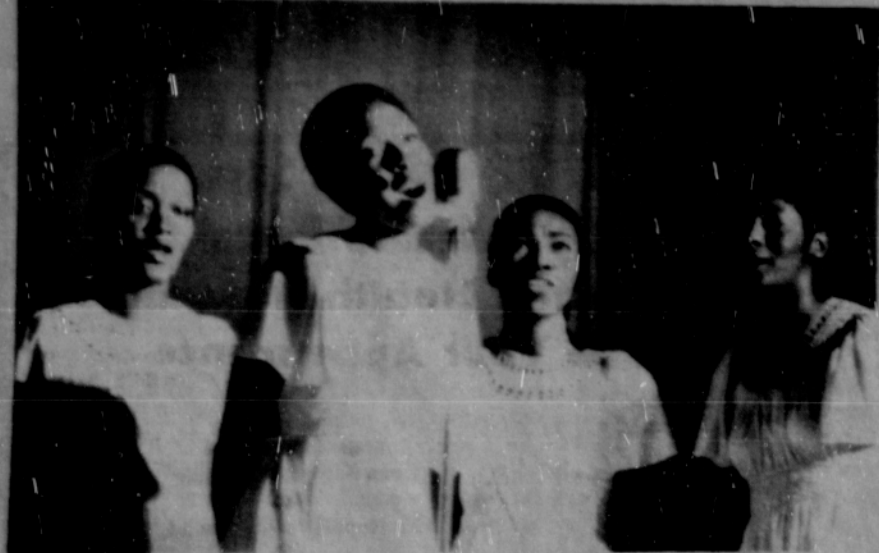




The Unity Gospel Singers

Grout school honors Dr. King

"Many people have dreams. We are around to make these dreams happen", Forrest Jenkins said of the recent dedication to Dr. Martin Luther King given at Grout Elementary School by Star Productions. The performance was so well done and emotional that there were tears in the eyes of some of the performers and audience.

The basic message that the performance conveyed was, "Let every man be your brother." There was a feeling of brotherhood apparent during the assembly.

Forrest Jenkins, president of Star Productions was the narrator and did a heart-warming presentation of King's "I Have A Dream" speech. Members of the "Unity Gospel Singers," Gypsy Hopkins, Mary Davis, Gayle King, Brenda Phillips, and pianist Karen Phillips had the rare ability to really touch their audience's heart, while conveying pain, joy, and love in their songs.

Jenkins wanted his audience to understand: "If we are to exist as a people, we must have the ability to communicate and reason with one another for a peaceful co-existence....We must learn at a young age that prejudice is a cancer."

Religion celebrated

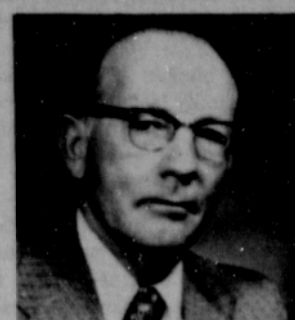

many sides of the Arab-Israeli issue. That's our job, not to take sides, but to provide the air time so that you can hear it all. Without the burden of sponsor pressure, we can continue to do just that.
