer talent of some of your foremost performers. I cannot conceive of a list of top stars, without the name of Phoebe Snow among them.

Although it was on an off night as far as concerts go (Thursday), it was nevertheless a sell-out performance. I've always admired Phoebe from afar. Her background dictates a lifestyle I've been associated with, either directly or indirectly, throughout my life. She's been a hippie, groupie, pot head, pill head, raised in the ghettos of New York and has stared in the eyes of death more times than she would care to mention.

As Phoebe put it, I had found myself in a shell with no where to go. So I climbed out of it, put my Jewish pride and heritage together and started climbing.

Phoebe Snow's concert Thursday was one of the most accelerating performances I've ever seen. She sings with the clarity of Ella Fitzgerald. She has the soul stirring emotions on Aretha Franklin and has the earthy rapport with an audience of Barbara Streisand.

It was two and a half hours of solid musical enjoyment. The two Black male vocalists backing her up on most selections, Mike Gray and Roy Gallanay, added to the overall performance of the concert. Along with Sal Tramone on base, Steve Borg on lead guitar and John Belchum on drums.

Aside from having a unique set of vocal cords, her lyrics and arrangements are very profound. Tunes like *Mercy on Me*, *Cash It All In*, *Good Times*, and *Stand up on the* ~~Back which she wrote for her daughter~~ *It's a Good Thing* are some of her best.

Children's flue shots begin

High risk children between the ages of three through seventeen residing in Multnomah County will begin receiving their swine flu vaccination as early as Thursday, October 21, according to a two part plan announced by Dr. Hugh Tilson, county health officer.

In the plan, "high risk" children are identified as those suffering from chronic diseases of the lungs, kidneys, and heart; diabetes and other metabolic diseases; chronic neuromuscular disorders; immuno-deficient states and malignancies.

The first part of the plan calls for as many high risk children as possible to receive the vaccination from their private physician (either pediatrician or general practice) or general health care plan. Both Kaiser and Cascade are cooperating with the vaccination program.

Children not having a private physician or access to a physician plan may receive their vaccination at any of three public clinic sites. Families are urged to call ahead for an appointment. These include the Pediatrics Out-Patient Clinic at the University of Oregon Health Sciences Center, 3181 S.W. Sam Jackson Park Road; the Multi-Service Center Pediatric

Clinic at 5022 N. Vancouver; and in county health offices located at 12240 N.E. Glisan.

Tilson reminds parents that in order for the vaccine to produce the necessary level of immunity, two intramuscular injections of the bivalent vaccine protecting against both Swine and A/Victoria flu are needed. The two injections should be separated by at least four weeks. He further reminded parents that they must accompany their children to sign the permission slip.

Based on further tests, final decision on whether or not to vaccinate healthy children is expected following a Bethesda, Maryland, hearing at the National Institute of Health conference on October 22nd, 1976, notes Dr. Tilson.

Mass public clinics for people between 18 and 59 are planned for the first part of December. A complete schedule of sites and locations will be announced in the near future. Persons interested in more information on swine flu are invited to call the Swine Flu Information Office at 222-SHOT. Volunteers wishing to help in the public clinics are requested to call the American Red Cross at 243-5279.
