

Public Notice

Notice is hereby given that Neighborhood Hearings will be held to discuss the Federal Housing and Community Development (HCD) Program for the City of Portland for the fiscal year July 1, 1978 to June 30, 1979.

The City of Portland may receive approximately \$10,100,000 from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for its HCD program needs for the FY July 1, 1978 to June 30, 1979. These funds may be used for:

- Housing Rehabilitation
- Street Construction
- Street Alterations
- Street Tree Planting
- Street Lighting Installation
- Park Improvements
- Purchase, sale or lease of blighted property appropriate for rehabilitation or preservation.
- Construction of public works improvements: sewer and water lines, open space, neighborhood facilities, senior center.

- Code enforcement in deteriorating areas
- Special projects removing barriers which restrict the elderly and handicapped
- Public or social services not otherwise available
- Local matching funds for other federal programs
- Completion of urban renewal programs
- Relocation assistance
- Planning comprehensive C.D. program
- Reasonable administrative costs including citizen involvement costs

Citizens will be given an opportunity at these hearings to state their views on community development and housing, to articulate needs, express preferences about proposed activities, and assist in the selection of priorities. The final HCD program will be developed by City staff for review and adoption by City Council, but such program will be based upon the views received and priorities established by citizens.

Cook asks more voter exposure

Speaking before the North Portland meeting of the Save Our County Charter Committee Senator Vern Cook (D) Gresham criticized the Multnomah County Commissioners for refusing to issue a voters pamphlet covering the forthcoming special election to repeal the county charter amendments voted into the Multnomah County Charter by the voters at the general election last November. Senator Cook stated that the compromise offer to print the text of the measure made by the League of Women Voters explaining the arguments in the *Oregonian*, *Journal*, and *Gresham Outlook* was not an adequate substitute for a voter's pamphlet. Senator Cook pointed out, "The *Oregonian* and *Journal* reach out more than 60% of the approximate 236,000 households in Multnomah County." He further stated, "If newspapers are to be used as a substitute for the voters pamphlet the County Commissioners should also utilize *The Community Press*, *The St. Johns Review*, *The Sellwood-Moreland Bee*, *The Portland Observer*, and the other local newspapers with strong local readership. The use of these additional local papers should increase the delivery to an estimated 90% of Multnomah County households. This latter approach would be the next best thing to a voters pamphlet."

"STARDUST" - IT'S A WINNER!!! ***

"Stardust" is the best locally produced musical I've seen in years. It is presented by Star Productions and directed by the multi-talented Rosemary Allen. With gifted Thara Memory doing the musical arrangements. "Stardust" is a musical about Black people - their sorrow, their happiness, their dreams, their frustrations and their relentless strides for stardom.

"Stardust" incorporates the Black Renaissance of the 20's, when Black people were making measurable headway on all fronts in American society. "Stardust" denotes the general attitude of Black during that era and brings you right along to the year 1977 with "The Wiz."

There are scenes from several Broadway musicals: "Purlie," "Porgy and Bess," "Raisin In The Sun," "Green Pastures," and "The Wiz." As the actors sailed through the fifteen scenes, it was quite clear, not only to me, but to the entire audience, that a lot of hard work, dedication and talent went into this production.

As with any musical, it becomes apparent who the standout performers are. "Stardust" is no exception to the rule, in terms of theatrical talent, delivery and overall professionalism. Sandra Love, in scenes one, four and eight, showed the talent of a young actress full of talent, wit and humor. Her roles are very compatible with her abilities. Roger Reid was impressive in all of the scenes he appeared in - singing, dancing and acting. You name it, he's good at all of it. Luerine Wilson, not only is a good dancer and actress, she also has a very strong and lovely voice.

If Beverly Hedges doesn't make it as an actress, she certainly will as a singer! Her voice is soft, fluid and a delight to listen to. During the course of the evening, she sang, "Stormy Weather," "Satin Doll," "Porgy," and "Summertime." The dancers in "Stardust" were simply excellent. Scenes three, seven and thirteen were done in good taste, style and inventiveness. Rosemary Allen, the writer, director and one of the stars of "Stardust," offered a life-like performance in scene twelve, entitled "Graduation." Kolleh Dura Suma and Sandra Love did a commendable job in scene ten, "Raisin In The Sun."

It was a truly and admirable performance by all.

Thara Memory and his Big Band have made a big splash on the musical scene the last couple of years. Memory has been a familiar name in the Pacific Northwest for quite sometime. Although he's noted for his trumpet playing, he also plays a dozen other instruments. The scoring and arranging of "Stardust" has added yet another dimension to this multi-talented performer. He and his band contributed greatly to the overall success of "Stardust." 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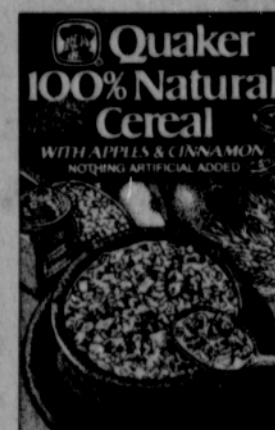
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
